MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - Secretary of State William P. Rogers pledged the administration today to strive for a negotiated Vietnam settlement instead of the "immediate and complete withdrawal" promised by the Democrats.



In that connection, he repeated his offer of last-April to help settle the war in Vietnam and his statement of deep concern the month after that the United Nations could do nothing to end that war.

Waldheim welcomed the Soviet-American strategic arms limitation agreements. But he complained that the arms race has not been perceptibly slowed down and that the world is spending \$200 billion a year on weapons now, against \$187 billion a year in the 1960s.


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
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


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For more than two decades, the United Nations, thanks to the mistaken leadership of the United States, persisted in conducting its affairs as if mainland China did not exist. The folly of prepeople were not in this world, and that the government which actually exercised sovereignty over them did not exist, either, finally exhausted itself last fall. Then mainland, Communist China was admitted to the United Nations.

And the United States, although it had put on a show of still opposing that decision, reversed its own policy by sending its President to Peking in the supreme gesture of recognition and admision that Communist China did exist and was, in fact, China.

The arrival of so much sanity in one year was perhaps too much for this schizophrenic world of ours, and so we seem to have, in compensation, a return to folly as grotesque and silly, in its way, as the long pretense that China itself did not exist.

True, it is relatively a small island piece of territory, and contains a relatively few millions of people. But it is there, and it is governed by a government which is not the government of mainland China. No world statistic can be complete without including it. But the main point is that we have just been through the nonsensical business of this pretense that part of the world doesn't

Yet, because the China we finally admitted to the United Nations has been insisting on having its bullying way on the issue, and because nobody dares or the United Nations has gone through one step after another designed to reduce Formosa to the state of a non-nation, a non-island, a non-population. The idea, we suppose, is that if everybody treats Formosa long enough as if it didn't exist, the stage will some day be set for Peking to take it over. That theory in reversewith Chiang Kai-shek supposed to be returning to the mainland-was the reason for ignoring the existence of Communist China for more than twenty years. It has to be conceded that Formosa may not stand up as well against such treatment as did mainland China.

But the main issue should be that one plece of nonsense does not authorize another, or one piece of injustice justify another, and that it is just as silly to try to ignore the existence of 14,000,000 Formosans as it was to try to ignore 800,000,000 mainland Chinese. We would even have to be able to pry into the safer, because such irresolute festering of the situation may keep alive and proong its potential for trouble.

There are now a long list of United Nations members whose population or territory is far below that of Formesa. What ought to occur is that the United Nations, instead of ignoring Formosa, should take steps to conduct a plebescite among the people of the island to determine whether they want to join mainland China, continue to be under the government of the Nationalist Chinese, or want own, and then readmit Formosa to the

Somehow, we are afraid, the public has the idea that one really adds politics to love and war as a business in which anything is fair enough.

Nobody, not even the Democrats themselves, as their own inability to keep a straight face while they discuss the Watergate case reveals, really takes this episode seriously, or really feels indig-

Perhaps it is very bad news for us, as a people, that it doesn't disturb us very

But the present point is that those Demcerats, or those pundits, who keep referring to this affair as if it were going to be one of the big issues of the campaign are, in our judgment at least, wasting their time and wisdom.

His messianic zeal persuaded sufficient numbers of Democrats that he, unlike his competitors, at least had a vision of a better America. In recent weeks he stumbled badly in the eyes of the nation, we sense, by having that vision set against his dismal handling of the Eagleton affair. Now, if he is to recapture that sense of mission, and make

it appear attainable under his stewardship, a prodigious job of salesmanship For this reason, it is probably fortunate that several of these figures which he asked to join him on the ticket looked at the odds and turned him down. For n Mr. Shriver he has a salesman supreme. Although the 56-year-old Mr. shriver has never run for office, nobody has ever accused him of being a technician, a bureaucrat or an executive. First as President Kennedy's choice to direct the Peace Corps, then President Johnson's man to run the War on Poverty, finally as an ambassador to France

under both Johnson and Nixon. Mr. Shriver displayed his gift for sellingselling to the press corps, selling to Congress and selling to the public ideas and innovations that would have expired early but for Mr. Shriver's enthusiasm. No matter that the Peace Corps never fulfilled the early aspirations, nor that the War on Poverty has been discredited to a great degree. Mr. Shriver's own reputation was tarnished as director of the Office of Economic Opportunity only because the Johnson White House delayed in replacing him with an administrator once the selling job was over. He was well equipped, though, for his Paris

Because he has not been the kind of public man who is required to set out his views on every conceivable issue of the day, we would be hard pressed to offer a comprehensive view of his candidacy.
