Clark Comes Home Before former Attorney General Ramsey Clark went to North Vietnam, as a member of an international committee invited by Hanoi to come and see the effects of American bombing there, we wondered in advance how objective he would succeed in

Would he, the liberal dove, the believer in curative rather than punitive criminal justice, the defender of the Berrigans, be able to look with open eye and give a straight report on what there might be in Vietnam? If so, he would hearten those who hoped for him to grow on the American scene as a

Ramsey Clark has now returned, and the first verdict on his performance has to be somewhat indecisive, as has been the perfor-

He began by getting himself quoted as saying that North Vietnam would release our North Vietnam, and there was, along with his reported statement from him, what also seemed a clear statement that he had assurance to this effect in writing.

Later, Mr. Clark contended, apparently without arguing very much in his own defense, that he had either been misquoted or had misspoken himself. The assurance in writing he had seemed to turn out to be a general assurance that our prisoners were being well treated, a judgment he himself accepted after being permitted an interview with ten of them.

But his first headline assurance about the return of our prisoners now dropped down the following language

"I haven't the slightest doubt that when there is settlement of the war, the American prisoners will be released." Neither has any one else, including Presi-

dent Nixon, or including the Ramsey Clark who had not yet had the experience of visiting Hanoi, ever had any doubt about that point. What has been happening is that all kinds of people, for propaganda and policy plays of their own, have been pretending that, unless somebody did something while the war itself is still on, the North Vietnamese would continue holding our prisoners in perpetuity. From that moment of reporting what

everybody has really known all along. Mr. Clark reverted, by haphazard news conference routes, to a moment in which he adopted as his own view the remark of some North Vietnamese official to the effect that the election of Senator McGovern as President would produce the release of our prisoners on Inauguration Day next January. This is a ridiculous piece of electioneering for Hanoi to offer and for Mr. Clark to relay. and he will be punished for it, if he really had his heart in it, by the fact that it can create votes only for Mr. Nixon.

As for the things Mr. Clark and the international committee went to North Vietnam to see - the extent and nature of the American bombing - his report so far has been ambivalent.

That bombing has to be cruel and in humane, wherever it hits, he does not have to tell us. Whether such civilian structures and dikes as may have been hit were our deliberate targets he apparently finds himself unable to say. But in the absence, either from him or from other observers admitted to North Vietnam, of word about any wholesale destruction of that country's dike system, it makes sense to believe those American pilots who say that, if they were supposed to get the dikes, they could.

The weekly allowance, it is now report ed, is a thing of the past. The amount that used to be considered a reasonable recognition of the youngster's routine chore-doing wouldn't suffice, today, to buy one cone a day. The modern family has either run out of chores, or, more often, it has run out of the discipline and will to see that children ever get to per-

When it comes to money, the modern youngster can get rich by baby-sitting, at fabulous sums per hour, or by mowing somebody else's lawn, at unbelievable fees. The young of a family are frequently in a better position to contribute a little spare change to some mid-week grocery emergency than the official breadwinner. When the young get money, they are more likely to hide it away in bank accounts than to spend it.

This latter discovery may be especially significant, for it undercuts what used to be the old argument in favor of the allowance system. It was, parents of other generations used to kid themselves, a way to teach the management of monev, and instil a sense of financial respon-

But let any graduate of the weekly allowance school of personal financing tell you the truth, and it is likely to be that he or she learned absolutely nothing from it, except the shortest way to the penny candy story.

Where, now and then, some family in sists on perpetuating the weekly allow ance system, the children themselves are often known to forget to ask for the paltry sum for weeks on end, which sometimes leads to a bitter confusion over bookkeeping when somebody finally remembers the account has to be settled.

The sound socio-economic factor in all this is that at least we are not training our youth in an unnecessary and wasteful devotion to the ethic of work, which is something all of us, young and old, are going to have to learn to do less and less of as our production powers grow great-
