A newsman's tape recorder caught this exchange as McGovern stepped down from a speaker's platform at the Illinois

"Pierre Salinger had no instructions whatsoever from me.' McGovern said. "He told me he's going to Paris and he said while was there he might try to make some determination of what was going on in the negotiations. But there wasn't the slightest instruction on my part to him

"Did you discuss this with him t any length?" he was asked. "No. I haven't seen him for several weeks." "Before he left?"

'No." McGovern said. "Have you sent a message to the North? Barely two hours later,

McGovern's press secretary, Richard Dougherty, casually distributed a three paragraph printed statement from

reference to his recent visit to Paris, Mr. Salinger had planned to return to Paris followng the Democratic National Convention and at my request, he met with members of the North Vietnamese delegation in Paris. "The only purpose of the discussion was to determine if any change had occurred which would permit the return of the

## The Battle For Privacy

Perhaps the reaction of most of us, to the disclosure that the FBI has been examining the bank accounts of individuals without their knowledge and without even a court order authorizing them to do so, is merely to wish that we had a bank account big enough or interesting enough to be considered worth such sleuthing.

But there is another reaction, too, and it goes along with our instinctive reaction to all the other instances in which the individual's one time right to privacy is being violated and compromised by government which sometimes, as in this instance, tries to have its own secrecy about how it invades what used to be the citizen's right to have his own This is what freedom is about-the right to

live free of prying into one's bank account, one's telephone conversations, one's drinking habits, one's associations, one's skeletons. Every time the machinery or procedure

for the violation of one of these rights is set up, it is set up by some arm of our own government, which is us, acting in our own behalf, and it is, moreover, never aimed at us ourselves, but always at somebody who is bigger and more wicked than we are. levertheless, every time the machinery or

procedure is established and used, the eventual certainty looms down at the end of the trail. Unless it is halted where it is, before it establishes itself, there will come the time when it reaches down to all of us, and covers every last phase of our privacy, leaving us none at all.

And the trouble is that unless we scream and fight now, when the first tentative invasions of privacy are being made, we will come to the battle only after it has already

## Incident At The Noodle

The New York police tell us exactly how it happened. There was this out of town gunman, who had been brought in to do a piece of killing for one of the Mafia gangs warring with one another. He had been told he would find his victims standing at the end of the bar inside the restaurant, the Neapolitan Noodle. Between the time he received his instructions and the time he entered the restaurant, taking his own position up at the bar, the gangland figures he was supposed to exterminate had moved away from the bar. and taken a table some distance away. Four new men had come and taken their places up at the bar. The hired killer ordered himself a drink; then, when the four men were leaving the bar and walking past him, he blasted away, killing two of them and wounding two others. The gunman himself then walked away, unmolested, to the car waiting for him outside. The people he had shot were not gangland figures-at all, but ordinary businessmen from the suburbs, having a drink in the big city. That is what happened, and how it

happened. The police are disturbed and outraged by what their Commissioner calls "a terrible crime, a frightening crime."

This is, obviously, a more terrible and frightening crime than it would have been if the out of town gunman had been shown pictures of his targets, so that he would have shot and killed the right men. tance of another right in affecting our society

And the fact that this is so - that it takes this murder of innocents to really arouse any of us - is the flaw in the situation. If we really wanted to prevent this kind of murder, we would have to do whatever it might take to prevent the other kind of murder. If we want to keep gangsters from shooting innocent people, we have to keep gangsters from

shooting gangsters. Society cannot tolerate the one and hope to escape the other

This is not to criticize the police. They know what the situation is; they have known it all along. What they need to be able to feel is the willingness of both high officialdom and the paying public to back up the fullest possible devotion of society's resources to a war to the extermination against the gangs who now claim, and to too great a measure exercise, the right to be their own law to

### The Government And The Press

My specific focus here is not so much th roles of candidates and the press in the conduct of campaigns as it is of public officials and the press in the conduct of

Unfortunately, efforts to discuss the issues involved in this relationship too often tend toward cliche and reflex response rather than reason and thoughful communication In this regard, the record shows that hyper-sensitivity to criticism is in abundant upply on both sides.

Thus, while it is certainly true that some government officials have at times been mbued with a sense of their own infallibility, the same can also be said at times of ome members of the Fourth Estate. Certainly, the press is and should be zealous in guarding the hard-won protection provided all Americans by the First Amendment - as, indeed, every government of ficial sworn to uphold the Constitution also should be.

In a free and diverse society, the right t speak out, to criticize social institutions, is not a private constitutional preserve however, but a right belonging to every The reverse side of that coin, of course, is

that no person serving the public — whether ne be public official or editor — should be mmune from criticism My point is that the time has come to pu aside the self-justifications and cliches of former times in considering the complex rights, duties and responsibilities of public

fficials and members of the Fourth Estate

Let me speak directly to the point The government you are dealing with whether it be the Democratic Administra tion of a John Kennedy or the Republicar dministration of a Richard Nixon, is a overnment chosen by and responsible to the people. And it is also responsive to the people — or it won't be in office very long It is not the absolutist government of ar

18th Century monarch suppressing a John Peter Zenger. It is not the government of any latter-day authoritarian regime. Nor is the tremendous power of the press to gather and disseminate news in this technological age of instant communications to be compared to the frail polemical power of a colonial orinting press operator in a bygone day. Thus, the widely-heralded apprehension that every allusion to press shortcomings epresents an attempt to destroy First Amendment freedoms, while understandable, is not well founded.

For the fact is that the impact of the American press today - and by "press," mean both print and electronic media - is

Throughout history, there have been elements of the press which have placed their own interests ahead of the public interest — just as there have been candidates and officials who have done the same. It might be argued that, even as there have seen officials who would seek to advance personal interests behind a protective veil of secrecy, there also have been journalists who loak narrow ambition behind a claim that their sole interest was the people's right-to-

Consider that twenty-five years ago, an ndependent Commission on Freedom of the Press declared that at times "the press can be inflammatory, sensational and irrespon-

It then went on to call for self-examination and self-regulation by the press to improve its performance in serving the public in-

Commission of Politicians would have no trouble in deciding that at times politicians can be "inflammatory, sensational and The substance of my remarks then is that we all, whether government official or editor, might do well to forego harangue and

And I would guess that an independent

cliche in favor of discussion based on reason and public interest. Let us recognize that each of us, whether government official or editor, has responsibilities — and fallibilities as well. Let us never draw back from honest criticism where we believe it our obligation. in good conscience, to criticize. But let us never grow so assured of our righteousness or complacent in our exercise of duty as to

For whether government official or editor, we must never forget that under our system every right and power has its countervailing right and power.

consider ourselves or our position beyond

The government official's right and power to administer his office is and should be subject to the responsible surveillance of an independent press. Far from being threatened, the public interest is enhanced by such responsible journalism. In similar fashion, the "people's right to

know" is not threatened by government policy implemented on behalf of a demonstrated national interest involving all the people's rights, any more that it is threatened by the countervailing right-toprivacy of individuals which is basic to every American; or by the right to a fair trial. including secret grand jury hearings. In each of these cases, we recognize that one right is offset by the paramount impor-

and its values. We must never forget that the preservation and advancement of these values is our proper concern. Toward this end, the time is long overdue

## From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Corn played an important role a the lives of the early New England settlers. While the Pilgrims, who were English, ooked in the manner of the land they left, they were forced by necessity to do some cooking like their Indian friends.

The Indians raised three major beans, squash and corn. Jsing logs that had been followed out, they ground the corn into samp. Samp was a crude meal from which flour could be made. After the fine flour was sifted out, the emainder became hominy which, of course, was also usable The Pilgrims had brought peas and wheat with them but they did not survive the climate. Corn therefore was used for many purposes. The English ate a porridge made of oats for breakfast so they made it of corn here. It was called hasty pudding. Hasty pudding is only corn meal mush. In another part of the world, the Italians would call it polenta. When cook, corn mush solidifies. It can then be sliced,


