

Too High Level To Be True?

It now appears that what first seemed to be a shining piece of statesmanship-plus a good campaign ploy-on the part of Senator McGovern has dwindled into a possible presumption on the part of Pierre Salinger, not too welcome to the Presidential can-

The story began with the heartening word that Senator McGovern, observing a North Vietnamese instinct to mix into our Presidential politics, and, according to Ramsey Clark, on his side, had sent a message to the North Vietnamese peace delegation at Paris, telling them to make peace now, with the Nixon Administration.

The story has now dwindled into a statement by Pierre Salinger, the pre-convention McGovern strategist. He went to Paris immediately after the convention because he seemed frozen out of the McGovern campaign picture. Then, as an old Kennedy hand, he obviously felt himself restored to importance and standing when McGovern's second choice for Vice President proved to be Sargent Shriver.

When the story about McGovern's word to the North Vietnamese got down to the Salinger connection, it had Salinger reporting that he had talked with certain North was no change in their plans for releasing our prisoners (as Ramsey Clark was reporting there had been) and that he, speaking for Senator McGovern, had told hem that, if there was any possibility for them to "negotiate a peace agreement with President Nixon that they should do so without regard to the American election, that Senator McGovern's desire for peace was greater than his desire for the issue of the Vietnam war to continue as a central issue in

When this statement appeared, something happened. Either Senator McGovern was disturbed at the effrontery of Pierre Salinger in presuming to act for him, or he found the level of statesmanship to which the Salinger gesture had elevated him a little higher than he cared to take, for campaign purposes.

At any rate, with this high level pedestal all ready and waiting for him, Senator McGovern at first denied he had authorized Salinger to seek any contact with the North Vietnamese, then, after telephone conversation with Salinger, issued a formal statement on the situation.

In this formal statement, Senator McGovern now said that Salinger had been acting "at my request" in meeting with members of the North Vietnamese delegation in Paris and then added this:

"The only purpose of the discussion was to determine if any change had occurred which would permit the return of the prisoners prior to the end of hostilities. "Mr. Salinger found no change in the publicly stated position of Hanoi. Mr.

Salinger also made it clear that I have repeatedly stated my convention that the end of the war should not be delayed by a single day because of the American election campaign." In this, Candidate McGovern did not reject Salinger's high level stance, but he didn't

choose to welcome it or emphasize it, either. The unkind judgment would be that perhaps' Senator McGovern is willing to have the war continue until election day, on the theory that, if President Nixon hasn't ended it by then, the voters will choose another man to do the job. This does not put Senator McGovern in any special compartment by himself, but merely restores him to the rest of us, including the man now in the White House, who steps up the pace of the bombing almost daily in what could be termed a savage effort to force Hanoi to make peace in time for American voters to reward, on election day, the leader who got it for them.

Drumstick For A Bunyan There is, the Wall Street Journal relates, this high school kid out in California who has bred himself a race of superchickens going up to 22 pounds.

But the experts down at Glastonbury's Arbor Acres, which is usually ranked as the world's most sophisticated laboratory and hatchery for the improvement of the chicken, retain a skepticism which is not necessarily professional jealousy.

They know how much work it takes, with genes and with computers, to produce the smallest significant alteration in the structure of a bird. And, against this experience, they are

asked to believe that a computerless high school youth, mixing Leghorns, Rhode Island Reds, Plymouth Rocks, Austrian Cross Whites and King Cornish hens, can, in the short space of seven years, increase the size of the chicken by four or five times.

It takes as much imagination to dispose of one of these superchickens as it does to hatch one. The trick seems to be to match the superchickens and create a market for them by breeding a whole race of Paul

Role Of The Vice President

Back when he was making his early, pro forma bows towards the tradition of the "more meaningful" vice presidency, Mr. Nixon talked of using Mr. Agnew as his liaison officer with state and local governments and as the head of various Cabinet-level planning groups. But having been there himself before, he knew there wasn't much chance that any of this would amount to very much, and after a short while, he abandoned the effort. Instead, he turned Mr. Agnew loose as a

party polemicist and master money-raiser letting him tour the \$1,000-a-plate dinners and other fund-raising functions, and plunge into Congressional and state campaigns with slashing attacks on liberal Democrats (and occasionally on too-liberal Republicans), the mass media, the liberal intellectuals, and other tempting targets. This "telling-it-like-it-is" made Mr. Agnew widely popular among most Republicans.

dependents. But it also made him an un-

isually controversial figure, particularly among younger Americans. And it is this controversial and polarizing quality that Mi agnew might now be well advised to modify. For the most important function of any Vice President is still to be available to move into the White House if anything should unexpectedly happen to the President. And it is both unfair to Mr. Agnew and dangerous or the country to leave open the chance that the man who might have to become President under such incredibly difficult circumstances should also be a highly conroversial, much criticized figure. The job of rallying and unifying the country in such a crisis would be formidable enough even for a popular, widely respected Vice President.

Mr. Agnew's own concept of the vice presidency makes it a rather aggressively ictivist role. In a speech delivered last year in Boston, a speech his aides emphasize he wrote in longhand himself, Mr. Agnew complained that while the Founding Fathers had considered the vice presidency an office 'suitable for men of energy," over the years it had "lost its political punch and become the most placid and uncontroversial of political positions. Indeed, as presently structured, it may be compared to an adjustable easy chair. The occupant has his choice of either reclining sleepily or sitting up alertly. The posture is inconsequentia because it is virtually certain that no one will notice which attitude has been selected.

"In recent years," he went on, "the rules have been amended to allow Vice Presidents to talk - so long as they are careful to say absolutely noghing . . . In may own case, I found it an onerous choice between the ennui of easy chair existence and pointless verbosity. And so, quick constitutional research revealing no authoritative reason why a Vice President is required to choose between catalepsy and garrulity, I forsook the comfortable code of many of my predecessors, abandoned the unwritten rules



Again, this doesn't mean becoming in volved in meaningless public relations routines of "major assisgnments" and "vital roles." It means simply working conscientiously and soberly at the job of understudy Eugene McCarthy, who back in 1964 thought he might become Lyndon Johnson's Vice President, had some eminently sensible things to say about the office much later Writing in the October 1970 issue of McCall's, Mr. McCarthy argued, with his customary style and wit, that "a Vice President should be treated much as a crown prince is treated in a monarchy. He should e trained in the arts of government. He should not be used in temporary and transient affairs of the government. He should be

protected from partisan strife. "The holder of that office should use it so as to make the office more honorable and to make himself respected by the people . . . to stand by as a potential President of the United States in time of emergency is a sufficient burden in itself." - ALAN OTTEN IN THE WALL STREET

Accuse Russia

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS A leading Egyptian political analyst accused the Soviet Union today of violating the 15-year friendship treaty between their countries, while Syria reportedly moved to put an end to anti-Russian activities in its army.

Ishan Abdel Kuddous, editor of Cairo's mass-circulation Akhbar Elyoum, said the Russians broke the treaty by not providing Egypt with the necessary weapons for eliminating traces of Israeli aggression

He said the Soviets did not live up to this commitment nor to other important clauses contained in the treaty. He particularly mentioned

provision seven, pertaining to military cooperation, which he interpreted as committing the Russians to supply Egypt with sufficient arms to regain Israelioccupied Sinai Abdel Kuddous said the Soviets

failed to observe another provision in the treaty by not consulting with Egypt on the outcome of their May summit with President Nivon

"Cairo viewed this summit as a threat to peace for Egypt because it put the two superpowers on one side," he said.

He was referring to a provision which said. "In case a situation arises which in the view of the signatories constitutes a threat or violation of peace, they will immediately contact each other to coordinate their position in order to eliminate the threat and restore peace.

Abdel Kuddous said this could also constitute a breach of provision nine which forbids the formation of alliances with other

Assad has been under pressure to follow Egypt's example and expel Russian advisers but he said in an interview published last week he had no intention of doing so.

There are 1,000-2,000 Soviet advisers serving with Syrian army and air force units.

A Cambodian colonel and at least 17 government soldiers were killed and only 20 of Kbal Damrei's 50 defenders escaped when the village was overrun, the high command said. The nearby township of Trapeang Chan was also reported under heavy attack.

The assaults were near the crossing point of Highway 5 and the Communist supply routes from North Vietnam to South Vietnam. Interruption of the flow of rice to Phnom Penh has caused the price of rice to double in Cambodia's capital in the past six weeks-to \$18.60 for 220 pounds.

In the northern part of South Vietnam, Communist gunners shelled Da Nang for the second successive day today, but U.S. helicopter gunships armed with giant searchlights broke up an even bigger attack by knocking out 10 rockets prepared for launching. Only two rockets hit the base and no casualties were reported.

The Saigon command said enemy mortars blew up an ammunition dump at Que Son town. 25 miles south of Da Nang, and 12 children and four adults were wounded by Communist shelling at Duc Pho, 90 miles to the South.

Hanoi's Vietnam news agency said today U.S. warplanes bombed Dong Tru hamlet on the outskirts of Hanoi late Thursday night, killing or wounding 18 per-sons, including 11 children. VNA said it was the second

American air raid on the hamlet in two months. American planes fired rockets at a dike across the hamlet in their first raid June 16 and five persons, including three women, were killed, it added.





'Bonanza' Team Tense As Shooting Resumes

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - It was the first day of shooting on the 14th season of "Bonanza," and the cast and crew were un-

"Nobody said anything at first, which was a mistake." co-star Michael Landon recalls. "You could feel the uneasiness all day.

"Finally at the end of the day, all broke down. That was good. It acted as a catharsis and allowed us to get on with our work." Landon recently finished direc-

ting a two-hour segment of "Bonanza" which will open the new season on Sept. 12. The show is called "Forever," and it's a love story that Landon had written for Blocker.

After Blocker's death, Landon patterned the script to fit himself as Little Joe. It's a bittersweet mixture of love, marriage and tragedy, with Bonnie Bedelia playing the Cartwright bride.


