Next to the personal image appeal of the candidate himself, there is nothing so important to the atmosphere of a campaign as the identity of the friends and enemies the candidate can claim.



#### A Peace Formula

It is, of course, perfectly obvious that Henry Kissinger and Le Duc Tho would not have flown all the way from Paris to Saigor and Hanoi respectively unless somethin nteresting had come out of the talks i

You go from Paris to Saigon and Hanoi i he gap between the rival positions in Paris as narrowed by enough to be worth repor ing to the people who will be most affected if that gap is bridged by some formula which he negotiators have been seeking.

The two negotiators are, properly, being most discreet about the formula they are presenting, or promoting, in Saigon and lanoi but there is no great secret about its

A formula must, to be successful, reflect military realities. The military realities are that the armies of Hanoi are unable to score a decisive military victory in the South, but the armies of Saigon are equally unable to expel their enemies from the South. This is a stalemate which cannot be broken either by the remarkable will to victory of the Hano soldiers or by the enormous weight of American bombs backing Saigon's troops.

Not only is it a stalemate now. It is also a stalemate which can be sustained by the two sides indefinitely. The bombing has not prevented the Hanoi armies from keeping the field and keeping up the pressure Indeed, they are deployed now for still another offensive on a board front. There is anxiety in the Pentagon. But so long as American air sea power continues to back up the Saigon armies they seem to be able to hold and repel the major enemy offensives Saigon holds the cities even though Hanoi holds much of the hinterland.

There is a formula implied by this which has been explored and discussed among the diplomats since the outlines of the milita stalemate first emerged way back in 1968 The talk then was of a "standstill cease fire." It meant that everyone would stop shooting and stay where they would be at that moment. It would mean the Viet Conin control of much of the countryside, bu Saigon in control of the cities and the connecting main highways. The two would work out a modus vivendi from there.

Now the talk is of a two-tiered government in South Vietnam; one for the areas held now by the Thieu government and the other for those held by the Viet Cong. The two would then proceed to try to work out a formula for holding a national election.

It is taken for granted among the diplomats that such a formula would include representation for the National Liberation Front in both government and in arrangements for elections. It is als assumed that President Thieu will step aside a month, at least before elections are held.

These features of a settlement have long been visible and available. The only serious question is whether Hanoi finds them less unattractive than going on with the war effort. If they buy now - it will be a welcome surprise at the White House. -

Homosexual friends of Woitowicz came to visit him at the bank and kissed him as armed with a rifle and a machine he stood in the doorway while a crowd of hundreds of onlookers

> About 11 p.m. the gunmen go hungry and asked FBI agents to go for pizzas and soda. When they returned, the agents sampled the food before leaving it in the doorway, apparently at the gunmen's directions.
