

With education costs climbing n the idea of charging fees of one kind or another to public school students. But tuition, at least, ha usually been ruled out because of the requirement that education should be free. Lesser fees, too, have been reected by the courts more often

than not. In another case, a school board tried to charge pupils for their textbooks. The board's theory was that "free" education referred merely to the school building and the teachers - not to However, the court held this ce unconstitutional also, saying that books are an integral part of the educational process. The judge

commented: "No education of any value is possible without school books." Nevertheless, another school board did succeed in collecting a textbook deposit from its students, This time, the plan had two features that made it more palatable: 1) the deposit was waived for any student who could not pay it; 2) the deposit was refunded at



A. No. Only people 65 and older are eligible for Medicare. Q. I recently applied for monthly Social Security disability benefits. Do I need to have a new special medical examination before my application is

A. Not usually. In most cases a disability determination is based on reports from your attending physician and hospitals where you have received treatment lowever, additional medical evidence sometimes may be necessary before a decision can be made. Then, a person may be requested to have an additional medical examination, at no cos

Q. I have been getting monthly Social Security disability for a little over a year. Next year I will be 65. Will my disability benefits increase then? A. No. When you reach 65, your

disability benefits are changed over to retirement benefits. Bu the amount you receive each month will remain the same. Q. How old does a disabled worker have to be to receive Social Security monthly disability

A. There is no minimum age but a minimum work period under Social Security is required to be eligible for disability insurance benefits. If a person becomes disabled before 24, he needs credit for 11/2 years of work during the 3 years just before his disability began. If his disability starts between 24 and 31, he needs work credits for half the time after 21 and before he became disabled. If a worker pecomes disabled after 31, he needs credit for at least five years of work in the 10 years before the start of the disability.

Q. I was hurt recently in an been told that I'll be off work more than a year. I heard about disability payments from 55 and also something about a six-month waiting period. Should I wait six months before applying?
A. No. Although Social Security

cannot pay disability insurance benefits until the seventh month after the month in which a worker became disabled, you should not wait six months to apply. Apply immediately, so your claim can be processed. Then, if you are found eligible for benefits, your first monthly check



School Enrollment In Manchester to **Stay About Same**

Projections are that the school system enrollment for the start of the 1972-73 school year will not increase, by more than one or two per cent, the 10,032 enrollment at the close of school in June, according to Wilson E. Deakin Jr., assistant superintendent of schools for personnel.

He said that the drop of about 100 in the kindergarten enrollment last year is expected to carry over into the primary level of the elementary schools. At the same time, he added, there will be a rather large increase at the junior high level and a smaller increase in the senior high.

If Lincoln School is closed-and a second hearing was held by the Board of Education with the Lincoln PTA Monday night-Deakin said that transfers will result in the following projected net increases at these elementary schools: Nathan Hale (78), Keeney (74), Bowers (41), Washington (35), Waddell (40), Robertson (32), Verplanck (17), and Bentley (7). Parents of children transferring from Lincoln were notified

Washington, late in the week. Elementary school teachers were reduced by 13, Deakin said, but this figure was balanced by additions of two teachers at each of Bennet and Illing Junior High Schools, four at Manchester High School, and five for learning disabilities

lassrooms on the second floor of the addition, which will be in use for the first time, and which will contain a cafeteria, titchen, gymnasium, and locker rooms on the first floor. Opening this addition will complete renovations and additions Keeney, Robertson, and Nathan Hale, approved on a \$1,996,000 referendum by the voters in November 1970. The Keeney and Robertson wings opened for instruction last spring. George F. Bradlau, assistant superintendent of schools for curriculum and instruction, said that the following instructional services will go into effect in September: An additional language resource room for younger language disabled children at Bentley, comparable to one for older children at Bowers; another class for perceptually handicapped children at Waddell comparable to one already established at Bentley; and a second levelopmental kindergarten at Keeney.

In addition, Bradlau said, three staff positions have been created to instruct the learning disabled child at the junior high level, two at Bennet and one at Illing. Formerly, he added, instruction was provided at these schools through the tutoring program, so the cost of professional personnel will be largely a ansfer of accounts.

This summer, 56 teachers have been involved in curriculum writing projects at all levels. As a result of one, 14 of the Bennet staff will be employed in team teaching this year. The number ncludes the four teachers who initiated the approach last year. Bradlau said that he feels the team teaching project is one of four that will have the greatest influence on the school system in the future. The others are work on diagnostic mathematics tests, reading skills records, and the self-contained classroom and media center at Buckley School.

In all, 10,000 copies of the five volumes of materials prepared by the staff of the Center for Environmental Education at the Oak Grove Natural Science Four changes have occurred among administrative personne

MAJOR GRID RULE CHANGES

The NCAA Football Rules Committee during its recent meeting continued its campaign to modify the present rules and institute new ones in order to make the game safer for the players and more spectacular for the spectators. That's the feeling expressed by Elwood Geiges, assistant to the commissioner in the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

The following are some of the major changes for the 1972 season 1. Six officials are now permitted in order to more efficiently cover areas now demanded by the increasing open deployment of players on offense. 2. After an invalid or illegal signal for a fair catch, the ball i

declared dead where caught. 3. A substitute must enter the field directly from his team area. A A free kick which strikes the ground in the end zone untouched by the receiving team is a touchback. 5. The mandatory maximum length of shoe cleats has been educed to one-half inch.

6. Striking an opponent's head, neck, or face with an extended prearm elbow, locked hands or the heel, back or side of the open 7. Penalties for fouls committed by the team not in possession of he ball behind the spot where the ball is declared dead will be

enforced from the dead ball spot. Minor changes and alterations include A. Officials'signals: For blocking below the waist a chopping motion in front of leg, a tipping of the hands indicates a partial deflection of the ball by defenders on kicks and forward passes, backing forearm with hand for personal fouls, grasping and pulling down waist for holding.

B. Flags or pylons must be placed at the eight intersections of the sidelines with the goal lines and end lines. C. A legal fair catch is declared dead where caught, not where

D. If a number on a player's jersey become illegible, his team is charged with a time out unless the jersey is changed within the 25 second interval. Otherwise, the player may leave the game to avoid E. If an obviously injured player cannot leave the field under his own power, the time out is charged to the referee. However, such a player must be removed from the game for at least one play.

F. A player who has been in the game on the previous down may request a time out without being within 15 yards of the ball when it G. The goal line is a vertical plane when the ball is in possession or touched. The restraining line on free kicks is a vertical plane when the ball is in possession or touched.

sweet basil, as you see it in the photograph, permeates the air of my kitchen. Nearby, is a basket of perfect tomatoes. These two he graceful, dark green herb, beautiful enough to use in a table enterpiece, and the dark red vegetable have a natural affinity for each other - both in color contrast and in flavor. Basil (ocimum basilicum) is a

native of India. Many Hindus grow the plants in their bomes where it is thought to purify the air and bless the household. The plant is often dedicated to the Hindu gods Krishna and Vishnu and is carried to the funeral pyres as an aid in entering heaven. Basil has been used as a couring herb with the gentleman earing a sprig in his hat to denote his feelings for the young lady. If the lady held a bit of basil n her hand, it was a mighty good

While basil has been looked upon kindly by most peoples, the Greeks used it to represent overty and disgrace which I do ot understand. The Greek word or the plant is basilikon, which is neuter for basilikas, meaning oval. Basil was used as a roya nedicine and is sometimes called herbe royale in French.

There are some 50-60 varieties basil-one, a lemon-scented bushy type, another smells like arragon, still another has the odor of fennel. We refer to the common or sweet basil. It grows best in a hot, dry climate so it should be planted in a sunny corner of the garden.

Italians are great users of basil. They have been growing tomatoes since 1550 and are supposedly the first Europeans to eat this vegetable. If you look on a can of Italian tomatoes, it will say poma d'oro which means gold apple as the early varieties were vellow. 

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

Room For Vision, Too

With Senator Barry Goldwater himself eading the way, the Republican National Convention opened its business in an obviou belief that the Republican party today fine itself confronted with a situation exactly parallel to that good fortune the Democrats possessed, back in 1964, when Goldwater was the Republican nominee.

Then the Democrats wasted no time in telling the Republicans that Goldwater was an extremist who had stolen the mantle from their party. They offered the hand of welcome to Republicans who found they couldn't go along with Goldwater. They were full of late-blooming praise for other Republicans who seemed, in contrast to that wild man, Goldwater, statesmen and heroes. And, whether or not the Democratic strategies had anything to do with it, their expectations came true. There was the terrible split in the Republican party. There was the landslide victory for Lyndon Johnson. the man who could be trusted not to bomb North Vietnam.

Conceivably-indeed, most probably, the Republican expectations dramatized by their themes as this convention opened will be realized during the present campaign and at the polls next Nov. 7. The chances are that as many Democrats

may feel as reluctant about McGovern as 1964 Republicans did about Goldwater. The hances are that the business of label McGovern the wild man who might beg for peace and pointing to the incumbent as the man we can trust to bomb North Vietnam as much as it needs to be bombed will prove effective, perhaps to landslide proportions, with the voters. If there's anything fair in politics, it is just as fair for the Republicans

o capitalize on this present kind of oppor tunity as it was for the Democrats to exploit he Goldwater candidacy in 1964. Yet we find it easy to imagine a good Republican sitting through that opening evening of political diatribe with a feeling of

ppointment and deprivation. He would have been a Republican who had happened to read an editorial in that morning's Wall Street Journal. The editorial was titled "The Missing Vision," and it was a moving, affectionate appeal to the higher potentialities of a political party!

"Historical patterns suggest," the Wall Street Journal began its editorial, "that the Republicans have a chance to dominate no only the coming election but the coming era-Yet watching them gather in Miami Beach it's difficult to imagine them setting the political tone of the next generation. In an enduring elite one would expect more stature, and in particular, more vision." Perhaps, the editorial said later, the complaint about vision is unfair, because the Republicans "are after all a conservative party. They do not claim to offer lasting visions with which to remake the order of things. Instead their claim is superior competence....Even so there are certain minimums a respectable elite ought to observe. The 'Watergate Caper' in which men with Republican connections were caught with electronic eavesdropping equipment in Democratic headquarters, is especially distressing....At the same time, the Republican inner sanctums have by and

large proved inhospitable to men of vision and intellect. Even a conservative administration needs a broader intellectual input than the Nixon administration seems to be receiving. State Reneges On Obligations

It is no more fiscally or morally responsible for the state to welsh on its contracts with and obligations to municipalities than it is for the state to welsh on its agreements with and obligations to its own employes. There's a difference, though. When the state doesn't come through with money it should pay a city or town, the effect is spread among all the taxpayers of that city or town. But when the state reneges on its obligations to employes, the action penalizes the individual employe and his family.

The latest instance of the state administration denying to employes what is due them involves some 1,400 individuals, most of them in lower paying jobs such as clerks and custodians, and most of them with from 12 to 20 years of service to the state. But whether 1,400, 140 or a single individual is involved, it's wrong. And whether the state is threatening to take \$300, \$3 or 30

cents from these employes, it's wrong. The 1972 legislature turned down requests by state employes for general increases in the salary schedule within the 5.5 per cent guidelines set by the federal pay

The legislature did grant a flat-increase of \$300 per year for each state employe exclusive of those whose pay is stipulated by statute. It provided a \$9 million sppropriation to cover these increases.

But the state personnel department has told heads of all state agencies not to grant the increases to those employes who a few years ago were moved one notch above the maximum they had already reached because the new pay scale then put into effect did not do justice to them. Now the state wants to do an unjustice to

All pools, containing a least 24 inches of water must have adequate enclosures surrounding the pool area, to make the pool inaccessible to children. He notes that the regulation applies equally to above-ground or in-ground pools, and further cautions that the flip-up type ladders on above-ground pools are not sufficient to satisfy the requirements of the statute. Hutchinson says he has noted several violations in the town and urges that these be corrected

Coastal Blazes Calmed

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Fire fighters aided by cooler emperatures and lessening winds worked today to stem the searing march of four fires that have blackened more than 21,000 acres of brush and timber lands

About 371 fire fighters Thursday night checked a 1,760acre blaze which flared Thursday n Northern California's Sonoma County and destroyed eight homes, 18 other structures and 10 A spokesman for the state Divi-

sion of Forestry said winds which had gusted to 30 miles an hour died down long enough Thursday night to allow a quickly cut fire line to deter the flames from spreading to other structures in the Healdsburg area. While the fire had consumed mostly brush land, a few groves of California's famed redwood

trees fell victim to the blaze. A stubborn four-day-old fire on inaccessible terrain in Ventura County north of Los Angeles continued to burn out of control. despite the efforts of nearly 2,000 men from several Western states. helicopters and a fleet of ground tankers and bulldozers were being used to fight the fire. The U.S. Forest Service said it could not estimate how long it would take to contain the 16,000acre fire. "We're a long way from containment," a spokesman said. Residents of the small community of Ojai were endangered

for a time Thursday as the windwhipped flames forged to within seven miles of the town's perimeter. However, a Forest Service spokesman said today that Ojai no longer was considered in a danger zone. He said crews worked through the night to build a fire line but by daybreak had completed only five of the 24 miles necessary to harness the fire. Most of the work had to be done by hand due to the rugged terrain, he added.
