Bombs Scour Enemy

fighter-bombers destroyed or damaged more than 170 buildings Sunday at military camps in the heaviest raids on the Hanoi-Haiphong area in 41/2 years, the U.S. Command announced today.

The command said that Air Force and Navy jets attacked 20 different targets in the Hanoi-Haiphong area, including three army barracks, the northeast rail line to China, railroad yards, supply barges, storage and fuel depots, and antiaircraft missile and artillery batteries.

It was the heaviest attack in the Hanoi-Haiphong area since March 1968, U.S. officials said. North Vietnam claimed five American jets were shot down and some pilots captured. The U.S. Command made no mention of any plane losses.

Among the raids Sunday was the first attack of the war on the Xom Bai army barracks 37 miles northwest of Hanoi. Pilots said their bombs destroyed 13 barracks and 10 storage and support buildings, and damaged another 46 buildings.

'The military complex provides a barracks for North Vietnamese troops in the Viet Tri area awaiting transportation south," the Air Force said.

The Xuan Mai military trainingcomplex 17 miles southwest of Hanoi was attacked for the second time this year. The Air Force said reconnaissance photographs showed 73 buildings destroyed and 32 damaged, along with a large number of vehicles destroyed or damaged.

Navy pilots from the carrier America attacked the Hai Dong Barracks West, 23 miles northwest of Haiphong, and reported they left it in flames after two big explosions.

Air Force Phantoms using 2.000-pound laser bombs destroyed two railroad bridges on the northeast rail line, the Air Force said. But other sources reported that in attacks on two other bridges the so-called "smart" bombs were off target

and the rail approaches rather than the spans were cut.

Air Force spokesmen said all the bridges had been attacked before but the North Vietnamese had rebuilt them.

The U.S. Command confirmed a report from Washington that a Chinese minesweeper had slipped into Haiphong harbor despite the U.S. minefield laid last May. The Command said the sweeper has been in Haiphong about a week and is tied up next to a Chinese freighter. It said it was "not aware that any mines have been swept," and the Navy said the minesweeper had not attempted any clearing operations yet.

The Command said it had planted new mines "at various locations to cover areas not previously seeded." It would not elaborate, but other sources indicated these locations included Haiphong, other ports and thousands of miles of inland waterways.

The Navy said that the Chinese minesweeper was the only ship that had slipped into Haiphong, and none of the 27 ships there when the harbor was mined had

WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite his co-pilot's warnings, the pilot of an airliner intentionally descended below a permissible altitude and the jet crashed on an instrument approach to fog-shrouded New Haven airport last June, the National Transportation Safety Board said Sunday.

With the exception of the captain, who sustained fatal injuries upon impact, everyone aboard this flight could have survived if rapid egress from the fire area had been possible or if flame propagation had been retarded," he board's accident report said.

GOP Calls McGovern Cash Count

WASHINGTON (AP) - Saying the results could be "very revealing." President Nixon's finance committee has asked congressional investigators to audit Sen. George McGovern's fundraising records as closely as they did the Republicans

There must be no reluctance on the part of the General Accounting Office to pursue as vigorously with Sen. McGovern's staff the kind of investigation it has with the Finance Committee," committee chairman Maurice Stans said Sunday.

"We will anticipate a report equally extensive." he said, adding that the GOP has "reason to believe (the Democratic accounts) will be very revealing."

The former Commerce secretary's four-page statement. distribued by Nixon's official Committee for the Re-election of the President, charged that the GAO report was a sloppy. politically motivated job.

"It is apparent that the strong and persistent pressures placed on the GAO by Democratic members of the Congress are responsible to a high degree for the inaccuracies in the report." Stans said. "It is indeed unfortunate that McGovern campaign operatives using the offices of sympathetic Democratic senators unduly pressured the agency charged with unbiased administration of the new Federal Election Law.

John Connally, former Treasury secretary who's heading up the Democrats for Nixon drive, said on ABC's Issues and Answers program that the GAO report is a "nettlesome thing."

A Dream Of A Decent Campaign

Some day, perhaps, there will be granted to us. from some mysterious dispensation from on high, an order of political campaigning which consists of something more impressive than a process of having each candidate go to each special group with his own best version of what that special group most wants to hear.

Some day, perhaps, but not now.

President Nixon, for all he is now the man of peace, cannot resist going to the veterans organizations with the same kind of elemental jingoism he specialized in before he went to Peking or brought troops home from a battle they had not won. And who can blame President Nixon for doing this, when he is preceded, on the same platforms, by a Senator McGovern who has obviously been scratching around to find promises and reinterpretations of his own positions which will mollify the hostility he expects to find?

Senator McGovern, for his part, goes to a convention of that teacher's union which has pioneered in the use of the strike, and, scrunching around with obvious pleasure in a promise he knows President Nixon is not likely to match, pronounces his own approval of the strike as a weapon for teachers. The convention of the American Federation of Teachers rewards him with an endorse-

Too much of the campaign that lies ahead is going to show the candidates for the highest office in this land in a continuation of such tactics-going to one special group after another with the special promise supposed to appeal to that group's special interests.

And out of such promising both candidates will be pretending - even, the self-hypnosis in political campaigning being what it is, believing - they are building a basis not only for their own victory at the polls, but for running the nation.

Appeal to enough special interests, echo enough prejudices, twist, convincingly, in enough different directions, and you can, the pragmatic theory seems to be, get yourself

We disagree. We think the only guaranteed result from such a brand of campaigning is a prolonged insult to the intelligence and taste of the American people.

We are not morons. We have to prove it that we are not morons - when we go to the polls and somehow manage to cut through what the candidates have been telling us.

Once, in what seems a long time ago, there was a presidential campaign which, at the very top at least, showed more respect for us, the people

That was the campaign in which Adlai Stevenson promised to talk sense to the American people, and did accomplish such feats as going to a yeterans organization convention and making the same kind of speech he would have made to a peace group. And it was the campaign in which Dwight Eisenhower, although less gifted and facile in tongue than his opponent, went before the people in the same spirit he later served them-a spirit of making us a whole, and healthy, society rather than a campaign

In dreaming of a decent political cam paign, it seems more profitable to turn back, to 1952, than forward.

for them, and, when found, were on the other side of Union Pond. But just as Paddy was preparing for the tedious task of driving them around the shore and back to home. the pigs alarmed him and seemed to seal their own doom by plunging into Union Pond and starting to swim their way home.

The reason for alarm was this: pigs happen to be equipped with sharp-pointed hooves. Their natural swimming stroke brings these sharp hooves in close against their own flanks. The normal expectation, then, was that pigs attempting as long a swim as that across Union Pond would slash themselves to death long before they reached that other shore.

But Paddy's pigs, to everybody's amazement and rejoicing, completed the journey safely, and clambered up the other bank, where an admiring gathering of the populace was cheering them on, without a single scratch to show for their exploit. Except for the fact that some North End bacon, that following winter, seemed to have a particular richness of flavor, there was no known aftermath.

How had the miraculous exploit been accomplished? The explanation was visible on the bristles of the triumphant pigs. Their hides had, upon entrance into the waters of that old time Union Pond, been immediately coated with such a heavy film of greasy industrial waste and general pollution that the sharp hooves of the pigs had, with each stroke, slipped harmlessly off the belly. On Move

By JOHN CUNNIFF NEW YORK (AP) - If you are on the road Labor Day weekend, a likely possibility, you might obtain the impression that some Americans are not content to have a mere second bome but that they must have one that

That impression precisely describes the feelings of recreation vehicle owners. There are about four million RVs on the road. More than half a million join the ranks each year. They are rowing in size also. And they are eing used year-round. That old saying that home is where the heart is seems to be developing a modern version: Home is where your wheels are.

This life style is catching on so suddenly that some of the ousiness community can't seem to understand it. In Wall Street, for example, analysts who otherwise are adept at making distinctions continue to confuse recreational vehicles with mobile homes when, in fact, the two industries are quite dis-

Mobile homes are rarely seen on the road. They do have wheels and they can be towed, but generally their mobility is restricted to a trip from the dealer to a permanent site, where they are attached to a foundation. Broadly speaking, that leaves most of the other housing accommodations being towed or driven or hauled along the turnpikes in the RV category, which means they are generally travel trailers, camper trailers, truck campers, pickup covers or motor homes. Fred Goldberger, financial vice president of Odyssey, Inc., a manufacturer, complains: 'Analysts often don't understand the distinction and so when something bad happens in mobile homes it hurts RV shares too." Even the big automotive manufacturers, which stand to be among the biggest gainers from the boom, were surprised a year

or so ago when they noticed a sudden rise in demand for pickup trucks to haul trailers and hold camper bodies. In 1970, General Motors sold 560,000 pickup trucks. In 1971 the figure rose to 680,000 units and then soared to 540,000 in only the first six months of 1972. Catching on, some automotive dealers now sell RVs as well.

To call some of these vehicles home is, as even a fleeting glance will show, a bit of an overstatement. But it is no exaggeration for others, which have modern appliances and comforts, and their number is growing.

"A lot of these people don't miss a thing in their rolling homes," says one manufacturer. "Why they have their TV sets, air conditioning, modern appliance

"They're not on the road to rough it or to get away from modern society. They take all the comforts with them. They might spend Saturday evening watching
"All In The Family" on a por-table TV in air-conditioned com-fort."

McGovern To Bare Reforms

NEW YORK (AP) Democratic presidential can-didate George McGovern was to inveil his second welfare reform plan of the year today in a move esigned to increase his support among middle-income Americans and rid him of a campaign em-

The South Dakota senator, who has been plagued for three months by attacks on his original proposal, planned to disclose the revised version before a poten tially critical audience of Wall Street investors—the New York Society of Security Analysts. McGovern's new plan was expected to be closer than his first to a proposal by President Nixon


It was expected to differ chiefly from the original plan by taking more from the wealthy and les from the middle income brackets to pay the bill for the proposed new welfare system. McGovern's first plan came

under heavy criticism for its socalled break-even point of \$12,-000. It would have lowered taxes for those making under that amount but raised them for persons making more than \$12,000. The new plan was widely expected to include a higher breakeven figure.

The new plan also was ex pected to retain McGovern's proposal of a guaranteed annual income of \$1,000 per person but with some variations. There has been speculation that the figure would fluctuate some, depending on age and marital status. There also has been specula tion that families with more than two children would receive less than \$1,000 for each additiona

McGovern earlier proposed scrapping the present welfare system and personal income tax exemptions and substituting a guaranteed annual income for persons below the poverty line and tax credits for those above. The program would be financed by closing tax loopholes that benefit industry and the spending. McGovern claimed the new tax

laws, which he said would go hand-in-glove with the welfare system revisions, would benefit


