## **Fischer** Is Chess Champion

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP)- Bobby Fischer won his own Olympics today. The American challenger captured the world chess championship when Boris Spassky of Russia telephoned his resignation in the 21st game, which had been adjourned overnight.

Max Euwe, president of the International Chess Federation, said Spassky had telephoned Lothar Schmid, match referee, shortly before the game was to resume with Spassky in a probable losing position.

It is the first time an American has ever held the title, although Paul Charles Morphy of New Orleans, who lived from 1837 to 1884, dominated play in the 1850s and came to be known as unofficial world champion

The title match here had a limit of 24 games. Today's victory gave Fischer 121/2 points to Spassky's 81/2. Fischer won seven games, each worth a point. Spassky took three, including a forfeit-thus he actually won only one out of 10 games at the playing board. Each of 11 draws was worth half a point to each contestant.

Fischer, who is 29, is from Brooklyn. He stood to win \$156,-000 in prize money, counting a bonus put up by a British fan. He will reap further thousands in book royalties and other fees before he has to defend his title

Spassky, who is 35, is to receive about \$100,000 as runnerup. He had won the title in 1969 from Tigran Petrosian, a fellow Russian-indeed Russians have almost monopolized title play most of this century.



# Dollar On Summit Agenda

HONOLULU (AP) - President Nixon and Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka wind up their mid-Pacific summit today, reaching accord on a one-shot Japanese effort to ease the plight

The agreement, to be spelled out in a joint communique, envisions Japanese orders for an extra \$1 billion-plus of American goods, with the bulk to be paid for in advance.

American officials had hoped to leave Honolulu with a similarly specific meeting of the minds on longer-range solutions to a chronic and growing deficit in U.S. trade dealings with Japan. Such matters, however, are being left largely to future negotiations.

Nixon and Tanaka were said to have spent a third of their time in private talks Thursday discussing trade matters. Sitting in on their initial discussion were Henry A. Kissinger, the President's foreign policy adviser, and Nobuhiko Ushiba, Japan's ambassador to Washington.

While they met at the Kuilima hotel on Oahu's north shore, Secretary of State William P. Rogers and Japanese Foreign Minister Masayoshi Ohira presided at a companion conference of other officials from the two countries. They were joined for an hour by Nixon and Tanaka before all summit participants took a break prior to an evening working dinner at the hotel.

After the dinner American sources disclosed that Tanaka has States mainland. He may go to Washington early next year.

The dinner lasted two hours and in what was described as a "private and very informal toast," Nixon paid tribute to Tanaka in terms of baseball - a sport popular in Japan.

Likening the new Japanese prime minister to a pitcher, Nixon said he and his team are "in the big league," adding, "He has all the pitches. He has a fastball, a curve, a slider and a knuckler.

An American official who was present said Tanaka talked of handling problems in a "family spirit" at the summit and declared all difficulties between the two nations could be solved by frank and constructive talks. WASHINGTON (AP) - Pentagon officials say the peak of North Vietnam's rainy season has passed without any serious flooding in the heavily populated, rice-producing Red River delta

Administration authorities have been worried about a possible recurrence of North Vietnam's traditional flood problem this year because, they said, Hanoi and anti-war critics would blame it on alleged U.S. bombing of dikes and dams.

The United States has denied repeatedly that its bombers aim at North Vietnam's dike system. although it has acknowledged some minor damage to the system in the course of attacks on nearby military targets.

One senior defense official

reported "fair confidence that there won't be any major flooding this year." He said the rains usually come down heaviest in August and ease off in

September. The official said there have been a few minor breaches in dikes this month but claimed this happens almost every year because of the pressure of high

State Department officials were not ready yet to rule out the danger of major flooding in North Vietnam this year. They were concerned about the possible effects of a big storm now over that country.

Last year, before the United States resumed sustained bombing of North Vietnam, abnormally heavy rains in July and

August brought severe flooding which crested in the last 10 days of August

The floods destroyed about 10 per cent of North Vietnam's rice crop, forcing the Hanoi government to dig into reserve food stocks, U.S. analysts have estimated.

Under the best of conditions, North Vietnam never has produced enough food. It has relied for years on imports, principally from Russia, to make up

The U.S. mine blockade of North Vietnamese ports has cut off much of the country's food imports, but defense officials say Communist China/is filling some of the gap by sending rice into

Manchester Democratic leaders today claimed they would have great trouble getting the quorum they will need tomorrow morning to elect delegates to multi-town district conventions as the

Democrats generally are opposed to the current redistricting plan which they regard as Republican ger-rrymandering. It is being challenged in court now.

Democratic Registrar of Voters Herbert Stevenson said the problem for his party is compounded by binding rules which require it to elect its delegates by quorum (50 per cent) of the town committee members from within each of the districts involved.

Delegates must be named for two assembly districts and for two state senatorial districts. The assembly districts are ninth, which Manchester shares with East Hartford and the l4th, which Manchester shares with South

The state senatorial districts are the 3rd, which Manchester shares with East Hartford, and the 4th, which it shares with East Windsor, South Windsor, Bolton, Hebron, Andover, Coventry, and Glastonbury.

Stevenson said the two assembly districts involved do not lie wholly within the state senatorial districts, so the committee members needed for the various quorums would not all be the same people

## Job Ranks Growing

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Labor Department today reported a substantial rise in the nation's employment, boosting the total number of Americans with jobs to 83.5 million.

At the same time, the unemployment rate rose from 5.5 to 5.6 per cent, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said.

The report said actual employment rose 61,000. But on a seasonally adjusted basis the bureau figured the rise at nearly 300,000 and called it a continuation of strong growth evidence

since the middle of last year. The number of unemployed actually fell 316,000 but since it normally drops more in August the bureau figured the slight rise in the unemployment rate on a

seasonally adjusted basis. The bureau also reported average wages of some 50 million rank-and-file workers rose two cents an hour to \$3.64 and \$1.12 per week to \$137.23.

In the past year, the report said, average pay has risen \$8.20, or 6.4 per cent per week. Living costs have risen three per cent over the same period.

The bureau said the nation's

total employment has increased by 2.6 million in the past year. Virtually all of the August rise

in jobs was among women working part-time, the report said. Over the past year, the rise in the number of job holders included 1.1 million men, million women and 500,000 teen-

The total unemployed included 1,738,000 men with a jobless rate of 3.9 per-cent; 1,772,000 women for a rate of 5.5 per cent; and 1,347,000 teen-agers for a rate of 16.9 per cent, the bureau said.

In a racial breakdown, the bureau said the jobless rate for white workers edged up from 5.0 to 5.1 per cent with a total of 3,894,000 while the unemployment rate for other races-mostly blacks edged down from 9.9 to 9.7 per cent with a total of 963,-

Both employment and unemployment can go up at the same time if the rise in the labor force is greater than the increase in employment In August, the labor force rose

#### First The Spirit, Then The Dollars

its publishers, for its readers.

The United States, with a formal memorandum to all its fellow members in the United Nations, has now served notice of its intention to press for a reduction in the scale of the financial support the United States is expected to give the world organiza-

The United States argument is based on one point which is logical enough. For one particular member of the world organization to contribute more than its proper statistical share of the financial support for that organization is, our argument claims, a situation unhealthy in principle, and one the organization itself should be anxious to-

Although the point is logical, the timing with which it has been raised and made is obviously based on feeling.

When our own disproportionate contributions to the financial welfare of the United Nations were first set up, we, as a nation, strongly believed in the necessity of the United Nations and were glad to be able, from our strong belief and our position as the world's richest nation, to do a little more than our share.

Today, our enthusiasm for the United Nations has dwindled, our belief in it has waned, and so we begin to haggle about our own financial support of it.

Sadly, the net effect of this will probably be to accent the decline of the United Nations prestige in the world, at a time when a policy of great vision might be directed toward some last-ditch effort to revive the original dream and purpose and the early effectiveness of the United Nations.

Still more sadly, however, the key element in the relationship betweenthe United States and the United Nations does not come down to any paltry matter of dollars - at the most, the calculators say, something like \$1.20 a year per American. We denied the United Nations our respect

long before it occurred to us to begin watching the amount of our dues. We resigned form the spirit of the club

before we began worrying about what it

We began to circumvent and ignore its rules and regulations about the conduct of nations and the conduct of world affairs before we began to pay much attention to the dollar loyalty we were still giving it.

From President Kennedy on through President Nixon, our national policy has cut itself loose from what could have been the United Nations way of resolving conflict and has, instead, reverted to its own way of trying to stabilize the world with its own

And we are currently in the midst of a pattern of Nixon summitry which gives the illusion, at least, and perhaps, who knows, some real hope that the big powers can agree how to run the world without bothering the United Nations.

For a long time it used to be said that if we didn't have the United Nations, somebody would have to invent it. Perhaps the word

much the same, with the difference that now, a quarter century later, hardly anybody realizes there is any kind of emergency. involved. Perhaps there isn't.

### Flower Of The Month

The early goldenrods may appear during the dog days of August, but their announcement is one of September.

They say, the early varieties scattered here and there among the purples and pinks and blues of the summer pastures, that the month is coming which will be almost all goldenrod, one wonderful concentration of purest yellow distilled from sunshine itself. There have to be other blooms which seem

perfectly suited to their own time of year, and there need be no final choice among them. The apple blossom can be left supreme in May, the rose in June, that greatest and most durable servant of summer beauty, the zinnia, in July, all without quarrel with the perfect suitability of the goldenrod to the month of September. The goldenrod takes that month, with its increasing slant of a sun which daily becomes more bearable and precious, with its climactic ripeness of all the growth processes, with its sweet sad sentimentality for the fact that all beauty that appears passes and perhaps returns again and wraps it all up in one presentation of a color so pure it seems to speak, for all things and all thoughts and sensations, in a way we all

#### Self-Criticism's Perils

understand in our instincts, even if we never

quite find the right words for it.

The overriding concern-not merely of youth but of large segments of our people-often seems to be a highly individualized self-interest. In the familiar phrase, everyone wants "to do his own thing." Or putting it differently, self assertion seems to be the modern aspiration to be independent of—if not indeed to reject-the familiar disciplines of home, school, church, and community... Perhaps the primary belief of the New

Ethic is that the individual owes little loyalty or obligation to the types of authority I have mentioned, or to their traditional values. We see manifestations of this unanchored individualism in the new mores of our time. We see it, for example, not merely in hostile attitudes toward existing institutions but in excessively tolerant views toward personal conduct: sexual morality, use of drugs, and disobedience of laws believed by the in-

dividual to be unjust. Even the concept of honor is now widely questioned... Leaving random examples, and returning to the broader causes of the alienation of se many young people, I wonder if persistent and often destructive self-criticism is not a cause. It has become increasingly fashionable to question and attack the most basic elements of our society. It is said that religion is irrelevant, our democracy is a sham, the free-enterprise system has failed, and that somehow America has become a society-with unworthy goals and warped

We have always been prone to selfcriticism. Certainly no thoughtful person would wish to mute the type of debate and dissent which have strengthened our democracy.

One might wish, however, for a somewhat better balance and for a higher level of responsibility in the criticism. America, its institutions, and the values of our people deserve a better billing than they often

It would be irrational to say that all of the criticisms of America and its institutions are unfounded. Yet, excessive self-flagellation can weaken-or even destroy-the ties that bind a people together. This, it seems to me, has been happening in this country. #### Dr. Babbidge's Warning

Dr. Homer D. Babbidge, president of the University of Connecticut from 1962 through 1972, told a group of Essex Democrats Monday night that progress of public higher education in Connecticut has come to a half under the administration of Gov. Thomas J. Meskill. Regretfully, we have to agree with that judgement.
Gov. Meskill's austerify budgets and in-

creased tuitions at the state university have curtailed the academic and cultural growth that flourished for a decade at UConn under the direction of Dr. Babbidge during the Dempsey era.

During that period the university became a powerful institution of learning, a center for important research and study, and a source of pride for all Nutmegers. It still had not attained the stature of some of the larger state universities of this nation but it was well headed in that direction

Now this progress has been halted at a time when the ever increasing demands for knowledge make even a modest slowdown in investment in public higher education a major retreat.

One can appreciate the Governor's determination to erase the state budget deficit but his methods are surely open to question Connecticut's fiscal problems must be solved by homest and courageous tax reform...not by borrowing against the "promise of the future" offered our young people through public institutions of higher learning.

The Governor has now had available to him the results of two major studies, both of which have clearly stated that Connecticut needs tax reform and an essential element of that reform must be a graduated state income tax. Meskill, however, has lacked the political resolution to face up to the reality of that situation.

And so the decline and fall of our proud state has begun under the Meskill ad ministration and one of the places where it will be most difficult to reverse this course is in our institutions of higher learning.

applied for amnesty. Hanoi's official Vietnam News Agency said the prisoners, Markham Ligon Gartley and Norris Alphonso Charles, both Navy lieutenants junior grade and Edward Knight Elias, an Air Force major, would be turned over to a U.S. antiwar group. It did not say precisely when or where the release would be

The American group was not identified by name but it was presumed to be the Committee of Liaison with Families of Servicemen detained in North Viet nam. The leaders of the committee, Cora Weiss and David Dellinger, met with the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong peace talks delegation in Paris shrtly before the announcement was

An aide to Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass, said in Washington Friday night that Kennedy was advised the North Vietnamese would release "several American prisoners of war in the near future: He said Kennedy said he

received the information by telephone from a "private source in Paris through whom the North Vietnamese ave communicated previously." He gave no other The Vietnam News Agency announcement declared:

"To express solidarity with the American people who are struggling against the United States' 'dirty war' in Vietnam, the government of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam will hand over the released pilots to a U.S. social organization animated with good will and a desire to bring about an early end to the U.S. war in Vietnam and to help those released not to be used
