

GOP Demands Apology In Watergate Affair

Top Republicans have demanded an apology from Democrats in the wake of it dictments in the Watergate break-in case, but George McGovern and running mat Sargent Shriver have responded with a call for further investigation in the case.

The exchange in the case, becoming increasingly-evident as a presidential campaign issue, came Friday after a federal grand jury indicted seven men_oncharges of breaking into Democratic National Head quarters to steal documents and plant bugging devices.

Meanwhile, an economic a viser to President Nixon, Herbert Stein, responded to McGovern's plans to hold down inflation if he wins the presidency. **Republican National Chairman**

Robert Dole said the indictments in the Watergate case closed the matter as far as Nixon's campaign is concerned and demanded "an apology to the American people from George McGovern and his campaign organization.

"As we knew all along, and as the grand jury has now determined, there is no evidence to ubstantiate any of the wild and

high officials in the Nixon adorganization." Dole said. McGovern has seized on GOP ties to the Watergate affair in his campaign, and vice-presidentia candidate Shriver along with



other Democrats have also hit the case hard.

The indictments came almost three months after five men were arrested June 17 at the break-in of the Democratic headquarters in the Watergate office building n Washington. The seven in dicted included a former White House consultant and two recent employes of Nixon's re-election campaign committee. McGovern said the indictments show the seriousness of the case. "And what now needs to be pursued," he said, "is how it was funded and whether there are

violations there which seem to

Shriver said. 'From what we already know, there must be a continuing investigation and there must be a speedy trial of the seven defendants named today. All of us have a right to all of the facts involved in the Watergate case. No one can be allowed to live above the rule of law because of their connections with high government of ficials-past or present.

Lawrence F. O'Brien McGovern's national campaign director and Democratic nationa chairman at the time of the break-in, said, "We will continue to press for a more thorough explanation of the funding of the crime that led to these indictments. But Republicans saw it another

Clark MacGregor, Nixon's campaign director, said, "Those who have recklessly sought to connec others with the case should publicly apologize for their unfounded charges and formally retract their unsubstantiated accusations.





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Revenue Sharing

Some form of federal revenue sharing with the states and cities is all but a certainty

While the Senate and House bills may vary in the amounts and methods of disbursing the funds; with the election ahead in November it can be safely surmised the conference committee will resolve these differences so that federal largesse can be fully exploited by the Administration and by both Democratic and Republican senators and representatives seeking re-election.

Intended to relieve the increasing burden on property taxpayers, revenue sharing has been long sought by many cities and states.

The present act is a five-year one and in its present form exercises a minimal of restraints upon the recipients as to how it is expended.

The test will be whether the cities and states getting the funds use the money in ways which will benefit the property taxpayer the most.

In most instances this would mean using the funds for non-recurring capital expenditures such as street and highway improvements, new needed office buildings, new schools and equipment, etc., which are now in the main financed by levies upon property which pay off bond issues.

funds an almost "no strings attached" usage by states and cities; it will be up to our state and local leaders and an alert citizenry to use these funds wisely or the Congress will either impose restrictions and red tape or abandon the program

We have no illusions that federal revenue sharing is the panacea local government needs to solve its fiscal problems. The real solution remains, as it always has been, in the area of getting the most in goods and services for every tax dollar local, state or federal.

Federal revenue sharing, unless accompanied by responsible fiscal policies, is no more than a very costly way of buying a suspended sentence. Unless we can restore fiscal integrity to government at all levels, the infusion of \$20 to \$30 billion over the next five years into state and local government, when the federal government is operating in perennial red ink, could become the biggest political raid on the public treasury in our history.

Each of us has a responsibility under revenue sharing to resist the temptation of what might seem to be a windfall. We should remember that whether a tax dollar comes from Manchester, Hartford or Washington, D.C., it is still coming out of our pocketbooks. There is no such thing as a ride in government today

Uganda Invasion Repulsed

Nixon Campaigns for Patriots

President Nixon has made a bid for votes of Italian Americans, praising them for their patriotism, while Sen George McGovern looked for support among West Virginia coal miners today.

Nixon made a surprise appearance at the 12th annual Italian Fall Festival at Mitchellville, Md., Sunday. His daughter, Tricia Cox, originally was to appear, but the President acted as substitute when she couldn't make it.

Nixon drew cheers when he praised the patriotism, hard work and spirit of Italian-Americans. He also toured a nearby nursing home and said elderly Americans should get "the respect they deserve.'

In Logan, W.Va., McGovern charged in a prepared speech that the Nixon administration's enforcement of the 1969 Mine Safety Act "has bordered on gross negligence."

He earlier demanded that Nixon suspend Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz pending an investigation of allegations that big grain corporations were given an advantage in the grain sale to the Soviet Union.

The Democratic candidate for president said Nixon has allowed mine owners and loggers to damage the countryside, and he called for a virtual end to strip mining and for restrictions on clear-cut logging in national forests.

McGovern also urged a \$10 million research program to promote mine safety and a review of all previously denied claims for federal aid for victims of black lung disease.

"We must begin now to end the bloodshed of mine disasters and the scarring of the soil," he said. Democratic vice presidential candidate Sargent Shriver became the latest of the candidates for national office to announce his net worth. He put the figure Sunday at "about \$100,000," which is less than the amounts reported by the other candidates, but presumably does not include the personal wealth

of his wife, Eunice Kennedy Shriver. Previously reported assets of the other candidates were a net worth of \$765,118 for President Nixon, \$271,600 for Sen. McGovern, and \$198,250 for Vice President Spiro Agnew and his

wife. Shriver told listeners at the annual Essex County Sheriff's Picnic at Parsippany, N.J., Sunday that they "never had it so

interested in what's wrong with Nixon but what's right with our program," Shriver said. "We believe America is the greatest country in the world and we intend to keep it that way. But Shriver had difficulty being heard as the wire to the public address system was cut twice. A battery on his helicopter also failed to function as he was to depart, and another battery had to be found.

Rep. Bob Wilson, R-Calif., chairman of the Republican Congressional Committee, predicted that Republicans can take control of Congress if President Nixon receives 60 per cent of the popular vote in November. Wilson said Republicans calculate a 55 per cent Nixon victory could give them control of the Senate, where the GOP needs a net gain of five seats to accomplish this. They would need 41 seats to control the House.
