





WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon Monday moved to increase sharply the flow of oil imports into the United States because lagging production of petroleum products has not kept pace with rising demand.

The chief executive's actions mean imports of all petroleum products could rise from about 7 million barrels a day east of the Rockies to about 2.3 million barrels a day, officials said.

In addition, his actions could almost double the daily rate of imports for No. 2 fuel oil, a product used extensively for home heating in the Northeastern United States.

The changes in the import quotas made by presidential proclamation relate to districts east of the Rocky Mountains. The steps were necessary, said

Office of Emergency Preparedness general counsel Elmer Bennett, to cope with 'immediate short-term re quirements" resulting from a leveling off of production and a marked increase in demand.

Bennett said he could not predict what impact the increased imports would have on prices, but said in response to a question that he thought the action "would be greeted with some enthusiasm" by residents of New England and such states as New York and New Jersey where No. 2 fuel oil is widely used.





If East then returned a diamond, the best defense, West would take the ace of diamonds and lead the nine of clubs. South would ruff with his carefully preserved last trump and reach dummy with the king of

Cleaning Up Our Waterways Although most cities and towns today have primary sewage treatment (a process which screens and settles solid waste and organic matter before the residue is dumped into our waterways) there is a great need for secondary sewage treatment. Without an extensive system of secondary treatment, our rivers and lakes are in danger of being depleted of oxygen, which would mean our waterways eventually would be unable to support marine life. Secondary sewage treatment adds the oxygen which supports micro-organisms that attack and consume organic matter in the sewage. A much more advanced method of water cleaning is tertiary (third stage) treatment.



It becomes apparent that electricity is going to play a vital role in the gigantic task of cleaning up our environment like purifying water; eliminating dust and gases before they are released into the air; and getting rid of the mountains of trash and other wastes all of us create every day. For instance, in a recent one-year period, the U.S. Patent Office granted a total of 595 patents dealing with environmental

For the most part, those patents are ideas for the future But even now, equipment depending on electricity is being ordered and installed at an accelerating rate. Here are some

Solid waste management requires huge facilities to automat-- Ferrous metals are separated from masses of other mate-

Air separation devices sort various materials into piles of

It is now used on a very limited basis, but may someday be

common practice. This additional cleansing requires pumping of waste water through fine filters, and further chemical treatment.

In industry, cooling towers - devices which cool water used for various industrial processes - allow water to be used over and over again. The energy to run the large pumps and motors is almost always electricity.

Clearing The Air

We are all aware of air pollution and the massive effort to solve this problem. Many control devices have already been installed and more will be coming in the future if business, industry and government services are to meet new air-quality standards.

Many of these changes involve electricity.

- The use of electric induction furnaces can substantially reduce the air pollution that's normally associated with metal melting. Furnaces of this type have the added advantage of being able to make greater use of recycled or scrap metal.
- Filtering and scrubbing systems are being installed where burning or processing causes dust, dirt, or gaseous pollutants to enter the atmosphere.
- Another major problem area in air pollution is transportation, especially in urban areas. The use of the internal combustion engine is coming under intense scrutiny. Among the solutions being investigated are electric masstransportation and, also, the development of individual nonpolluting electric cars, trucks, and delivery vans.

At Northeast Utilities we're doing our best to make sure there'll be enough electricity - not just to clean up the environment, but to support a healthy economy and the normal growth of population, business, and industry as well.

In addition, we're trying in many ways to reduce the effects of our own facilities on the environment, and participating in research aimed at overcoming environmental problems. Also, our industrial engineers are assisting manufacturers in their search for more effective controls.

Robinson Rates N.L. Better Take it from Frank Robinson, who has seen service in both leagues, the National is tougher than the American. "Now that I'm back in the National League, I'm sure the National League is better.

"After I was in the American League awhile I began to think maybe I was wrong, maybe it was as good as the National League after all. The way some of my fellow American Leaguers wanted it to be rubbed off on me some, but inside I knew better," the veteran Los Angeles Dodger outfielder said.

Robinson, who won most valuable player laurels in each loop-with Cincinnati in the National before moving on to altimore, and later in the American with the Orioles, notes the big difference is personnel. "The A.L. has a lot of good players, but the N.L. has more

of them. The A.L., he adds, "has some fine teams, but the N.L. has more of them.

"The Baltimore teams I played on the last six years were as good as any team in the National League. Maybe they were the best team in baseball over that period. But take them away, and it was no contest."

Robinson, writing in Sport, feels that the N.L. is stronger and more exciting today than the A.L. and attributes the difference to the willingness to sign untested black players. "The National League was the first to sign black players and remained ahead all these years. And so many outstan-

ding players are black that it's hard to have an outstanding team without your share of black players. "It seems that N.L. teams were willing to sign any promising prospect regardless of color, while the A.L. was only interested in the outstanding, can't-miss black

prospect," he claims in support of his views. Robinson also contends that the N.L. is a more wide-open, exciting game because of the difference in power and speed.

"It seems to me that in the N.L. you've got more power hitters who can run bases, like Willie Mays, Hank Aaron, Roberto Clemente, even a Dave Kingman. In the A.L. your -power hitters are mostly big heavy fellows like Harmon Killebrew, Boog Powell and Frank Howard, who don't run too well. Managers in the A.L. have to be more conservative."

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


WEST SPRINGFIELD, Mass (AP) - Connecticut Gov Thomas J Meskill was saluted at a luncheon today as the 51st Eastern States Exposition noted Connecticut Day. It was Meskill's second visit to the 10-day annual fair, having met with other New England governors last Friday. Included in today's visit was a tour of the Avenue of States. including the Connecticut Building, which almost failed to open this year for the first time. A year ago, Meskill announced his state would no longer support the exhibits and maintenance of the building His decision followed an an-

nouncement from exposition trustees that they would keep the fair in West Springfield, despite lucrative offers from several Connecticut communities to move to tax-free land in the Nutmeg State.

Following Meskill's pullout, exposition officials negotiated with the Connecticut Farm Bureau Association and the Connecticut Business Industry Association, who agreed to take over the Connecticut Building, and have set up exhibits on the theme of the partnership of agriculture and industry.
