With the lineup of candidates completed in the two Senatorial Districts and the four House Districts into which Manchester has been divided by court order. the town's election officials now are faced with the task of preparing voter lists and assigning polling places for a complicated election process.

Of Manchester's four House districts, two (12 and 13) are completely within town boundaries, yet, each is split between two Senatorial Districts (3 and 4). 

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) -"It took one wall where the 17 kids were and just pushed it," one witness gasped after a bur-ning plane slashed into an ice cream parlor jammed with children and their parents, killing 22 persons.

Authorities said one entire family of four died in the crash Sunday along with at least 10 children. Twenty-six others mostly children - were injured when the private plane catapulted across a highway shortly after takeoff and hit Farrell's Ice Cream Parlor.

The pilot of the Korean warvintage jet fighter survived and was quoted as saying, "I'm sorry! I'm sorry!" as he was pulled from the wreckage.

Describing the scene at the wall where the 17 youngsters had been sitting, Dave Thorton said, "They were all in a big pile. It highway. just pushed them." He ran ran to the crash area from a nearby bowling alley.



# **Cities-State Plan** Waste-Disposal **Recycling Test**

HARTFORD (AP) - Hartford, New Haven and New Britain are willing to contribute to experimental wastedisposal plants serving their areas as part of the proposed statewide refuse program, according to the Department of Environmental Protection.

The demonstration units will be part of a \$100 million plan being designed jointly by the state, General Electric Co. and several utilities companies.

It will convert part of the trash into energy and reuseable products, for the first time Connecticut will derive money from its solid waste.


Robert L. Schulz, the department's director of its solidwaste management program, said during the weekend that the initial processing units will cost about \$8 million but money made from the 3.5 million tons of refuse it will process should offset operating costs.

Hartford, New Haven and New Britain are willing to put up a total of \$4.75 million in funds they would otherwise spend on updating existing incineration plants, he said.

The statewide waste disposal system will produce a combination of reclaimed glass and metal, and oils produced by treating garbage under high temperature in a process called "pyrolysis."

Schulz said 1,500 tons of refuse expected to come from the Hartford, New Haven and New Britain areas each day will produce an estimated \$21,880 worth of oil, metal and glass. Other parts of the state eventually will be required to collect their refuse and transport it to similar processing plants, Schulz said.

### Nureyev Draws Many **To Ballet** By JOHN GRUBER

Rudolf Nureyev, internationaly known dancer, showed his trawing power over the weekend varing with the National allet of Canada which presented three completely sold out perfor-mances at the Bushnell, when it had originally been engaged for only one. Over 10,000 people demonstrated their interest in the dance; Mr. Nureyev appeared in the two evening performances, and I saw his work last night. For all the glamor and publicity attached to his name, he is not sensational dancer. He's good, but there have been other dancers just as good. He is far from perfect and he has a noticeable lack of "ballon." Once in a while he was even slightly awkward, but this didn't prevent the audience at the performance I attend ed from according him a standing ovation.

Last evening's performance featured the Tschaikowsky-Petipa classic, "Swan Lake" as restaged by Erik Bruhn. I haven't seen the ballet for some years but it runs in my mind that Mr. Bruhn took considerable liberties with the traditional choreography. The plot line remained the same, of course, but there were noticeable ifferences in the variations, at

**DeRosa** Joins In Criticism

**Of School Data** Another Board of Education member, Robert DeRosa has supported Mrs. Margaret Rossi's complaint of not receiving information pertinent to board action

in sufficient time for review before decisions must be made. Mrs. Rossi's statements appeared in the Sept. 20 issue of the Herald. DeRosa explained that at the

Sept. 12 meeting of the board, all members received 15 pages of data pertaining to the "selling" of the proposed high school addition. According to DeRosa, this package contained an agenda for public presentations including dates and locations, a press release dated Sept. 13 and a schedule of additional press releases.

He said, to his knowledge, he and two other board members had no prior knowledge of the entire proposal and saw them for the first time at the Sept. 12 meeting.

In a letter to Board Chairman James Arnold, DeRosa suggested that the approach used in releasing the information was "in direct conflict with the rules of order of the South Windsor Board of Education which clearly states that all statements and reports to appropriate town authorities and the public, pertaining to additions on the existing school buildings shall be approved by the Board of Education."

He said his major concern is that press releases on the addition (\$1.9 million referendum question) are being released by individual board members with no opportunity for review and comment by the entire board. He said it was apparent that some board members received advance notice of the proposal on the high school addition and, although it may be coincidental, it is also "strange that three members of the board who publicly have voiced opposition to the proposed addition at the high school did not."

DeRosa further cited a criticism made by the Booz, Allen and Hamilton (\$25,000 procedural study) report which pointed to this inefficiency and suggested a subcommittee of the board be formed to establish procedures ensuring that information presented to the board by the administration is properly organized and received by individual board members in sufficient time for adequate study before the board is expected to take action. He concluded that this rule should also apply to all data proporting to represent the position of the board on any issue.
