



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

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A Citizens Guide For Government Services

with the workings of our governmental bureaucracy we are overwhelmed and simple information requests either involve a lengthy thumbing through various volumes of statutes, regulations, and policies or a "passing the buck" to one or several other officials.

To some this conveys the impression that government has become highly specialized and departmentalized which

To others this is the abhored and frustrating "red tape" that irritates more than it illuminates.

But, whatever our feelings might be about top elected officials who are responsible for the operation of various governmental offices, from the President on down, we should remember that the men and women who work for the public in the lower echelons are human

The efforts to get the right answer for us is a courtesy and many times the passing of the buck is a sincere effort to insure us contact with a person who does have special competence to help us with our problem.

The problem lies more in the system rather than in personnel for the most part. The growth of government and its impact in our lives has increased over


has not kept pace. We can recall the agonies of reapportionment of our Assembly and visualize the agonies which someday must be faced in restructuring our bureauocracy.

Some consolidation or coordination along the lines of functions, rather than arbitrary designations, is needed. This may be an oversimplification of the problem but wouldn't it be nice if you could pay all your taxes, property, automobile, dog

Legally, under present laws, this may not be possible. However, in the interim, it might be worthwhile for the town and state to get together and develop a simple citizens guide which would tell us where to go for that which would save both time for the citizen and

While such a guide would not resolve all the problems it could, we believe, go a long way in creating a better and more productive relationship between the general public and our public servants.
