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

The action is based on an estimated state fund surplus of \$28.7 million, last fiscal year, and an anticipated \$22 million in federal revenue-sharing grants to the state. The General Assembly, if it chooses to

Project Finds the Aged

In December, 1971, the White House Conference on Aged focussed attention on the fact that many older Americans suffer from nutritional deficiencies because of their limited incomes. At the same time, federal food assistance programs are available in virtually every county in the nation.

As a result of the conference, early in August, a nationwide campaign to ideneligible for food assistance was launched.

Four government agencies and the Red Cross were enlisted in the effort, which included the mailing of application cards to more than 26 million men and women receiving Social Security benefits, 22.5 million of whom are over the age of 60.

The agencies are the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Office of Economic Opportunity, Social Security Administration and ACTION, the government/citizen service corps.

Named to head the campaign-Project Find-was Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, chairman of the White House Conference on Aging and former

In announcing the project, Flemming said, "Many older persons, lost to society, are eligible for federal assistance programs, but are not aware of it. It is the role of Project Find to locate these people and build a bridge between them and society." First returns of the project are now

A. Follow the directions carefully in your Medicare Handbook. Fill out part 1 of the Request for Medicare Payment rom and attach the itemized bill.
