



Nations like people seem to have a desire for status symbols. A casual review of the use of aid funds in the socalled underdeveloped or emerging nations reveals this all too often.

India, for one example, early in its independence used aid funds to develop a steel industry and all but ignored investments in farm technology and land reforms which could have provided perhaps more jobs and certainly more food for its starving millions.

Our own hemisphere has faired no better. Despite more than a decade of the Alliance for Progress and related programs to assist our neighbors to the south, poverty, disease and political unrest remain a way of life as aid funds built the most senseless of all status symbols, air forces and armies.

This is why we welcome, and hope the World Bank, will adopt its president's call for a new policy of loans and support for projects aiding the "desperately poor," in these developing nations. Robert S. McNamara cited that industrialization in many of these countries has widened the income gap between the affluent and the "poorest

BOSTON (AP)—Despite his team's problems away from Fenway Park, Boston Manager Eddie Kasko is not worried about the Red Sox trying to hang on to first place in the American League East while playing their last six games of the season on the road.

"I don't think the home advantage is going to mean that much as during the middle of the season," Kasko said Thursday after the Red Sox defeated Kansas City 3-1 in their final home game and moved 11/2 games in front of the Tigers, who lost to New York, 3-2. "Everybody's adrenalin is flowing now," Kasko said. "They all know it's a big series and you've got to win

The Red Sox open a three game series with the Orioles tonight then play three games with the Tigers. If the Red Sox manage to play 500 ball or better at Baltimore and Detroit, they will be making a sharp break with form. This year their record on the road is 30-41, a .423 percentage, including 3-3 at Baltimore and 1-4 at Detroit. On the other hand, their record at Fenway Park is 52-26, a .667

"One thing's for sure, now," Kasko said when asked if his team could win it on the road: "We can't win it at home."

Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, calling it a labor-management dispute, refused to sign a bill passed by a special session of the General Assembly ordering his administration to spend money to keep buses rolling through the end of the fiscal But at the bus companies, Connecticut Co. in Hartford and Connecticut Railway & Lighting Co. in Bridgeport, negotiations with the Amalgamated Transit Union ended Friday with little hope for settlement before Monday. Although the old contract expires midnight Saturday, the effect of a strike by drivers and mechanics would not be felt until Monday. Sunday bus service is virtually non-existent. The Hartford district of the ATU scheduled a union meeting at 10 a.m. at Labor Temple to discuss the situation.
