

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

Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, calling it a labor-management dispute, refused to sign a bill passed by a special session of the General Assembly ordering his administration to spend money to keep buses rolling through the end of the fiscal But at the bus companies, Connecticut Co. in Hartford and Connecticut Railway & Lighting Co. in Bridgeport, negotiations with the Amalgamated Transit Union ended Friday with little hope for settlement before Monday. Although the old contract expires midnight Saturday, the effect of a strike by drivers and mechanics would not be felt until Monday. Sunday bus service is virtually non-existent. The Hartford district of the ATU scheduled a union meeting at 10 a.m. at Labor Temple to discuss the situation.
