Before its war with the World Hockey Association, the average salary for a National Hockey League player was pegged at \$32,000. The figure for major league baseball comes

The article, which attempts to put skyrocketing sports salaries into perspective, emphasizes that average salaries do not always give the most accurate picture of industry wages. In baseball, for example, a number of players were listed as earning over \$100,000, but for every player in the six figure

STONINGTON (AP) - Foreign fleets are systematically destroying valuable stocks of fisheries off the coast of the United States, says a fishing executive

Joseph Gaziano, president of the Prelude Corp. of Westport, told a congressional subcommittee Friday that the reason has been the lack of a national fisheries policy and governmental inaction.

Gaziano, whose firm seized a Russian trawler in San Francisco last year for alleged damages to its fisheries equipment, said Japanese fishermen have caused more than \$200,000 damage to his company's equipment.

He testified at the opening of two days hearing by the Coast Guard subcommittee of the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries.

Large quantities of the same seafood products obtained off the shores by Japan are being sold through a "network of branch offices in the United States," he





Richard Boone Is Back But He Doesn't Like It

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - After a seven-year absence. Richard Boone is back on television, as uncompromising as ever in his judgment of the studios, the networks, the ratings and the frustrations of making a Western

"I don't even like being here," rasped Boone, who has now taken up residence in St. Augustine, Fla., after seven years in Hawaii. "There are so many nice places in the world."

Barefooted and wearing a red jumpsuit, Boone sat in his iressing room-office at Universal Studios. His dark brown hair was almost to his shoulders and his gray moustache almost to his chin for his role in "Hec Ramsey" on NBC's "Sunday Mystery Movie."

"If we go beyond the current commitment, whatever is made after that will be made away from the studio entirely," he said. Boone is committed to four 90-minute shows and the twohour movie that kicks the series off Sunday, Oct. 8.

Boone said if the show is successful future episodes would be made in Tucson or Santa Fe. They both have sound stages for interiors. All we lose is interference and tour buses."
