Yale Deficit Reduced To \$1.2 Million

NEW HAVEN (AP) -Underestimation in "every major component of Yale's income' helped to turn an expected \$5.7 million deficit into a \$1.2 million one, a university official reported

The university received \$2.9 million more than expected during the 1971-72 academic year, Provost Richard Cooper said. Much of that resulted from increased alumni giving and more federal aid. Tightened economies at Yale also produced unexpected saving, he said. Cooper was directed by Yale President King Brewster Jr. to

determine why the actual deficit was \$4.5 million less than Yale Treasurer John Ecklund's initial prediction last year. Ecklund has said he later warned that the deficit might be reduced. The budget discrepancy Cooper concluded, was the result

National Priorities Reverse in Four Years

Although one of the key issues in the current presidential campaign is the charge that the United States is becoming more militaristic, at the expense of domestic needs, the dollars and cents record of the Nixon administration indicates otherwise.

Lyndon Johnson's last budget, in the 1969 fiscal year, included \$79 billion for defense, or 45 per cent of the total budget. Expenditures for domestic, human needs that year accounted for 32 per cent of the budget. The Nixon administration's budget for the current year turned those percentages around 45 per cent of it is earmarked for domestic needs; 32 per cent of it for

Why hasn't this dramatic shift in priorities in just four years been more widely recognized? Probably the main reason is this nation's continuing preoccupation with Vietnam. Although Vietnam is still very much to be reckoned with, it was with us when the current administration assumed the reins of government. Beyond the regrettable facts of the war is an even bigger story of where this country is headed and what it wants to accomplish for its time," he added.

Nowhere has the shift in federal spending been more pronounced than at the Department of Health, Education federal department charged with caring for the everyday, human needs of individual citizens. HEW's budget has grown by 70 per cent in four years. Its spending authority of \$87 billion this year marks it as the leading dispenser of the federal dollar and represents the first time in modern history that the budget of a civilian agency has eclipsed

take the AL playoffs. "The day I got traded (from the Chicago Cubs) Dick Williams called me at my house and said, 'We're going to put you in the World Series.' And damned if he didn't," said Oakland pitcher Ken Holtzman, smiling as he sat quietly in front of his clubhouse locker. Most of his teammates were exploding champagne corks, splashing beer, hugging each other, and yelling with joy. Even millionaire owner Charlie Finley joined in, pouring champagne on dry heads and crying with happiness at the moment which seemed

to be slipping away after Tiger victories Tuesday and Wednesday. Holtzman is Manager Williams' choice to pitch the Series opener and the A's will have suspended shortstop Bert Campaneris back in action, although Reggie Jackson may be out with a pulled hamstring muscle suffered in a successful steal of home plate Thursday.

The A's won Thursday on the strong arms of John "Blue Moon" Odom and Vida Blue, plus some questionable Tiger fielding and the running of Jackson and his replacement, George Hendrick, Winner Odom gave up an unearned run in the first inning as he pitched a

two-hitter for five frames before getting

with a lightning fastball, allowing three harmless singles in picking up the save.

Campaneris, suspended by AL President Joe Cronin for the last three playoff games for throwing a bat at Detroit pitcher Lerrin LaGrow, joined in the Oakland post-game bedlam but wasn't saying much.
