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



Gillette Castle

The Grounds



When William Gillette, portrayer of Sherlock Holmes on the American stage for more than three decades, decided to build a between tours retirement home, he selected a rugged, tree-lined hill high over the Connecticut River at Hadlyme. Originally, he considered a site at the eastern tip of Long Island's North

On a high point of the 115 acres, he built "Seventh Sister,' now known as Gillette Castle. During his lifetime, authorities estimate that the actor-playwright spent more than \$1 million.

The castle is patterned after a medieval Rhennish fortress. complete with crenelated battlements and apertures. Native stone was one of Gillette's loves. The entire castle is built on a natural rock formation. The cellar was blasted out of solid rock to a depth of 12 or more feet in places. Built wholly of native granite from nearby fields and ridges, the foundation walls are five feet thick at their base and taper to about two feet at the tower.


Over several years, 22 skilled masons were steadily engaged in completing the stone work for the castle and various ledge walks that were literally carved from the side of the cliff.




Stone walls frame the roadway leading to the main entrance.








# League Sponsors Panel Tuesday on **School Referenda**

A public information meeting on the Nov. 7 referendum of \$6.8 million dollars for additions and renovations to Bennet and Illing Junior High Schools will be held Tuesday at 8 p. m. at Illing.

The meeting, the only public one planned at this time by the Board of Education, is sponsored by the League of Women Voters. Mrs. Robert Stone, chairman of the league's education committee, will moderate a panel of three speakers: Paul Greenberg. Board of Education building and sites committee chairman; Dr. James P. Kennedy, superinten-dent of schools; and Dr. Richard Lindgren, Illing principal.

Available at the meeting will be blueprints of proposed renovations and additions and brochures outlining the reasoning behind the referendum, needs of both schools, and improvements to the facilities that will be accomplished if voters pass the referendum.

The \$6.8 million would be divided equally between the junior highs. Estimating a total state reimbursement of \$2,920.-000, the administration says that the net cost to the town would be \$3,880,000. Last year, voters turned down two referendums, totaling more than \$11 million, for a third junior high and an elementary school.

This year's referendum proposes construction of a 30,600square foot media center and gymnasium in the Bennet quadrangle, which would bring the total area in the complex to 202,600 square feet; and renovations to the existing five

Passage of the referendum would add 19 classrooms of 61,000 square feet to the existing 34 teaching stations at Illing, bringing the total building area to 141,000 square feet; 63 parking spaces to the existing 33; and 2

commonly asked questions: QUESTION 15 Why is the Board of Education proposing junior high school additions and renovations? Answer:

Space needs at the secondary level are critical. The present capacity of the Bennet and Illing buildings is 1,800 and present enrollment is 2,346. We now have over 500 pupils more than the junior high schools were designed to hold with average class size well over 30 pupils per class. In addition, new state required programs such as learning disabilities and programs for exceptional students, as well as our own work-study program, require additional classroom space Although our population projections show a stabilizing and slightly declining secondary school enrollment, this will in no way compensate for our lack of

QUESTION 2: What will this proposal accomplish? Answer:

school facilities.

Illing was too small to house the ninth grade on the day it opened 12 years ago, and 300 or more of its students have been at the high school ever since. The addition to Illing will make this school a complete junior high school building.

Bennet was built in 1903-1915 and is in great need of renovation and modernization. It requires \$300,000 worth of renovation just to meet state fire and safety codes. The addition and renovations at Bennet will provide this school with a proper size library and media center, a full-size gymnasium, as well as industrial arts and fine arts facilities.

The high school would benefit by removal of the Illing ninth grade. Specifically, space would now be available for additional science laboratories, independent study centers, expanded career education programs, graphic arts, ceramics, metal and wood crafts, home economics; also, facilities for a physical education program for handicapped students, and for a greater number and variety of basic courses for high school

students. In the summary, it will provide Manchester with completely updated secondary school facilities and the opportunity to greatly

Referendum Questions

Why not convert Lincoln School into the needed junior

Besides giving the junior high schools much needed space, one of the primary goals is to unify Illing's 9th grade with the 7th and 8th grades so that programs and staff can be better coordinated. Lincoln School is large enough to house one grade, probably the 7th grade; but since it is removed from the Illing building the communication problem would be greater. Lincoln was not designed to house a junior high school program and would need extensive renovations. Lincoln could be renovated so that it would have necessary classroom, library and cafeteria space. This would take every inch of floor space in the building and utilization of the large areas. The students would have to be transported to Illing. the high school or Bennet for physical education, industrial arts and home economics. The building has mechanical difficulties and is in need of extensive work on its heating system. The Lincoln site has very poor parking facilities and would have a great deal of difficulty in accommodating the large number of buses needed at the junior high level. Even after extensive and expensive renovations, this school would have inadequate junior high facilities and, after this large expense, would really offer the community a junior high facility worse than we presently have.

QUESTION 4: Who are the architects for this proposal and what is the cost of

the initial planning? Answer: The architects for the Bennet portion of this proposal are Mankey Associates of Manchester and the architects for the Illing portion are Lawrence Associates, also of Manchester. Because the Board of Education and the Town Building Committee desire to keep the architectural cost at a minimum, the architects are not preparing detailed drawings. Instead they are just providing enough information in order to prepare the proposal for referendum. The total cost of architects, prior to referendum, will not exceed \$10,-

QUESTION 5: Why spend the money to renovate and add to Bennet, which is over 50 years old, when the board just closed a school of the same age (Lincoln)?

## His Cheesecake A Prize Winner

In photographers' jargon, "a little more cheesecake, please' might well be instructions for a pretty model to display a little more of her shapely legs - but to Donald Griffin of South Windsor, it means his homemade cheesecake has scored another

The would-be chef, 17-years-old and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Griffin of 2680 Ellington Rd., has been interested in cooking since he was seven-years-

According to Donnie, he used to help his grandmother, Mrs. Vera Griffin of White Plains, N.Y., make cookies and cakes, and his interest in cooking just

His cheesecake, which he conseveral awards, and he has also sold it to a few area restaurants

and a bakery. He first entered it in the junior class cooking contest at the Wapping Fair, which is held annually in South Windsor, then later in the adult class, where he won first premium prize for three

Another prize winner is his Jewish Coffeecake, which took first prize at the fair.

Donnie likes to cook roasts, turkeys, etc., as well as desserts. "My mom does the shopping and will let me know what she wants for dinner, then I do the rest," Donnie said.

Donnie's dad is president of the U-Haul Company, Eastern Division, and mother is employed at Veeder-Root in Hartford.

A senior at South Windsor High School, Donnie is no novice in the cooking field. He worked at the Podunk Mill in South Windsor, now the Steak Loft, where he helped prepare buffets, including such items as baked stuffed shrimp, salads, and hot and cold buffet dishes.

He also worked part time making donuts at the Mr. Donut Shop in Rockville. His ambition is to attend the Culinary Institute in New Haven.

He especially likes cooking pies, and includes blueberry, and lemon meringue among his favorites.

His secret for making a "stand high" meringue that won't shrink from the sides of the pie crust is one of the few secrets he will divulge.

"Make a little extra meringue, spread it over filling so it covers the crust edges. After baking, refrigerate; it shrinks a little but won't pull away from the crust," Donnie said.

His cheesecake recipe is a secret, and one he doesn't feel he can share. "It was given to me by a friend

out-of-state, and I promised I wouldn't make it public," "Besides, to me its a business; make cheesecakes and I sell

them, so to give the recipe away would be a business loss," Donnie added. 'My cheesecake is approximately 101/2 inches and weighs four to five pounds, and is

about three inches high. I don't use a fruit topping, but have my own sour cream and cinnamon Donnie does take orders for cakes, but prefers at least two days notice, especially if there is more than one cake being



He also makes beef stew and a rabbit stew, both of which are popular with his family, as well as lucky guests at the Griffin

"I only use snowshoe rabbits from Vermont," he said. "I braise them, then boil them with potatoes, carrots and beans."

Incidently, Donnie and his dad hunt for the rabbits when on trips during the hunting season to Vermont.

"I also make bread, shortcake, and biscuits. I have a recipe for a cool rise bread which is very successful and popular with cooks. You can make it the night before, take it out of the refrigerator in the morning, let it set for 10 or 15 minutes, shape your bread or rolls, and bake them for 35 to 40 minutes."

Cooking on a large scale isn't new for the youthful chef. Besides his parents, he has two brothers, Tom, 2l, and Dave, 14, and a sister. Rhonda, l.

"A couple of years ago, I cooked dinner for a family of 15 over a two-week period when the mother of the family was hospitalized." Donnie said.

"A girl who was in my homeroom at school knew I liked to cook, so her family asked me to help out. I made such things as stuffed cabbage, meat loaf, pot roasts, and other hearty dishes, and would have dinner already when they came home from work or school," he added.

Cooking secrets? Well, he has a few. He likes to use garlic, and parsley flakes, rather than fresh chopped parsley. His spaghetti sauce may vary from time to time, depending on what ingredients are available at the time of preparation.

Though only a young man, Donnie has acquired one basic characteristic prevalent in "wellseasoned" cooks of many years experience he doesn't measure

"I use a measuring cup," Donnie admits, "but usually end up with a pinch of this, and a scoop of that, which seems to do the trick.

While we must respect Donnie's wishes as pertains to the cheesecake recipe, he did consent to share his recipes for Jewish Coffeecake, and a special Chocolate Chip Loaf Cake.

Jewish Coffeecake Cream together, until light and fluffy, 4 cups butter or margarine and 1 cup sugar. Add 2 eggs, 1 at a time.

Combine 2 cups sifted flour, 1 tsp. baking soda, 1 tsp. baking powder, ¼ tsp. salt. Sift together and add to mixture, alternating with 1 cup sour cream. Add one-half of the following

sugar, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats. Pour into angel food pan, sprinkle rest of nut mixture on top and swirl mixture in pan with a knife. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes.

Chocolate Chip Loaf Cake 1% cups sifted flour 1 tbs. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt 2 eggs, unbeaten 4 cups sugar cup milk 4 cups shortening, melted 1/4 cups quick cooking rolled oats cup (6 oz.) chocolate chips 's cup chopped walnut

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a loaf pan, which measures 9 x 5 x 3 inches. Sift flour, baking powder and

salt together. Set aside. Beat the eggs in a large mixing bowl, add to the eggs, sugar, milk and melted shortening; beat to combine mixture. Add sifted dry ingredients, the rolled oats, chips, and nuts to the creamed

Pour into greased loaf pan. Bake approximately 1 hour or until done. Turn out of pan onto a rack and let cool.

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
