





Legislation that has been proposed in Congress would now lighten the blackout a little. It would permit telecasting of a local game whenever all stadium seats have been sold.

But there may be a catch. Hometown boosters, unable to purchase tickets, would not necessarily be able to watch the game at home for free. Testifying recently before the Senate

Subcommittee on Communications, CBS/Broadcasting Group president John A. Schneider pointed out that there is nothing in the proposed legislation or in FCC rules that would stop pay television or cable television (CATV) from siphoning of such programming for their own paying audiences.

Schneider cited the experience with the Joe Frazier-Muhammad Ali heavyweight championship fight, when all U. S. and Canadian viewing was blacked out so that the audience could

The fight was seen by only 1/20th as many people as a middleweight championship bout on free television 10 years earlier. But this relatively tiny audience of about a million and a half paid in more than \$16 million at the box office.

If people were willing to stand in line at the prices charged for the Frazier-Ali closed-circuit prizefight, he said, think what pay TV could charge for bringing living room.

As it is, the majority of people in virtually every local viewing area served by major league football do not have CATV, either because they cannot afford it or because it has bypassed their neighborhood. The result thus would be to extend the blackout, not to lift it.

CATV is offside and illegal."

He urged that Congress, as a condition to continuing the antitrust exemption granted professional football, preclude the selling of television rights to any games, including the previously blacked-out home games, to cable, pay cable or subscription television in-
