WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President Spiro T. Agnew says the United States won't be ready to sign a Vietnam peace agreement by Tuesday, but doesn't think this will prevent an agreement "in due course."

"There is no question about the principal parts of the agreement," Agnew said Sunday. However, he added there "are just a few matters to be made 'crystal clear' between the parties before it can be made final."

South Vietnam's foreign minister, Tran Van Lam, said today his government won't sign until North Vietnam withdraws its troops from the South and until there is agreement on the exact role of a proposed National Council of Reconciliation and Concord which is supposed to maintain a cease-fire and supervise elections.

Israel Protests Release Of Arab Terrorists

Israel angrily denounced West Germany today for releasing the three Munich Olympic terrorists to Arab guerrillas who hijacked a German airliner with 20 other persons aboard and threatened to blow it up.

The Lufthansa 727 jet was expected in Frankfurt today after delivering the three freed terrorists and the two hijackers to Tripoli, the Libyan capital. The 13 other passengers and seven crew members were reported unharmed.

A senior Israeli cabinet ordered the pilot to fly to Munich minister called the West German to pick them up.

Biggest Question Nov.7 Is Assembly Control

Top State Issue

Associated Press Writer HARTFORD (AP) - Will Gov. Thomas J. Meskill get a friendly Republican legislature in 1973 or will the Democrats continue to occupy a power base in the General Assembly? That is the biggest question to

be answered in the state legislative election on Nov. 7. The election will set the stage for the second half of the Republican governor's four-year term, and the second half of his term will set the stage for the 1974 gubernatorial election. So the governor has a lot at stake. Not only Meskill, but many other political figures in both parties have a lot riding on the General Assembly election. Some legislators with great expectations-or great hopes-for the future have more at stake than just hanging onto their assembly seats.

One of these is House Speaker William Ratchford of Danbury,

who is interested in the Democratic nomination for governor in 1974, or in a seat in Congress if an opportunity ever comes along. Ratchford could win re-election to his assembly seat and still suffer a blow to his political ambitions if the Democrats lose control of the House. A GOP majority would mean a Republican speaker, and the highest post a Democrat could hold would be that of minority leader. Minority status would also be a blow to other Democratic House



House Changes Four of the 115 House incumbents must go down to defeat, because they are matched against other incumbents. But it is mathematically possible for 73 per cent of the next General Assembly to consist of veterans of the current legislature.

Under reapportionment, the House will have 26 fewer members than the present 177member House. If for no other reason but reapportionment, the '72 General Assembly election a settled issue has to be a political watershed.

The turnover of members from '71-72 is bound to be the biggest change since the last reapportionment cut the size of the House from 294 members in 1965 to 177 in 1967.

Yet there could also be considerable continuity from the current legislature to the next one, particularly in the House leadership cadres.

One point to remember is that the '73 General Assembly might serve one of the shortest terms in Connecticut's long history.

The U.S. Supreme Court has not yet ruled on the constitutionality of the new House and Senate districts. If it rejects them, a new election along different lines may have to be held next year. After nearly two years of hassling, both in the egislature and in the state and federal courts, reapportionmen for the rest of the 1970's is not yet

Long Campaigns? There's A Reason

Speaking a few days ago to a group of labor leaders from 24 countries who are in the United States to observe the presidential election, President Nixon remarked that "the British have a much better system" because they limit their campaigns to three weeks.

It is interesting to reflect that if we had this "better" system in this country, Richard Nixon would not be presently running for President of the United States but for Member of Congress from California.

The reason that the British can limit their campaigns to three weeks is that nobody runs for, and hence nobody votes for, the office of prime minister Every Member of Parliament runs (or in Britain "stands") for his own seat in his own constituency, including the party leader who everyone knows will be named prime minister should his party capture a majority of seats.

Thus as party leader, a potential

in a word, it wrapped up all those qualities of personality, style and energetic extroversion which John and his brothers had in abundance and which, it was widely agreed, were essential ingredients of the successful politi cian in the now generation.

So along comes 1972 and charisma, in a word, is one element it is widely agreed that this presidential election is notably lacking.

But if Richard Nixon and George McGovern are not exactly overwhelming the American electorate with personal magnetism this year, it is interesting to note that personality is very much at work-possibly the key factor-in two other countries in the grip of election politics-Canada and West Germany.

Taking the first first, Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau has considerably toned down the with-it image which contributed greatly to his 1968 election victory. In the campaigning for Canada's Oct. 30 parliamentary voting, it has been Trudeau the statesman rather than the swinger who has been on view.

But the serious Trudeau can also be sharp-tongued and arrogant. He has made enemies. There is noticeably less adulation and more open dislike of Trudeau than four years ago.

His opponent, on the other hand, Progressive-Conservative party leader Robert Stanfield, is said not to have a single real enemy in the entire country. Which suggests his major problem. If there is nothing about Standfield to which voters react strongly negatively, neither does he turn them on in large numbers.

In West Germany, personality is nowhere near such a divisive factor, but it could be even more decisive in the Nov. 19 election of a new Bundestag.

Chancellor Willy Brandt is considerably more popular than his own Social Democratic party. He is, in fact, possibly the most popular political figure in Europe today, a standing which could have some influence on Germans still concerned over postwar ostracism by their neighbors.

Brandt is less a magnetic personality than a warm one. Much of his appeal to Germans may lie in the contrast he presents to their traditionally authoritarian leader figures. A natural, relaxed individual, he is clearly not the retread of the stiff, formal prewar type which so many of Germany's other contemporary politicians seem to be.

Germans seem generally to approve of Brandt's policy of rapproachment with Communist East Europe, which he has made the key issue of this election. But even should the opposition Christian Democrats win, it is generally assumed the policy would be continued with little change.

It is Brandt's personal popularity that the Social Democrats are counting on as the decisive factor.

The importance of personality in politics is, of course, nothing new. In the American experience the Kennedys and their contemporaries merely updated a public relations tool the Roosevelts and numerous predecessors knew and exploited. And long before then, Cicero, Caesar and Pericles were making use of special gifts for turning the public on. The Greeks, in fact, even had a word for it-charisma.

Jobless Drop Forecast By Economist

WASHINGTON (AP) - The top economist in the Nixon administration has predicted that the nation's unemployment rate will drop from its present 5.5-percent rate to 4.5 per cent by the end of 1973.

Herbert Stein, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors, made the forecast last week after an unusual exchange at a hearing of the Joint Economic Committee, headed by Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis.

Stein said that the way to reduce unemployment is "a" policy to seek an expanding economy and a continuously ex panding level of useful employ-

ment opportunities." Proxmire asked what programs the administration had in mind. "That is what the object of the resent search is," Stein replied. "You can't tell us that after





"In accordance with the aforesaid we, Frederick B. Wierk and Myrtle V. Wierk, do hereby affix our

ignatures. Wierk, formerly a teacher at the American School for the Deaf in West Hartford, decided to build the doll house as a retirement project. Somewhat experienced in constructing some of his own home furnishings in his basement workshop, he was not unfamiliar with designing and building most of the furnishing for "Gretchen's Manor."

Mrs. Wierk designed and made the draperies and the lace canopy with matching bed ruffle in the master bedroom, as well as the draperies and some of the rugs elsewhere in the house. One of the special little touches is the tiny pair of white handmade slippers in front of the rocking chair in the bedroom which can be put away in a special slipper compariment concealed beneath the chair seat.


Although most of the paintings in the home were bought, a small landscape in oil over the mantel in the living room was painted with a toothpick by a family friend to represent a Van Gogh.

As in most houses with attics, the one in this special house is used for storage and one can see little boxes with special trimmings for Christmas and other occasions. In fact, even now, Santa Claus is perched on top of the chimney.

Skyjackers Kill Airline Employe

MIAMI, Fia. (AP) - One airline employe was killed and another wounded in the hijacking of an Eastern Airlines jetliner from Texas to Cuba. The FBI identified two of the sky pirates as a former Commerce Department executive and his teen-aged son.

The father and son named by the FBI were Charles A. Tuller Jr., 44, and Bryce M. Tuller, 19. The FBI said the two also were wanted in connection with a Virginia bank holdup in which a police officer and a bank manager were killed by bandits last week

The FBI identified a third hijacker as William Graham, 18. The fourth man was not named. All four skyjackers remained in Cuba when the jetliner, carrying 33 passengers and a crew of seven, returned to Miami from

Air piracy warrants were issued against the Tullers and Graham, and a Houston, Tex., judge set bond early today at \$1

A burst of shots as the airliner was commandeered at Houston early Sunday took the life of Eastern ticket agent Stan Hub-bard, 34, of Humble, Tex. Wyatt S. Wilkinson Jr., a 26-year-old refueler also from Humble, was wounded by two shots in the left

Eastern officials said Hubbard was found at the end of the passenger exit corridor, clutching a raincoat and a pair of sun glasses that weren't his. He had been shot in the leg, chest and neck, officials said.





UNICEF Halloween **Trick Or Treaters** Seeks Help For Needy

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - A few million of those shrill voices shouting "trick or treat" at the doorways of America tonight will belong to children unarmed with soap

They'll have only collection boxes for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund. If refused donations, their strict instructions are to leave politely and commit no vandalism.

About 31/2 million youngsters may take part in the "Trick or Treat for UNICEF" and raise perhaps \$3.4 million of the organization's \$62.8 million estimated income for the year, Muriel Brady, director of U.S. youth activities, said.

This is about the same amount contributed last Halloween by Americans. Little or no increase is expected because, "A presidential election year is not really a good year for us," Mrs. Brady said. There is less television publicity and adult volunteers are less available for organizing UNICEF trickor-treat/squads, she explained.

Officials stress that parents or other adults supervise all UNICEF trick-or-treaters on their visits. Does this mean it's an activity mainly for wealthier, privileged neighborhoods? "It is definitely not an upper income sort of thing," Mrs. Brady answered. "We have many, many groups from areas such as Harlem and Bedford Stuyvesant," she said naming New York minority districts.

It's easy to sell kids on the campaign, she said, because, "They want to relate to youngsters in other parts of the world including those living in bad conditions..." They know much of UNICEF's money goes toward health, food and teaching programs in Africa, and they're for that, she added.




