More Spending, More Taxes

Congress adjourned without granting President Nixon authority to hold federal spending to \$250 billion dollars during the year that began July 1. But it overrode his veto of a bill calling for four times as much as he wanted for stringent water pollution controls.

The result of these actions is to increase the likelihood of higher taxes as President Nixon warned. Unless the President is re-elected and is given a working majority in Congress, higher taxes are certain. But Nixon plans to do everything in his power to hold down spending and avoid a tax boost.

Members of the House were willing to abdicate their responsibilities for curtailing excessive spending but the Senate, which has consistently opposed Nixon on important issues, refused to go

In effect, Congress said, "We enjoy spending the people's money and we don't know when to stop or where to

Individually, every member of Congress knows there is waste and duplication in government. The PresiBut there is no agreement on the places

As it stands, President Nixon will no be obligated to trim more than \$6 billion dollars from current programs, an unpopular and highly controversial task, but he is going to try.

Wilbur Mills, the Democratic chair man of the Ways & Means Committee led the fight for the spending ceiling. He acknowledged "We do not have contro of spending in the present situation."

Pointedly, Mills asked the House "Do you think that any of our people at home can have any confidence in the way we run this situation? They do not have it and you know it."

Every American is aware o governmental extravagance and is sick of mounting taxes.

Mills said the people want something done about it and are going to elect a Congress that will work to control inflation and to control federal spending.

We hope he is right. The future of the country depends upon drastic changes in the way Congress handles the people's

About Town Town Bonding Schedule In Favorable Condition

BY DOUG BEVINS (Herald Reporter)

If Manchester voters approve a-Nov. 7 referendum question for renovations of the town's two junior high schools, there would probably be no increase in taxes, Manchester Mayor John Thompson said today.

The town has a "very favorable bonding indebtedness picture," Thompson said, as four bond issues will be completely retired by the time the town would start making payments on bonds for the proposed Hennet and Illing Junior High Schools renovation. The renovations (Question Two

on the Nov. 7 voting machines) are estimated to cost \$6.8 million. About \$3.9 million of that estimate would be financed by a town bond issue; the remaining \$2.9 million would be funded by state grants. Based on projections by Town

Controller Thomas S. Moore, the \$3.9 million in bonds would be issued in fiscal year 1974-1975. and the first full year's principal and interest payments would be made in fiscal year 1975-1976. Those first full payments on

the proposed Bennet and Illing renovation bonds would increase the town's bond payment requirements to about \$678,000 for fiscal year 1975-1976, according to Moore's projection. Bond payment requirements now (fiscal

year 1972-1973) are about \$765,-

But the 1975-1976 payment requirement would be the "peak," Mayor Thompson noted. In fiscal year 1976-1977, the requirement would be lower than present requirements; and from then on bond payment requirements would continually decrease, according to projections.

Part of the reason for the decreasing bond payment requirements, Thompson said, is that the town will make final payments on four bond issues by the end of fiscal year 1974-1975. Those four issues now require principal payments of \$340,000 per year. Those four bond issues

reaching maturity over the next few years are the 1952 issue for Buckley School construction and additions to Bowers and South Schools; the first and second issues, in 1953 and 1955, for Manchester High School; and the 1964 issue for North End redevelopment


Continually decreasing interest charges, as well as anticipated retirement of the four bond issues, put the town in a "very favorable situation," according to Moore. "We're under ten per cent of what our bonded indebtedness could be," Moore

Considering diminishing bond payment requirements, anticipated federal revenue sharing funds, and any possible increases in the Grand List, the town will be able to meet demands for additional services without in-

creasing taxes, Thompson said. Thompson said voters can act on the school referendum question without worrying about increased taxes. If voters consider junior high school renovations a priority, the mayor added, the renovations can be done now more favorably than in the past -

or probably in the future. Town Manager Robert Weiss, echoing Thompson's sentiments, said "now is a good time" for school renovations. Contractors are anxious for work, Weiss said, and the town might get better bids on renovations now.

Thompson, in reporting the town's bonded indebtedness picture, emphasized that he was not speaking for the Board of Directors or for his political party.



Sikorsky Funeral Rites Conducted

STRATFORD (AP) - As five helicopters flew by in a final salute to the man who invented helicopters, Igor I. Sikorsky was

The Russian Orthodox cemetery, which Sikorsky chose as his burial place, is on a hilltop a few miles from where he conducted the first successful helicopter flight in the fall of

Sikorsky died of a heart attack Thursday at his Easton home. He was 83 and retired, but had continued to make weekly trips to advise personnel at the plant he had founded. A large blue-and-white

Sikorsky helicopter hovered high above the golden-domed St. Nicholas church during the services and flew escort as the long funeral motorcade traveled the five-mile route to the cemetery. The fly-by of the five

helicopters was an emotional highpoint for many of the mourners and brought many of them to tears. Four of the aircraft

represented the four branches of U.S. military service, all of which use the helicopters produced by

the Sikorsky Division of the United Aircraft Corp.

More than 200 mourners jammed the small church or stood on the sunlit lawn, listening to the requiem mass, carried outside on two loudspeakers. Sikorsky left instructions that there be no eulogy and that the funeral service be limited to 25

minutes. However, it lasted more than twice that long. His four sons carried the casket



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
