Other victorious Democrats such as Sens. Wilber Smith and Joseph Fauliso of Hartford, Joseph Lieberman and Anthony Ciarlone of New Haven, and Harry Burke of East Hartford were from cities which voted for George McGovern, as was Senator-Elect John V. Zisk Jr. of New Britain.

Democratic representatives from Norwich, Waterbury, Bristol, Vernon, Winchester, and other towns which voted for Nixon also managed to swim upstream to victory.

Nixon Win Sparks Stock Market Rally

NEW YORK (AP) - Prices surged ahead in the stock market today in heavy postelec-tion trading, with President Nixon's landslide victory touching off a new rally that followed four days of sharp

followed four days of sharp gains last week.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, most widely watched indicator in Wall Street, was up 7.90 to 593.70 after the first 30 minutes of trading, and advancing issues on the New York Stock Exchange were shead of declining issues almost 4 to 1.

The Dow average rose past the 1986 high of 890.21 and was at the best level since February of 1996. The all-time high at the close of a trading day was

Landslide Rivals FDR's 1936 Smash

President Nixon has wen landslide re-election by carrying 49 of the 50 states, but despite his triumph the Democrats kept firmly in control of Congress.

Only Massachusetts and the District of Columbia withstood the Nixon tide Tuesday and wound up in Democrat George McGovern's almost invisible column.

Steele's Coattails Stronger

The coattails of Republican Congressman Robert Steele proved to be longer and stronger than those of Presi-dent Richard Nixon, as Steele consistantly led the victorious Republican ticket in Manchester area towns, as he did throughout the entire second district.

Vernon's favorite son, Steele, accomplished his goal — to receive the largest possible plurality to enhance his stan-ding in the Republican political structure two years from now when he may exercise the option of challenging incumbent Democratic U.S. Senator Abraham Ribicoff.

An independent campaigner Steele has his own personal organization 2,000 strong, made up largely of youthful workers. His overwhelming Vernon victory over opponent Roger Hilsman, 7,707-3,597 votes, helped to give that town's GOP Chairman Thomas Carruthers the majority he needed to finally gain his long sought goal as a state legislator. Carruthers defeated his Democratic opponent Michael Riley, 20,268-18,426 in the sprawling 15-town

district.

Carruthers had lost bids for the senate post to Robert Houley two years ago, and a previous try for state representative to Gerald Allen. A Meskill appointee to the state Board of Education, Carruthers is friendly with the governor's political leaders. Vernon's incumbent State

Representative Thomas Dooley

was the only Democratic to withstand the Republican landslide, which brought vic-tory to all the other Republican candidates from the area assembly districts. Dooley scored a 4,891-3,507 win over his opponent Atty. John Giulietti, a political novice making his first bid for political office.

Bolton's popular incumbent State Representative Dorothy Miller won election to still another term in the state legislature, defeating her Democratic opponent Chynthia Wilson 5,461-4,335, in the 55th

assembly district. Ellington's Daniel McKeever defeated his neighbor Iris Stein 4,767-3,902 in the 57th assembly

district. Coventry's Town Councilman Jesse Brainard defeated Atty. Richard Cromie 4,983-4,304 in the 53rd Assembly District. Cromie had survived a Democratic primary challenge brought by Tolland's Town Chairman Charles Thifault, and managed to carry the town of Willington, although Brainard won Coventry and Tolland by substantial margins.

Voters turned out in large numbers in the area towns ranging from a high of 91 per cent in Bolton to a low of 83 per cent in Coventry.


