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Britain Follows Lead

Great Britain has imposed a freeze on wages, prices, dividends and rents, in an effort to halve the rate of inflation, which has been galloping at nearly ten per cent a year.

Prime Minister Edward Heath largely borrowed President Nixon's inflation control program but apparently hoped the emergency would be short-lived. He said the initial phase would last 90 days, with a possible 60 day extension

The pound, which has lost seven cents of its purchasing power in the last week of October alone, steadied at \$2.321, indicating a new

Heath, like Nixon, planned a second, longer phase involving ceilings on wages and prices and relying primarily on voluntary restraints rather than statutory

Nixon's program, announced 16 months ago, has slowed the rate of inflation. It was coupled with insistence upon cooperation from our major trading partners to ease the dollar drain because imports were running ahead of exports. Large sales of grain to Russia and China also helped.

Inflation is a paramount problem of Britain and the United States, along with other industrial nations and others as well. Increased productivity its battle against inflation.

As with the season, the

iming is not always the same. If major economic turns are feared, you may expect the forecasts to be tardy. If the weather looks good, so to speak the forecasters feel confident. details. Output of goods and services, for example, is seen rising by \$100 billion. Last year the figure was \$100 billion. Such an achievement would mean the production of \$1.26 trillion worth of goods and services. The consumer is expected to continue both spending and saving, which is what he did in 1972. After-tax income is expected to rise 9.5 per cent, compared with 7 per cent this year. Savings are projected at 7.4 per cent of after-tax income a very high rate, fractionally higher even than this year.

The average price level is foreseen rising slightly to 3.6 per cent from a rate for 1972 that might be under 3.5 per cent. "Ilnemnloyment will continue to be an economic and social problem in 1973," the poll indicated. "As was the case in 1972, stickiness in the unemployment rate will reflect a swelling in the number of job-seekers

rather than the economy's in ability to create new jobs." A record increase of more than 3 million jobs is anticipated. There is considerable variance among economists regarding the course of corporate profits, primarily because of uncertainty regar ding the application of profit margin controls. This is the

consensus:
"Higher volume, some price increases, and a reasonably good hold on unit labor costs are expected to contribute to a 13 per cent hike, to nearly \$61 billion, in after-tax profits. That forecast also sounds like 1972, when corporate profits began growing after several years of drought.

(Continued from Page 1) valiant men who fought and died in the most costly and bitter war in history. It was the hope and dream of Americans-that the world was then indeed safe for democracy. President Wilson believed that henceforth nations would work together as community maintain the peace of the world, the peace won so dearly. And so it seemed proper that the war's end should be celebrated as a

national holiday. Proclaiming the first Armistice Day, President Wilson said:

'To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service, and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us, and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the council of

'We now know, however, that peace commands continuing effort and renewed sacrifice. In December 1941, American's again stepped forward to defend those things which they hold most dear - peace, freedom and the right of peoples everywhere to determine their own futures. in war and peace, has been "Regardless of the overall

changes that have occurred and will take place, the military will continue to remain unchanged in spirit and principle. Those ideals to which American servicemen have devoted their lives and energies for more than two centuries will yet be the foundation upon which the military rests. Discipline and self-sacrifice, courage and dedication will continue to be demanded of its troops as they shoulder the responsibility for the nation's

"All of us gathered here today are beneficiaries of the veterans that we honor. The privileges and freedoms we enjoy, that we take to be an American birthright, were won by these men and women at great cost. She brings life to the arts when she makes a story out of a painting, or an opera or a piece of music. She almost literally wraps herself around her girls enveloping them in her aura of romance. As Miss Brodie says repeatedly, "Give me a girl in her impressionable years and I will make her mine.

It is not with malice, nor a devious hypnotic power that she seems to mesmerize her girls, but it is more a fulfillment of an often referred to unrequited love. She experiences a vicarious fulfillment, instead, through her girls and what she wilfully anticipates in their lives. Miss Brodie reminds her girls often that she is in her prime, but you wonder if, in doing this, she is perhaps trying to preserve her prime from passing. BIA Building Damage Soars

WASHINGTON (AP) -Militant Indians who occupied the Bureau of Indian Affairs left damages estimated at \$1.98 million and stirred bickering among other Indians on how to deal with the protesters.

The Interior Department said Friday that when the Indians ended their seven-day seizure of the building they took or damaged some 600 to 700 paintings valued at about \$1,000 each and artifacts valued at about \$150,000.

In addition, the government estimated, it will cost \$700,000 to restore 7,000 cubic feet of destroyed or stolen records, \$250,000 to repair damage to the building, and \$280,000 to replace furniture and office machinery.

While two Indian groups did not condone the damage to the BIA, they differed on what should be done in the wake of the protest.

The National Congress of American Indians, created in 1944 and the oldest and largest national Indian group, called for a wholesale re-evaluation of the BIA in line with the

protesters' suggestions. The National Tribal Chairmen's Association, which was created in 1971 with the encouragement of BIA Commissioner Louis R. Bruce, said the demonstrators should be prosecuted. BIA and Interior officials responsible for failing to protect the building should be

fired, said the NTCA. The association called for full prosecution of the "dissident urban-oriented Indians who

took control of the BIA building

The NCAI distributed \$66,650-from the Labor and Transportation Departments and the Office of Economic Opportunity-to the Indians as they left the building Wednesday to assure their having a means of returning home, said Charles E. Trimble of the NCAL

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
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

The purpose of National Children's Book Week is to call attention to the need for good children's books.



Each year since 1921 there has been a Children's Book Week poster designed by a well-known children's illustrator. This year's poster was il-lustrated by William Steig, the author of the 1970 Caldecott Medal winner, Sylvester and the Magic Pebble.

Each year the Children's Services Division of the American Library Association awards the Caldecott and the Newberry Medals. These medals are presented for books published the year before. The winners are announced in January and the awards are presented in June. Both awards were started by Frederick G. Melcher who helped start Children's Book Week.


Super Sport: Evonne Goolagong
















Bird of the Week: The Penguin


