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Censorship Grinding Down

The more than 300 editors and publishers from throughout the emisphere who attended the annual. meeting of the Inter-American Press Association in Santiago, Chile, hardly needed to be told, as they were by the owner of a Dominican Republic newspaper, that freedom of the press "has undergone an alarming deterioration" in the past year.

The meeting convened amid warnings that the Chilean government would not tolerate any attacks on itself or other

"progressive" nations of Latin America. In Chile, there is no official press censorship, but newsmen have been nder increasing pressure. The governnent of Marxist President Salvador Allende Gossens has filed some 120 lawsuits against newsmen. Some have been jailed pending trial.

Tuition Relief

An idea being adopted by a number of colleges and universities around the country promises some relief to students - and their parents - from soaring tuition costs.

Entering freshmen are given a, guarantee that their tuitions will not increase during their four years of study.

With tuitions rising by as much as 10 per cent annually at some schools in recent years, it is estimated that a student could save in the neighborhood of \$1,000 during his or her college career, depending upon the initial tuition.

Officials cite two major advantages of guaranteed or fixed tuition: It should lead to an increase in the number of freshmen entering a school and a decrease in the number of school to complete their education.

Officials of private schools also believe that more parents would be willing to send their children to private colleges or universities if they knew what the exact cost would be and could plan accordingly.

At least one college will adopt a five-year guaranteed tuition plan in the fall of 1973, citing an additional advantage.

Since more and more students seem to want to take a hiatus in their college experience to work or travel or study abroad, the five-year plan will enable them to do this, and will encourage them to return to the

t looks brutal. The pansy lants that have been growing in a field for three months have just succeeded in producing their first blossoms and the long beds, from a little distance, are like colorful carpets. Close-up, they are gay with pansy "faces" in yellow, white,

blue, red and purple. Toward you, down the row of pansy plants, comes a young man steering a rotary mower, hopping off the blossoms like o much lawn grass. The crop f pansy plants at Woodland Gardens, on Manchester's Woodland St., is being prepared for winter. The blossoms are being cut so that the strength of the plants will go into the

ormation of more buds for loom next spring and not into the development of unwanted eed pods. We used to pick the

blossoms by hand," says John Zapadka, head of the family-owned business. High school boys went through the beds, stooping and squatting, to nip the blossoms off, one at a time. Then somebody thought that a power mower might do the job ust as well, and so it does. One boy, steering a self-propelled nower, does the work formerly ione laboriously by a crew. He can't walk directly behind the mower as he would in cutting grass. He walks, as intructed, in the narrow path between two beds of flowers and reaches out to steer t nower down the row. The whirling knife slashes through the blossom stems and some of he top leaves, chops them into iny bits and throws them out a charge chute as mulch.

seasons. Seed for this crop was sowed outdoors, in comparatively small seedbeds, in early August. The small plants were moved into the larger beds in early September. They have been fertilized, watered and weeded to maintain active growth, and, as expected, they started to bloom n late october.

The lawn mower doesn't get every blossom and every bud, out neither did the boys who once did the job by hand. It does clip most of the mature blooms. already fertilized, that would develop seed pods. Small buds, ust forming closer to the ground, are untouched and will continue to grow on warm days
