Who Will Guard the Guardians

In these days of traditional politics. not only is everyone complaining about the government, but they are also trying to do something about it. One of the latest things in government reformation comes from political scientist Theodore Becker, a professor at the University of Hawaii. Becker proposes that a countergovernment be elected to do nothing else but keep track of what the established government is doing.

In a new book, "Government

Anarchy and the POGONOGO Alternative," Becker writes that we must "reverse the apparently relentless trend toward a government beyond law that has become the American political tragedy of the 20th century." Becker's evidence for this trend includes unhappily such familiar incidents as the Chicago "police riot" during the 1968 Democratic convention, the Kent State shootings, My Lai and the Chicago 7 Conspiracy trial (his book was written before the LaVelle case and the charges of alleged corruption in the Nixon administration became public). But one doesn't necessarily have to agree with his specific complaints to agree with his basic premise that our governmental system needs help.

His solution is an escalation of the ombudsman system - instead of just one man or a committee performing the watchdog function within the government apparatus, he would create a new parallel government. This would be something like the British "shadow government," in which members of the out-of-power party pick individual government officials and spend a lot of time kibit-

"If the other side enters into these negotiations with the same spirit of good will that has characterized these sessions since Oct. 8, we would expect a

successful outcome," he said. Kissinger announced Oct. 26 that a final set of meetings, lasting perhaps three or four days, should wrap up the talks. His announcement came after North Vietnam released details of a tentative nine-point plan

for a cease-fire. Since then, South Vietnam has raised several questions have appeared to delay final agreement. And North Vietnam said Thursday it will resist any effort to make substantive changes in the original draft settlement.

Kissinger and Nixon met for 40 minutes Friday at Camp David, Md. Ziegler described the President as "providing direction to Dr. Kissinger." He said the two men are in daily contact by telephone.

The armed forces chief also said the 77-year-old Peron and his third wife, Isabel, could leave the airport hotel where they spent the night and move to a \$96,000 villa in suburban Vicente Lopez purchased by loyal Peronists last

Peron had protested the Martinez, secretary to the junmassive security measures ta, told an impromptu news covering his arrival Friday at Ezeiza International Airport, including an order that limited welcoming delegation to

Peronist leaders had predicted more than a million persons would go to the airport 30 miles west of Buenos Aires to greet the former populist president who ruled from 1946 to 1955. Thousands tried, forming at least nine marching columns, but they were turned back by some 30,000 troops ringing the airport and dispersed by volleys of tear-gas

One of Peron's first acts was to cancel a news conference scheduled for Friday afternoon, saying he would not meet with journalists before he could 'make contact" with his party

The report, presented to representatives of the 25,000member society at a convention, said the lesson from the recent conflicts between media and government is: "... The people will have to firmly establish their power to govern.

"It's the lesson of the Pentagon papers; it's the lesson of the imprisoned reporter Peter Bridge; it's the lesson of the Defense Department's suppression of the Peers Report about the My Lai investigation," said Dick Fogel of the Oakland (Calif.) Tribune, chairman of the committee.

The report also described the work of the News Acess Committee, a group of jour-nalists which joined a battle to assure umimpeded rights of news access at the United Nations. The controversy began when

the U.N. ousted two Taiwan ournalists on the demand of the People's Republic of China, which replaced Taiwan as a U.N. member.

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

Newhart hopes it is because
he doesn't feel like dropping
\$100,000 for nothing.

He's figured out that it's cost him that much in canceled nightclub bookings to do the show. Anytime a man turns his back on \$100,000 he'd like it to be for a good

"I didn't take the show for the money," he says. "I took it for the long-term invest-ment."

He's finding it tough in one area. He has to memorize a whole mess of lines. In his nightclub act he just sort of talks it. He's been doing it so long it's all second nature. But on the TV show he has lines to learn and he has to stick pretty close to what's in the script.

He says at first he pasted them up on convenient spots on the set — behind chairs, on the back of lamps, any-where the camera wouldn't show them. But he found that looked kind of awkward. He'd be supposed to be talk-ing to his costar Suzanne Pleshette and on the screen there he'd be, talking to the back of a lamp. So now he's back of a lamp. So now he's doing it the hard way-committing every line to mem-

On the set he's not above a little kidding around. When the director Alan Rafkin suggested he back up a hair, he pulled out a hair from his head and backed up.

Later, Rafkin focused on Later, Raikin focused on Marcia Wallace, who plays his receptionist, and Newhart, with mock sarcasm, said, "If I'm getting in Marcia's picture, just tell me."

But he had his lines memorized. He'd check with the script girl—"Is that right, Rosemary?"—and 9 times out of 11, he was right.

It's not like his nightclub

It's not like his nightclub act. There he can play around. He has his stock bits and he tells them in whatever order he thinks will suit a particular audience.

"It's like going down a long corridor with many doors leading off it," he says. "Sometimes I walk straight through, sometimes I take one side door, sometimes another.'

Here, though, he's trapped by the script. So far, he's enjoying it and he thinks the show is coming together. There's one big plus. He's home most of the time and spends more time with his

For one member of the Newhart clan-Robert, 9the series has another big plus. Young Robert is a big fan of the reruns of I Dream of Jeannie, the Barbara Eden series. One of the stars of that show was Bill Daily, and Daily is now on Newhart's show.

Newhart says one of the big drawbacks is the all-tooreal problem of raising children while being a celebrity.

"Timmy, who is 5, goes up to people in supermar-kets," Bob says, "and says, 'My Daddy has a TV show. He knows his Daddy is dif-ferent from other Daddys, from the lawyers and the garagemen.

The Virginia Thanksgiving Story of 1619





"The First Thanksgiving" is the name of a painting that hangs in a shrine at Berkeley Plantation near the 1619 landing.



At the site of the landing, actors yearly re-enact the Virginia Thanksgiving on the Sunday before Thanksgiving Day.

Thanksgiving 1972

On December 4, 1619, a small group of Englishmen landed at Berkeley Plantation on the James River near what is today Charles City, Virginia. When they stepped ashore, they held one of the first Thanksgiving services in English speaking America.

This Thanksgiving was held one year and 17 days before the landing of the Pilgrims on December 21, 1620 and just about two years before the Thanksgiving feast in Plymouth on October 15,


The group of Virginia settlers was led by Captain John Woodliffe. His tiny ship was the "Margaret." It had set sail for the New World from Bristol, England on September 16, 1619.

We know about this Thanksgiving from the old papers of the London Company, the group that owned the land and sent the settlers. The order to them read:

"... the day of our ship's arrival at the Plantation in the land of Virginia shall be yearly ... kept holy as a day of thanksgiving to Almighty God."

One reason that we have heard so little about this Thanksgiving is the fact that just about all the settlers were killed in Indian raids in 1622.

Religious services are an important part of Thanksgiving. Churches all over the country will be having their own Thanksgiving services, a custom observed years ago by the early settlers, in Virginia and later in Massachusetts.

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


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Super Super Sport: Mark Spitz


