

Secret Peace Talks Resumed In Paris

PARIS (AP) - Henry A. Kissinger resumed his secret peace negotiations with Hanol's Le Duc Tho in Paris today amid indications that their governments are determined to seek a quick settlement.

The chief obstacle appeared to be the South Vietnamese government's insistent demand for withdrawal of all North Vietnamese troops from South Vietnam. But Kissinger gave no indication how strongly he would insist on this point.

Peron Seizes Initiative

BUENOS AIRES (AP) - Juan D. Peron, in Argentina only four days after 17 years of exile, has seized the political initiative from the ruling military junta in determining the course of the elections scheduled for March 11.

Bolstered by thousands of cheering, chanting supporters, the 77-year-old ex-dictator met Sunday night with leaders of the other major political parties. They accepted insults and catcalls from the crowd to attend a meeting called by Peron at the three-story suburban home purchased for him by his supporters.

Peron was to continue his meetings with political leaders today to strengthen his position in any future negotiations with

the military government. There has been no major reaction so far from the government except for a warning that it would take any measures necessary to maintain order around Peron's house.

About a thousand militant Peronists camped overnight around bonfires in a vacant lot across from the villa and on neighborhood lawns. More than 10,000 had gathered there after Sunday afternoon soccer games, but this was far less

than the 50,000 who packed the narrow, tree-lined street the night before. Among the men meeting with Peron Sunday night was Ricar-

do Balbin, head of the Radical party and a key figure in Peron's plan to form a political alliance to offset the armed forces.

Balbin had to run a gantlet or 200 young Peronists who shouted insults and guerrilla slogans at him, he told a news conference later: "We have spoken of the responsibility of political parties and the necessity of common action."

President Nixon's chief foreign policy adviser said on his arrival Sunday that if Tho and his associate Xuan Thuy showed "the same spirit of understanding and flexibility which characterized our meetings in October, a rapid settlement of the war is probable.'

Kissinger and Tho drafted an agreement last month calling for an on-the-spot cease-fire throughout South Vietnam, followed by withdrawal of all American forces, release of all prisoners of war and elections in South Vietnam under international supervision.

Brandt Wins Mandate

BONN (AP) - Willy Brandt, bolstered by his greatest personal election triumph, had an overwhelming mandate today to pursue the tension-easing policies that won him the Nobel Peace Prize.

A record number of West German voters gave his Socialist-Liberal coalition 54.3 per cent of the 37.4 million ballots cast Sunday against 44.8 per cent for the conservative Christian Democrats. This meant 272 seats for Brandt in the 496-member Bundestag, the lower house of Parliament, a solid majority of 48.

Anti-Abortion Stay Left

In Effect

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. Supreme Court today without comment or dissent denied a motion that would have left Connecticut without an anti-abortion law.

The court refused to vacate a stay granted Oct. 16 which restored the state's new antiabortion statute.

The stay remains in effect and thus leaves the state's antiabortion legislation on the books pending a final ruling by the Supreme Court on the statute's constitutionality.

Women vs. Connecticut had asked for the high bench to vacate the stay. The group has won a challenge against the law but that victory is being

But the stunt did underscore omething many people have long spected: Mail service in the United States is not above criticism. That criticism, in fact, has been expressed on the highest levels of the govern-

For instance, Maryland Sen. Mathias complained a few months ago that he missed a luncheon because the invitation took 13 days to reach Washington from Baltimore. Texas Sen. Bentson grumbles that service in some rural areas is slower than in stagecoach days.

Not that there haven't been im provements. The Wall Street Journal reports that parcel damage claims have been cut by 25 per cent and uotes a postal official as saying "We've stopped throwing packages."

And last March, inspectors found a railroad car full of parcel post packages on a siding in Perryville, Md, that had been missing for more than two years.

Nevertheless, the reorganization of the old Post Office into the quasipublic Postal Service in 1970 has yet to produce the kind of service the public demands. Not getting that service, the public is turning increasingly to private carriers. Some indications:

The well-known United Parcel Service has captured half or more of parcel post volume in some areas. It delivered 608 million packages in 1971 and its employes have risen to more

The Innocent

The Independent Postal System of America, started in Oklahoma City in 1968, now operates in 80 cities. It has been opening new offices at the rate of

Incidentally, in August the IPSA recently won a federal court case brought against it by the American Postal Workers Union challenging its right to use the terms "post," "postal" and "postmaster" and seeking to prohibit it from delivering

The city of Kent, Ohio, was the scene of a different kind of protest in June when the local of the National Association of Letter Carriers cited the "health and safety" hazards of plastic bags being used by independent carriers to hang advertising matter on the doorknobs of homes. The bags could suffocate kids, they

said, and be a signal to burglars that nobody was home.

When first-class mail jumped from six to eight cents last summer, an electric company in Virginia began delivering its own utility bills, at a projected savings of \$200,000 a year. Facing stiff rate increases, magazine publishers and bulk mailers are looking for ways to deliver

without using the mails. All of which is to the good if it puts the Postal Service on its toes. Certainly, it ought to stimulate it to meet the legislative requirement of the reorganization act that created it that it eventually become self-paying. The service, says Postmaster General Elmer T. Klassen, is "passing through a period of necessary, if sometimes uncomfortable, adjustment."

But if private firms can deliver the mail efficiently and at a profit, maybe the Postal Service someday will, too. It seems to be what the public wants and is willing to pay for.



Strike **Costly To** Hawaii

HONOLULU (AP) -Hawaii's food prices, already among the highest in the United States, are rising again — because of a strike more than 2,000 miles away.

Shoppers are paying 33 cents a pound for potatoes for which they paid 23 cents a few weeks ago, 59 cents for tomatoes that used to cost 49 and \$1.33 for ound steak that was \$1.29. The price likes are due to a new disruption of the island state's vital shipping links to the U.S. mainland, the fourth in

the past 1% years. The strike by the Masters, Mates and Pilots Union against the Pacific Maritime Association, now in its fourth week, has left only two shipping com-panies, Seatrain and U.S. Lines, operating normally to Hawaii. The association is headquartered on the West Coast.

Food merchants, finding themselves unable to get space aboard ships for their supplies, are turning to air cargo, a considerably more expensive delivery system. Jack Cavallero, district

manager of Safeway, one of the state's largest supermarket chains, said his company is flying in meat, produce, frozen ms and dairy products and is

passing the higher cost to the customer., Neil Sutherland, district manager of Foodland, another large supermarket chain, said his company is doing the same Store managers report a slight increase in customer complaints but no noticeable decrease in purchases of the higher-priced goods. In some cases, flying in a food em costs more than the item





HARTFORD (AP) — Despite all of Connecticut's anti-pollution efforts, the state still hasn't seen much improvement in air quality, says Environmental Protec-tion Commissioner Dan. W. Lufkin. "We've made great progress, in my judgment," Lufkin said in a broadcast interview Sunday, "But if the question is 'Have we made significant inroads in the air of our state?' the answer is 'no'."

Lufkin said that fighting pollution is "a cumbersome, detailed, technically involved, long-term" process that takes time to accomplish. He said citizens sometimes see legislation passed to provide the "wherewithal" for
