By Earl Yost For the third time in the 32-year history of the Connecticut Sports Writers' Alliance, a Manchester man will step front and center to receive one of the coveted gold keys.

January 27, 1973, Thomas F. Kelley, retired Manchester High School teacher and coach, and long-time football official, will celebrate his 72nd birthday. Two nights later-Jan. 29 - Kelley will join Floyd Little as one of the three recipients at the annual Gold Key Awards Dinner at the Hartford Hilton. The third winner will be announced

McCluskey, who went on to greater fame as a track star after graduating from Manchester High, won 25 national championships during a great career which started at Fordham University and ended with the New York A.C., which included two berths with U.S. Olympic teams. McCluskey was a key winner in 1946. Wigren, retired track and cross country coach at Manchester High, was honored by the writers in 1956.

Kelley's coaching and teaching career spanned 42 years at MHS. For 40 years he coached baseball, 1926 thru 1947. Three of his prized baseball players, Tony Lupien, Moe Morhardt and Tom Kelley, (no relation), made it to the major leagues. Kelley is still pitching with the Atlanta Braves in the National League.

Besides turning out many find individuals and teams, Kelley was also a first-class, highly-rated and respected referee in the elite Eastern Intercollegiate Athletic Football Officials. New York Chapter. He was called upon many times to work important college games throughout the East with plush assignments the Army and Navy game and several Orange Bowl attractions. The Silk Towner worked college games for three decades.

A graduate of Bates College, Class of 1922, Kelley lettered in baseball, basketball and football. He

quarterbacked Bates for three seasons and captained the gridders in his senior year. His greatest day as a football player came against New York University when he raced 50, 60 and 80 yards for touchdowns.

During his football coaching career at Manchester, Kelley's teams won 103 games, lost 57 and played 11 ties. He won four CCIL titles and turned in undefeated seasons in 1938 and 1943. On the baseball front, his Red and White teams won 325 games, lost 223 and played two deadlocks. Twice his clubs won the state title and on nine occasions the CCIL crown belonged to Manchester.
