#### Unemployment Contribution Rate Raised

HARTFORD (AP) - All employers in Connecticut who pay into the unemployment compensation fund will have to per cent contribution next year, Labor Commissioner Jack A. Fusari reminded businessmen

The increase in payments for some employers is required by the low balance in the fund, Fusari noted.

The fund, which is maintained entirely by payments from employers, provides unemployment compensation to jobless workers.

At present, contributions range from 2.1 per cent of the first \$4,200 of each employe's annual pay to a maximum of 2.7 per cent. The rates have been set according to each employer's unemployment experience, with the highest rates paid by businesses with the biggest layoffs.

Fusari also announced that so-called "itinerant" unemployment compensation offices will be closed next year. These offices, located in Wallingford, New Milford, Rockville, Pawcatuck, Old Saybrook, Plainfield, Jewett City and Stafford Springs, had been open one day each week to serve claimants in their areas. After the end of November, the claimants will have to report to the nearest Labor Department branch office.

#### Comptroller Has Trouble

HARTFORD (AP) - State Comptroller Nathan G. Agostinelli said Friday he would like to issue monthly reports on the state government's fiscal situation, but the finance commissioner isn't giving him enough information.

"I've made several requests for the information to Commissioner (Adolf) Carlson, but I'm still waiting for a reply," Agostinelli said. "I'm thinking of sending him a registered letter." Agostinelli said in an

interview that the dearth of fiscal reports is not his fault. The last report to come out of the comptroller's office was the annual report required by law. It was issued at the end of August and concerned expenditures and tax revenues for the previous fiscal year.

The Democratic legislature, which will be succeeded next year by a General Assembly dominated by Republicans, has frequently complained of a lack of fiscal information from the administration of Republican Gov. Thomas J. Meskill.

# Booming

TRENTON (AP) - Business is booming for the first daily public lottery in the nation. That was the word from lottery officials here Friday, when the 50-cent tickets went

on sale in thousands of stores throughout New Jersey. "They're selling extra well," said Jerry Davis, a district office manager for the New Jersey Lottery Commission. "We're getting a lot of

calls for more tickets." New Jersey has had a weekly public lottery since January 1971 but went to a daily opera tion because of dwindling ticket sales. With daily offerings, the state hopes to increase public excitement and, for the first time, enter into direct competition with illegal numbers operations.

In the beginning, the state hopes to sell an average of 3.3 million daily tickets a week.

Not only is New Jersey trying to compete with organized crime, it hopes to out-sell its other competitors, New York and Pennsylvania, which began weekly sales in 1972.

From a peak of \$29.3 million in gross revenues in April 1971, weekly sales plummeted to \$15.3 million last month. At one point, New Jersey was selling nearly 10 times as many tickets a week as New York. Last month it sold only twice as many.

With a daily operation, the state expects to produce a net revenue gain of \$25 million a

Daily tickets cost 50 cents, and payoffs will range from a high of \$2,500 to \$2.50. Odds of winning the low prize are 26 to 1; the high prize, 100,000 to 1. The top prize in the weekly drawing is \$50,000.

Beginning Wednesday, drawings will be held Monday through Saturday.





Harrison H. Schmitt Our Last Men on the Moon

The month of December will mark a first and a last in man's conquest of

The 69th anniversary of the first flight by man in a power driven plane will be December 17.

The last scheduled manned moonshot by our country will be December 6 when the Apollo 17 launch is scheduled. This will probably be our last moon landing until sometime during the next century.

#### The First Flight

The inventors of the first "flying machine" were Orville and Wilbur Wright. The pilot of the first flight was Orville.

This flight took place at 10:35 o'clock on the cold winter morning of December 17, 1903, at Kill Devil Hill, a huge sand dune about four miles from Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The flight lasted 12 seconds and covered 120 feet.

The Wright brothers made four flights that day. The longest was the fourth, piloted by Wilbur. This flight lasted 59 seconds and covered 852 feet.

#### The Last Moonshot

The final moonshot mission will last for 14 days. While the astronauts are on the moon, they will try to find out the following:

1. Has the moon given off any heat in the last three billion years?


2. What happened on the moon during the period between three and four billion years ago?


3. How were the great lunar basins

4. Though surface water has been discovered on the moon, is there any water below the surface?

5. What causes the differences in samples taken from different areas of the moon's surface?

### **Guess What?**

The Apollo 17 shot will go up at night!

This will be a night launch because the moon landing must take place at a certain time in order to have the correct sun angles for some of the experiments. The time of lift-off was computed backward from the time of the experiments needed to be conducted. The landing site will be the Taurus-Littrow highlands. This is close to the moon-landing points of Apollo 11 and Apollo 15.


This will be man's longest stay on the moon!

The Apollo 17 explorers will be on the moon's surface about 75 hours, or four hours longer than any other astronauts have stayed. Mission planners hope this will give the astronauts a more relaxed schedule. They need more time to do such things in the lunar module as eating, stowing containers, housekeeping, and getting ready to put on their space suits for walks on the moon. Other crews have had to rush to get these things done in time.

Three astronauts will dock their spacecraft to the laboratory May 1 and begin a four week mission. Later, a second, and there a third crew, will carry out missions in the Skylab.
