Bus Impasse Continues

Goldfarb said that even if the Greater Hartford Transit District agreed to accept Meskill's offer to pay 25 per cent of the deficits the strike would probably continue. The union has struck on a statewide basis, he said, and has fought any effort to split the

Pakistan Releases Prisoners

LYALLPUR, Pakistan (AP) President Zulfikar Ali Bhutto freed the 617 Indian prisoners of war in Pakistan today in an attempt to rally foreign pressure for the release of the 91,000 Pakistanis held by India.

"You are free from this moment," the Pakistani president told the Indians during a visit to their camp at Lyallpur, 175 miles south of Rawalpindi. He said it is now up to India to recipricate by releasing the Pakistanis it holds but, "if not, then we can wait. We are brave

There was no immediate reaction from the Indian government. India has said it would return the troops and civillans captured during the war last December only with the consent of Bangladesh, and Bangladesh says Pakistan first must recognize formally its

A Foreign Office spokesman said the Indian government would be notified officially today of Bouto's action. He said it was boped the freed men could go home in a few days. Bhutto, sitting on the ground in a courtyard of the prison camp, told the Indians

"You can go home happily and tell your people we want good relations with India. Do not think you have defeated Pakistan; Pakistan defeated itself. If there is another war, which I hope will not be, you will see how we fight.

The National Safety Council, which does not keep a weekend tally, had estimated that from 580 to 680 persons would die in traffic accidents over the holidays.

The meetings came amid speculation by administration sources that an interruption in the Paris peace talks may mean the United States has decided to tell South Vietnam that no more concessions can be won from North Vietnam in

Meanwhile, North Vietnam's official newspaper said hopes for peace have begun to dim following what it called an about-face by the United States and "insolent demands" by President Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam

Ellsworth Bunker met with Thieu for 10 minutes today, but there was no announcement of what was discussed. One source said Bunker may have delivered a private message from Nixon to Thieu.

Thieu's senior foreign policy

adviser, Nguyen Phu Duc, was expected to arrive in Washington from Paris today or Tuesday. The White House said over the weekend that Nixon had agreed to a request from Thieu to receive Duc for discussions of the ceasefire negotiations in Paris.

Administration officials had said as late as Friday that Nixon would not meet Duc, and the apparent change of mind was regarded by other sources as significant.

The President met with Kissinger twice while in New York - for an hour late Saturday night, after Kissinger returned from Paris, and again for an hour Sunday morning.

Some observers suspected that a decision by Le Duc Tho, Hanoi's chief negotiator, to remain in Paris while Kissinger returned here for consultations indicated the main negotiating problem is between the United States and Saigon.

Mystery Submersible May Be Gone

OSLO (AP) - The Defense Command says the mystery object trapped in the Sognefjord for the last two weeks - presumably a foreign submarine - is believed to have left Norwegian territorial waters and the search for it will be reduced gradually.

A communique said visual and technical observations gathered, since the search began indicated a foreign submarine was in the fjord but its nationality was not established.

The command said the "great hunt" for the object was extremely difficult because the inlet is 100 miles long and 3,900 feet at its deepest point.





particularly of schools, have skyrocketed, so have property tax As times and the economy have changed, the property tax has taken on regressive characteristics. Its original basis was ability to pay, since in earlier eras real wealth was largely in the form of tangible property. Today only about a third of the

citizenry's holdings is in this form. The result is that the tax now falls more heavily on the moderate to lowincome citizen, particularly the elderly, whose homes represent their major or total worth, than it does on the more affluent with fluid assets. Additionally, in far too many

communities the assessments on which the tax is based are unequal, frequently amateurishly determined in the first place and long overdue for updating. But a comprehensive reassessment is a tedious, expensive and controversial chore which few communities are eager to undertake. Against all arguments against the

An increase in state income tax was, in fact, tied to the Michigan proposal. HARTFORD (AP) - "I don't think there's any question

but that we'll get a tax reduction," says state House Speaker-elect Francis Collins of Danbury.

The only questions are when and how much, Collins said Sunday. Any tax reduction by the new Republican-controlled 1973 General Assembly will be tied to a general tax reform

package, he said.

Before considering a tax reduction, Collins said he wanted to study the report of the Governors Commission on Tax Reform, slated for mid-December release.

"I think we have to tie a tax reduction into that long-range tax reform package," Collins said.

Collins, appearing with Sen. Lewis Rome, the new Senate majority leader, on WTIC's "Face the State" program, scoffed at a I per cent sales tax reduction passed this month by the current Democratic controlled Senate. He said the Democrats were politically motivated in passing the bill.

The bill, which Gov. Thomas J. Meskill has indicated he would veto, comes before the lame-duck House Tuesday.

Both Rome and Collins said it was unlikely the new General Assembly, which convenes Jan. 3, will consider

General Assembly, which convenes Jan. 3, will consider stepping into the state's current bus crisis.

"I don't think the vast majority of the legislators want to get the state in the operation of buses," Rome said.

Collins said the legislature has already "given the tools!" to local governments in the form of power to form local transit districts.

"I think from a legislative standpoint we're not going to do ything further until we look into a long-range solution,"
