





Research May Aid Retarded

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Coco signs for her dinner, signs for her drinks and signs whenever she wants to go out. Coco, a 28-pound baby gorilla at the San Francisco Zoo, is being taught sign language by a Stanford University graduate student in developmental psy-

chology. Her teacher, Penny Patterson, 25, believes her research with the gorilla is unique and hopes it will help in using sign language as a teaching aid for retarded children

"Teaching a primate sign language is not new, but I think Coco is the first gorilla to be used in such research," said Miss Patterson .

She is patterning her research after that of two University of Nevada comparative psychologists who uccessfully chimpanzee 200 signs in five

years. Miss Patterson began working with the 16-month-old gorilla four months ago and now spends up to five hours a day with her.

In her daily sessions, Coco

signals for a drink by placing her thumb to her mouth, asks for food by placing all of her fingers to her mouth and signs to go from one section of her glassed-in room to another by making an outward motion with her hand.

And she's working very hard on the signs for "more" and

"The desire for food and drink are strongly motivational, and teaching Coco these signs was relatively easy," Miss Patterson said. "I began by molding these signs for her. I would put her

hands in the food or drink sign and then give her a bottle or some food."

Coco, who craves grapes and grape juice, gradually learned the signs and no longer requires the stimulus of a bottle or food. "Sign-language grammar is different from that of any other language, and I hope to learn a great deal from Coco. The order in which she uses the signs is very important, especially when she uses a series," Miss Patterson said. It is important to determine whether the gorilla's sign word order is based on context or imitation, she said.

"I am striving to interpret e context in which she uses the signs because that is

important in the analysis of a child's language." Eventually, Miss Patterson will compare Coco's progress with a 2-year-old deaf child's acquisition of sign language and then plans to write her doctoral

dissertation on her research with the gorilla.

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

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California Workfare Progressing

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) California's able-bodied welfare recipients are begin-ning to trade welfare grants for pay checks under a mandatory work program, state officials

One-time recipients are working as auto mechanics, busboys, sheet metal workers, barbers, warehousemen and in other fields, says Bill Lawson of

the Department of Human Resources Development. In the six counties where the 4-month-old program is operating, 2,707 welfare recipients have been classified oyable, Lawson said. Of that total, 1,127 - or 42 per cent - are on regular jobs in private industry, 230 others are in training and 184 have been given "work experience ssignments," he reported. An additional 371 have been

kicked off welfare rolls for refusing to take a job or training, Lawson added. Those for whom the state's

unemployment office can't find a job immediately in the private sector are working for ocal governments in various jobs such as school crossing guards and parking lot attendants, Lawson said. Their only pay is their welfare

"They're not just raking leaves," Lawson said. "It's work that needs to be done bu otherwise wouldn't be done without raising taxes. And gives them work experience don't forget that."

The department claims more than 50 per cent of the recipients have moved into private jobs or job training and only about 7 per cent are in public service work.

Mandatory work assignments are limited to 80 hours monthly n the public service sector Recipients who fail to accept "suitable" job offers or quit looking for private employment lose their welfare benefits, Lawson said. Gov. Ronald Reagan's administration estimates some 30,000 persons will eventually be included in the program as it is expanded to

The program is intended to reintroduce the principle of the work ethic to our way o ife," Reagan said, adding the jobs are screened to avoid taking employment away from persons not on welfare.

The administration hopes to have 35 of California's 58 counties participating in the program by next July, HRD Director Sigurd Hansen said. That would mean about half the imployable welfare recipients in California will be in the program, he added. About 1.25 million

Californians are on Aid For Dependent Children rolls. The job-finding program is run jointly by the state's

employment office, state welfare office and county

welfare offices. "The ultimate goal of the program is to find regular jobs or employable welfare recipients - help them move from a situation where they are 100 per cent dependent on state aid into full time employment in the private sector," Hansen

The program exempts persons under 16 years of age and those over 65. Mothers who ake care of children aged 6 or inder also exempted.

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


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'Public Be Damned'

The issue is no longer whether citizens of Connecticut's large metropolitan areas will have a Viable bus service. The issue has deteriorated into a standoff where political mileage appears to be more important than the needs of those who have, in good faith, come to depend on bus transportation.

A special assembly session to deal with the matter has, to this date, accomplished nothing other than to solidify positions which seem to be political poles apart.

The private companies have all but abandoned the fight in the hope that the public pressure would force tax subsidies into their coffers. But it appears the public is not buying a bus subsidy without more detailed spelling out as to the limits, if any, of this proposed new mouth to feed out of the public trough.

The union, by and large, has been cooperative in keeping the buses going under the old contract for several weeks but no one really expected this to continue indefinitely and no one should have expected the worker to bear the brunt of what is basically a nanagement-political dilemma.

The users of the bus, we feel, may have been too idealistic in that they may have felt the politicians, the companies, and the workers would not

allow bus service to stop completely But it has.

Time clearly has run out for all concerned. Action must be taken soon for unless bus service is restored soon, much of its business may be lost forever. Once customers find alternative means of transportation, they are going to be harder to convince they should return to buses which may or may not be running tomorrow.

Clearly it is time to quit pointing the finger and start pinpointing a solution. Connecticut can survive without mass transit. But does it have to? The state and local governments can keep passing the buck back and forth, but aren't the tax dollars coming from the same source? The companies can document losses from now until doomsday but how about some management proposals to improve bus service and attract new fares so this service can again become profitable? And the employes can help by suggesting ways and means to cut costs without affecting quality of service.

What we are asking is for those involved to look at the whole ball of wax and be prepared to give a little or we will have to conclude, as some already have, that our leaders in both parties believe, like a robber baron a century ago, that "the public be

Striker Loophole Pinches Employer

One of the more unusual strike situations in the country is that against Dow Chemical's Bay City, Mich., plant.

Thanks to a legal loophole, 135 out of 166 workers who have been on strike since Feb. 6 are collecting tax-free unemployment checks. What galls the company is that under Michigan law, the money to pay the workers - more than \$2,500 a week - is charged back to Dow.

The loophole was created by a 1968 court ruling that arose out of a labor dispute involving Great Lakes Steel Corp. During this strike, several skilled tradesmen took jobs with another company, only to be laid off by their new employers a few weeks later. They filed for, and were denied, unemployment benefits.

The case went to the Michigan Supreme Court, which ruled that a striker is entitled to unemployment benefits earned while working for his primary employers if he obtained subsequent employment, no matter how short.

According to Dow, its Bay City strikers got one-day jobs, some of

them working as little as an hour or two in total. They then filed for unemployment benefits, which average \$79 a week.


"The strikers are so well off that they aren't inclined to give anything away'in bargaining," complains a Dow spokesman.

Not that one can do much high living on \$79 a week. The situation is, however, one more example of something which many feel threatens the balance of the collective bargaining process - the trend toward giving more and more public assistance to striking workers.


According to one estimate, the cost of food stamps and other welfare aid to strikers could reach \$304 million nationwide in 1973. The public is not only getting stuck with the tab for these welfare subsidies, critics charge, but it is also bearing the burden of longer and more frequent strikes.

In the meantime, both Dow Chemical and the U. S. Chamber of Commerce have filed suit in Federal District Court asking that this particular loophole be declared il-

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



Rent Watch Produces **\$** Results

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government claims its tionwide "rent watch" has been a rousing success, preventing thousands of illegal rent increases while turning up only a handful of violations. The Nixon administration put the rent watch into effect early this fall after Social Security benefits for solitad social Security benefits for retired people were increased 20 per cent. The watch was designed to prevent landlords from wiping out the Social Security gains by creasing rents. The Internal Revenue Service

nvestigated more than 90,000 rental units in a two-month period, finding only 24 minor violations and one violation that has been turned over to the Justice Department for

ition, IRS received 2,178 complaints. It has completed investigations of 1,462 of these complaints, uncovering 404 violations, most of them so technical that they were. corrected immediately. IRS has assessed 15 landlords with penalties totalling \$28,819. Four of these cases have been settled and collected and the remainder are on appeal. IRS says the rent watch still in effect and reports of legal rent increases levied on the elderly receive expedited Officials at the Cost of Living

Council said the rent watch will continue as long as needed. They dismissed any notion that it would be abruptly dropped, giving landlords a chance to boost rents of old people. Traditionally, retired persons have faced rent increases shortly after Congress raised Social Security benefits. "The rent watch is not going

to end with a bang, but with a whimper, for precisely the purpose that rents could be raised after it goes off," said one Cost of Living Council

Ed Preston, assistant IRS ioner, said the results of the rent watch have been 'rather impressive'' in ting rent increases.

While the IRS is no longer while the IRS is no longer conducting spot investigations, he said, "If we started getting any feeling that rents were being abused, we'll start get-ting into high gear again." An exception to the general trend during the rent watch has been in public housing, where the amount of rent hinges on a tenant's income. The Cost of Living Council said the Housing and Urban

said the Housing and Urban Development Department prevented widespread rent in-creases for retirees living in

public housing by insisting that local housing authorities maintain their usual schedules of reviewing the income of tenants every one or two years, instead of taking the extra money into account immediate-

Some local housing authorities follow policies of taking increased income of tenants into account immediately, the council said. HUD allowed this practice if housing authorities had such a policy prior to the rent watch. Preston said although complaints have been few, rent increases in the public housing sector have caused some embarrassment although they are perfectly legal.

Andover **Here Are Major Changes** In Subdivision Rules

What's New Perhaps the most radical ifference between the old and proposed regulations is what is called a "Municipal

than 12 homes must put an amount equal to three per cent of the total sales price of the developed property into a fund which will be owned and used by the town for capital provements, such as the building of schools, road building and maintenance, and expansion of municipal

The fund would work thus: If a developer proposes building new homes at an average sales price of \$30,000, he would have to place \$54,000 into the fund. This figure would be paid in over the course of the time it takes to complete the evelopment and occupy the

The money would stay in the fund, accummulating interest, until such time as some municipal service or need arose. Perhaps the need for a few additional classrooms would occur within three years of completion of such development. If it did, there would be some money available for this purpose.

Cluster Housing For the first time since zoning in Andover, the regulations make provision for what is termed cluster housing. This type of housing permits the construction of single, multiple family, apartment or condominium units in any combination, in any density, in all areas of the town.

The total density of cluster housing units cannot exceed that called for in a particular zone, although it can be concentrated in a small portion of the land to be developed. In an R-40 zone, which now permits one home per acre, a builder can construct, for instance, 100 dwelling units, including homes and/or partments in an area as small as 2 or 5 or 10 acres; however, the total acreage of the tract must equal 100 acres (for 100 units). This remaining acreage will be developed into parking areas, playgrounds, recreational facilities and open space, and be deeded in perpetuity to the combined owners of the various cluster housing units.

The developer of such "minitowns" created by the cluster housing concept will also have to put an amount equal to 21/2 of the total sales cost of the housing units into the same municipal improvement as the subdivision developer to provide for extended municipal services.

Minor Subdivisions

The commission has provided in the proposed regulations for "Millior Subdivisions," which includes those developments of 12 homes or under on existing streets, where no new streets are required.

The application procedure for minor subdivisions will be onsiderably shortened from that for regular subdivisions, and will allow for approval by the commission chairman and

secretary.

The fallures of Apollo 1 and Apollo 13 taught hard lessons and confidence. The last result is Apollo 17, the spaceship which benefitted most from mistakes of the past.

Apollo 1 failed before it ever got off the ground, killing three astronauts as they ran a routine

On Jan. 27, 1967, astronauts Virgil L Grissom, Edward H. White II and Roger B. Chaffee were perched atop the rocket scheduled to launch them into space the next month, first of the manned Apollo missions. Chaffee's voice suddenly cut

through on the communications circuit with the words; "We've got a fire in the spacecraft." A blaze, aided by the pure oxygen atmosphere of the craft and by its flamable materials, seared through Apollo 1. Within seconds, intense heat inside the spacecraft ruptured its hull, By the time workmen

could open the spacecraft, i was too late. The astronauts died on their space cabin In the months that followed, the Apollo program went through an intensive selfexamination. The result was massive changes in procedures,

design and equipment. Out of the Apollo 1 accident came new materials, spaceaults, communications systems and wiring. Research nunication onducted because of the tragedy produced flame-

esistant materials which toda are widely used by industry. By October 1968, a new Apollo pacecraft that was sale

stronger and better designed was ready to fly. The second major Apollo failure occurred April 13, 1970 more than 200,000 miles from earth on man's third lunar

Apollo 13 astronauts James Lovell, Fred Haise and John L. Swigert Jr. were streaking outward at about 2,100 miles an hour when they heard what Lovell called "a rather loud bang."

An oxygen tank had ruptured. Within minutes the command ship's supply of air the crew needed to breathe had flushed into space.

The astronauts quickly opened a hatch into their still attached lunar module. The little craft that was designed to land on the moon became the first space life boat.

For more than 80 hours, while their spacecraft looped around the moon, streaking earthward, the astronauts fought to stay

alive.

Apollo 13 splashed down in the Pacific Ocean, its crew safe. And the second major investigation of the moonprogram was started.

Months of investigation and testing uncovered the probable cause of the explosion malfunctioning switches and wires with burned insulation inside an oxygen tank. .

To prevent another such ccident, a third oxygen tank was installed in future Apollo spacecraft. Wiring was removed from inside the oxygen tanks. Procedures were changed for testing the spacecraft oxygen systems.

The Apollo program had other, small problems which also required "fixes." A light-ning bolt which hit Apollo 12 shortly after liftoff brought new rules about launching in marginal weather. A docking problem in Apollo 14 produced more reliability in space linkup. A parachute which collapsed as pollo 15 was returning to earth caused changes which produced a better parachute system.
