The Shield Laws **And Politicians**

As anyone knows who watches the pro football games on the boob tube, it can be very important to the outcome of the game to have the right man carrying the ball at the right time.

Now this analogy may not seem to pertain to the present concern being expressed, pro and con, regarding shield laws which would enable a newspaperman to protect his confidential sources of information before grand juries, etc.

But a bit of background might help set the scene. The present discussion came to the fore with the sentencing of a New Jersey reporter to jail for failure to answer questions put to him by a grand jury.

The principle involved is how far can a reporter go in protecting the source of his information. Traditionally, there has been a tacit understanding that this was part and parcel of the general freedom of the press concept in our Constitution which states "Congress shall make no law...abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press."

But the ordinary citizen can be compelled in court to "tell the truth and the whole truth" except if such testimony be self-incriminating. Thus the issue in a practical sense becomes one of whether by a shield law, we grant a reporter a professional exemption similar to that enjoyed by clergymen and lawyers.

Now before making a snap udgment on this issue, it would be wise for us in the newspaper profession and the citizens as a whole to keep our eye on who is carrying the

We can say that within the profession there is mixed emotions about shield laws basically. First, the matter of defining by statute as to what qualifies a person as a "professional journalist" might be unconstitutional in itself for any restriction as to who might practice the profession inherently limits freedom of speech and the press.

Second, assuming the profession should feel such laws are needed to end the increasing desire of courts, committees and what have you to, in effect, draft reporters into doing their legwork; can such a law be drafted which will control effectively the use of confidence between a reporter and a news tipster so that the reporter and his editors do not have to mandatorily contract a confidential relationship with all news sources?

We fear that any legal recognition given to such a relationship could be a step backward in that it is difficult enough now to get certain people in

the know, so to speak, to speak out without giving them another barrier of secrecy to hide behind. The value of confidential information hinges on many factors which we think is difficult to define in a statute. The present "gentlemen's agreement" approach, while it has meant some reporters going to jail because they gave their word to protect a news source, still leaves the reporter carring the ball and not some court attempting to interpret a statute as applied to a given case.

Third, since the professional has not reached an understanding as to the need for a shield law and much less what form such a law should take; we are deplored with the debate over politician-proposed shield laws. These men, for whatever reasons they have of their own, have intercepted the

Since much of the confidential information obtained by investigative reporters affects directly and indirectly the political "profession," we are deeply concerned as to their motives and their ability to write a shield law which would protect reporters from politically-motivated efforts to quash a reporter's investigative attempts or harass him for something he has uncovered and published.

Granted, the concern for shield laws is ideally motivated by a need to protect reporters from political harassment from without or within the judicial system, but the nagging question of who should carry the ball, in establishing by statute the means of doing this, is important.

We agree a "grubby little press card" does not make a person a professional journalist any more than winning an election makes a politician a statesman.

Maybe the test of the journalism profession is not the protection and privileges we are able to extract for ourselves from government but rather the integrity of practicioners who over the years have dug out the stories that have tumbled political dynasties and who believed the power of an aroused and informed citizenry was all the protection they needed in pursuing their professional obligation of meeting the public's right to know.

Before the shield law issue is settled the ball will change hands many times; right now we don't like the fact the politicians are carrying it. As a matter of fact, how did they get into the game in the first place? Maybe this is the question we in the profession and our readers should be asking ourselves.

Yet, until fairly recently, many people in this country had never eaten it. The Spanish introduced the garbanzo, as they call it, to the West Coast. On this side of the country, the Italians and Middle Eastern people brought it first, more recently the Puerto Ricons and

The chic pea is as old as man.

The peas can be eaten raw rom the pod as we can eat the green pea though I have never seen them this way. In some countries, they are ground and used for flour. They can be toasted and ground for use in a hot beverage as is the coffee bean. The chic pea is an mportant protein legume and, as such, is valuable to certain poor societies.

We sometimes see the word 'chic'' spelled with a k on the end - chick. The French call it pois chiche, the Italian ceci and Arabs call it hommas or hummus. In India it is known as gram. I find that there are three varieties - white, black and red with the white being considered the best. It is the white that we use though it is actually a yellowish-beige in

Chic peas can be boiled. roasted, used in soup, salad and as a snack either plain or sugar-coated. The Middle Eastern peoples make a popular dish called tahina or taheneh which is a thin paste made of crushed semame seeds or sesame oil and cooked chic peak flavored

dried or canned. Both come in peas when soaking - some add stores, the dried peas are sold in bulk and taken home in a paper bag. If you should buy them dried, they will, of course, need to be soaked overnight as any other dried pea. Who like this soup as thick as you can buy chicken broth in large cans that is very good for this purpose. Should you find chicken broth alone too rich, any other dried pea. My mother learned how to add some water.


