

national interest. The result has been silly things like railroads being taxed to subsidize airports for its competitors and rates juggled to political needs rather than left to be set by competitive ability to serve the customer most efficiently.



Mixed Views Given On Toll Evasions

HARTFORD (AP) - More people than ever are resisting the urge to drive through the busiest Connecticut Turnpike toll stations without tossing their quarters into the baskets mainly because of state police traps, says Gov. Thomas J. Meskill.

But a Bridgeport newspaper says it's still a free ride for out-of state toll evaders, who can safely tear up their police citations because of the difficulties of extradition.

Meskill said Friday that the toll station traps have cut in half the number of toll violations at the busiest stations on the western end of the turnpike.

When the Transportation Department placed a special watch on toll gates in late September, cars were trying to evade paying tolls at a rate of 65,033 during a 20-day period Meskill said.

During a similar period in November, after state police had arrested hundreds of motorists for alleged toll evasion, the 20-day total was down

to 34,666, Meskill said. The latest figures show that more than 1,000 arrests have been made at the toll booths since the traps were put into

effect. However, the Bridgeport Post reported that Connecticut courts have found their hands tied when out-of-staters fail to show up in court to face toll evasion charges, which are punishable by a maximum \$10

Under a "no bond agreement" between Connecticut, New York, New Jersey and New England states, no bonds are requested of the operators who receive summons for motor vehicles

offenses The only apparent recourse the state has in the prosecution of toll evaders, the paper said, is to issue a re-arrest warrant for the driver, if the driver doesn't appear in court to

answer the charge. However, Lt. Eugene Griffin, commander of state police Troop G in Westport, said that such a warrant would bring into play the expensive extradition proceedings between states. He added that the chances of the re-arrest warrant ever being actually served are almost nil. On Monday, in Bridgeport

Space Workers Plan Strike Over Pay Cut

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) - A father of four whose pay was cut almost in half says he and 59 other aerospace workers will go on strike in efforts to halt next Wednesday's Apollo 17 moonshot if their salaries aren't restored.

Nineteen months ago, Bob Miller, 40, a technical writer for the Boeing Co. at the Kennedy Space Center, was making \$260 a week. But his salary was cut to \$135.20 when Boeing won a contract to take over the dwindling spacelaunch program for the National Aeronautics and Space

Administration. Miller does the same work and occupies the same desk as he did before the salary cut. "We took this cut and

accepted it because the national situation looked bad." Miller said of the economic outlook at the time. "But the first thing that

happened was that NASA got a pay increase, other contractors got pay increases, food prices have gone up, everything has

"We don't want to interfere with Apollo because we love the program," Miller said. "But. when someone interferes with your living, or harasses your children, you do something and you let people know what's going on. That's our democratic

Miller works with engineers in the Skylab program in preparing reports on the design progress. On Apollo 17 launch day, his job is to conduct guided tours for visiting dignitaries if he isn't out on strike.

Most of the other 59 union members are in public affairs, graphics and typing positions, Miller said. They are members of Local 780 of the International Alliance of Theatrical and Stage Employes.

He said the absence of the 60 from their jobs on launch day alone would not halt the launch. But the actions taken by other unions in response to their strike could effectively disrupt the last planned Apollo flight to the moon.

NASA estimates a one-month postponement which would be necessary if a strike forced cancellation of Wednesday's scheduled liftoff would cost \$10.5 million.

For Miller, the strike would be a big risk, he said. His family life has suffered since the salary cut, and he works at night in a Melbourne department store in efforts to make ends meet.

He said his savings are all gone and the cost of supporting his wife Velma and four young children is leaving his budget as much as \$100 a month in the

Group Reports Sales Of Unsafe Toys

WASHINGTON (AP) -Volunteer shoppers in 17 states say they have found on store shelves hundreds of unsafe toys the government banned as long

'It is an absolute scandal that toys banned for two years are still being sold to unsuspecting consumers," Bob Chlopak of the District of Columbia Public Interest Research Group told a news conference Friday.

A year ago, for example, the Food and Drug Administration announced the recall of hundreds of thousands of squeeze toys, rattles, flutes, music boxes, dolls and electric

The FDA said the toys could gouge, stab, cut, burn and shock or were likely to be swallowed. Chlopak's consumer action

group said besides toys the government says it banned, student volunteers and housewives around the country found another 1,000 others they considered to be equally dangerous.

He said most of the dangerous toys were those with squeakers likely to be dislodged and swallowed by children.

In all, 382 banned toys were found, he said. Afterwards, Chlopak said he could not tell from the state reports how many in the total represented different individual toys and how many were the same model found in quantity or in different stores.

agency, under the federal Toy Safety Act, had banned 830 types of toys.

"Parents have confidence in the toys they buy, because they take for granted that someone in the government is looking out for dangerous toys," the report said. "The public's faith in regulatory agencies is often un-justified by agency performance."

The FDA and the Toy Manufacturers Association acknowledge that hundreds of banned toys are probably still being offered for sale, but Malcolm Jensen, head of the FDA's bureau of product safety, denied the charges of poor performance.

'To the contrary," he said, we feel we have removed millions of toys from the market. We believe this Christmas will be a far safer Christmas than in the past





Hanukkah Is a Happy Jewish Holiday



Lighting the Hanukkah candles is an important event! The candle she is holding is called the Shamash.



Hanukkah (HAH-noo-kah) is a Jewish holiday that started on December 1 and will last for eight joy-filled days. It is called the "Feast of Lights."

It is a very important Jewish holiday. It marks the world's very first fight for religious freedom, some twenty-one hundred years ago.

During Hanukkah, Jewish boys and girls observe many customs.

They light candles in the Menorah (ME-NO-rah). This is a special candlestick, that holds eight candles with one place left over to put the Shamash (SHAH-mash). The Shamash is the candle that lights all the other candles. On the first night of Hanukkah, one candle will be lit. On the second night, two candles will be lit. This goes on for eight happy nights. The candles burn until they go out. New candles are used each night.

The Jewish people exchange gifts during Hanukkah. Some times they give all the gifts on one night. Sometimes they give gifts every night during the celebration.

They also sing Hanukkah songs and play games.

They play with a special top called a Dreidel (DRA-dle). The Dreidel goes back to ancient times when the Jews were not permitted to worship as they pleased. They would gather in secret, and someone would preach. If an enemy approached, they would get out a Dreidel and start playing. In this way the soldier did not know what they were really doing.

The boys and girls also get gifts of money during Hanukkah. The money is called

1 tablespoon of butter per piece of bread




Melt butter in medium heat frying pan. Brown bread on both sides, turning carefully. Add more butter if needed.






Two Kinds of Elephants INDIAN
