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## **Apollo 17: 'Conclusion** Of the Beginning'

Such is human nature that when the voyage of Apollo 17 passes into history, even those who have been most critical of the space program may experience a feeling of nostalgia-and perhaps even pride-about having lived through one of the most exciting and significant eras in human history.

Appropriately, the last manned American mission into deep space of possibly decades to come will be both the most spectacular and the most scientifically rewarding flight of the entire Apollo series.

Among the "first of the last" will be the first nighttime launching, scheduled for 9:53 p.m. Wednesday. If conditions are clear, the tail of fire of the mighty Saturn V rocket will be seen by millions within a 500-mile radius.

The two members of the Apollo 17 crew who will land on the moon on Dec. 11-moon-voyage veteran Eugene A. Cernan, commanding, and geologist Harrison H. Schmitt-will stay for a record of 75 hours and make three outside excursions of seven hours each. The third member, Ronald E. Evans, will remain in moon orbit in the Command Module.

Schmitt, incidentally, will be the first scientist-astronaut to have participated in a space flight.

Also to be recorded in the log of Apollo 17 will be some 26 experiments and investigative tasks the astronauts will conduct, nine of which, in this ast-chance endeavor, will involve cientific instruments never flown before. Like their predecessors, the stronauts will probe into the moon's istory, seeking more clues as to its rigin and that of the universe itself. Another 200 pounds of lunar rocks

and soil will be brought back to earth. These, along with an accumulating mass of data from instruments left on the moon, will keep scientists busy for years and help to bridge the gap that is foreseen between Apollo 17 and man's next venture to the moon or another planet.

It is difficult to believe that it all began a short 15 years ago, on Oct. 4, 1957, when the first Sputnik shocked the world into the realization that a new age had dawned and that a "new ocean," as John F. Kennedy later described it, beckoned mankind.

Though it is history, it is difficult to believe that the successful landing of men on the moon and their safe return to earth was accomplished by Apollo 11 on July 20, 1969, a little more than nine years after President Kennedy enunciated the goal.

It is difficult to believe that when Apollo 17 splashes down in the Pacific on Dec. 19, this brief era will have ended

But it will not be the end. As Eugene Cernan said recently, "It's just the conclusion of the beginning."

Skylab, the manned earth-orbiting laboratory, lies ahead, as does the development of reusable shuttle rockets and the first joint U.S.-Soviet venture. An American space probe continues to wing toward Jupiter and beyond. Mariner 9, still in orbit around Mars, has photographed that planet's entire surface. An instrument landing on Mars, designed to seek evidences of life, is scheduled fo

Aware that he will be the last Apollo stronaut to leave the moon, Cernan eflected on what he would do and think at that moment.

"I'll probably stand there and look back at the earth. I will contemplate fantastic series of events that brought man to the moon. And I'll look at the planets and the stars, and I'll dream of man one day going there,

The Apollo saga will be ended. But not the dream.
