

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Stop Hijackings Now

Airline travelers are going to face new and stringent inspection of their persons and their baggage, and pay more for their tickets as well, in the new federal drive to stop plane hijackers before they can board at any of the nation's 531 airports.

President Nixon has decided to issue an emergency requirement that the airports provide armed guards to help intercept potential hijackers before they can reach the loading gate

Pressure for greater precaution has mounted since recent hijackings obviously endangered the lives of passengers. Members of the Airline Pilots Association demanded "stop hijackings now" at their meeting in Las Vegas and considered "suspension of service" as a lever to gain more effective prevention.

Holiday travelers carrying gift packages may find themselves delayed as the airlines plan to open all packages for inspection to guard against weapons or explosives being smuggled aboard.

The American Telephone and Telegraph Company reports that some 22,000 of its subscribers are withholding payment of the federal excise tax on telephone service in protest against the Vietnam war.

This is an increase from 17,000 in 1971 and 12,000 in 1970.

The Internal Revenue Service has been trying to get AT&T to disconnect the protestors' telephones, but the

Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., New Jersey Democrat, addressing the pilots, predicted swift enactment of tough air piracy laws when the new Congress convenes Jan. 3.

The Senate earlier this year approved a bill which provided for airport security forces, compulsory screening with metal detectors of all passengers, and authorizing the President to suspend air service by American carriers to nations that harbor hijackers but the bill died in Congress.

Unfortunately, months will be required to implement the broad new initiatives. Guards are available now at only 123 airports and are too few to cover every boarding at these major ports which account for 90 per cent of passenger movement.

Probable source of funds to pay for more guards would be a modest ticket

Meantime, efforts to reach agreement with Cuba, the haven sought by most U.S. hijackers, should be pushed as the quickest means to deter hijackings.

NEW YORK (AP) - For 39 seasons the Pittsburgh Steelers have been sort of like the "nice guys" of the National Football League. Not that they've always finished last. But they've never finished first.

On Sunday-and with a little bit of help from Cincinnati on Saturday-the Steelers can finally achieve that goal, a championship, mainly the American Conference Central Division crown. Pittsburgh has to beat Houston and the Bengals have to defeat Cleveland to make the Steeler dream come true. Then there's Atlanta. The Falcons, in only their seventh NFL season, are vithin a victory of a title, too. They need some help, too. If Atlanta can knock off San Francisco on Sunday and St. Louis can upset the Los Angeles Rams, the Falcons will own

the National Conference West crown. And there's Green Bay, hardly a stranger to championships but a preseason pick this year to be a bystander to the NFC Central brawl etween Minnesota and Detroit.

The Packers, at 8-4, hold a oneame lead over the Vikings and Lions. But, unlike the Steelers and Falcons, Green Bay needs no help to clinch its ivision. A victory over Minnesota will wrap it up. In 1828, Dr. Joe Robert Poinsett brought the first poinsettias to this country from Mexico. There is a legend that a little boy had nothing to take to church as an offering on Christmas. He picked a weed and laid it on the altar. As it lay there, it turned into a beautiful, star-shaped flower.

The Christmas Tree

There are many stories about how the first Christmas tree was trimmed. One is that the famous German preacher, Martin Luther, started the custom. He was walking home one starry Christmas Eve night. He cut down a tree, took it home, and trimmed it with candles. The candles stood for stars.
