#### Year-Round Daylight Time **Option Sought**

HARTFORD (AP) - Year round daylight saving time would help cut the crime rate, wo Republican legislators said as they called for congressional action to allow states to postpone sunset during the winter months.

"Young and old alike fear to be out on the streets after dark," said Rep. Gerald F. Stevens, R-Milford, the house majority leader in the 1973

legislature. Stevens also said that by keeping daylight saving through the late fall, winter and early spring, stores would do more business in the average of the stores. usiness in the evening and here would be fewer auto acidents during the evening rush


Federal law now requires all Federal law now requires all states using daylight saving time to go on standard time during November, December, February and March. States can, however, decide not to use daylight saving time at all, and Stevens and Rep. John A. Fabrizio, R-Norwalk, said they will sponsor a resolution in the General Assembly next year urging Congress to allow states the additional option of remaining on daylight saving time all year round.

### Picking A Christmas Tree

Barbara Dunn, commissioner of the department of consumer protection, today announced that buying a Christmas tree in volves several considerations just as in shopping for other consumer products, and has suggested the following to help consumers in selecting a tree:
1. Run your finger down a dather to each twig if the tree is fresh. Also, needles should adhere to each twig if the tree is fresh. Also, needles should spring back in place. Freshness is an important consideration for 2 reasons: (a) appearance and (b) safety-fresh trees are form the ground lightly to see that the needles are firm hy trees. Shake or bounce the trees in the stand.
2. Check the limbs; they

If the tree is very fresh, the trunk butt will be sticky with

2. Check the limbs; they should be strong enough to hold ornaments and strings of lights. Is well supported, and be sure the tree is placed away from fireplace, radiators, electric beaters, talevisions or any fireplace, radiators, electric heaters, televisions or any other source of heat. 4. Never leave your house or

4. Never leave your house or apartment with the Christmas lights still on. Never use lighted candles—or any other form of flame—on or near your tree. Check electric light cords for fraying and worn spots that could cause fires.
Remember: The longer the tree is indoors, the drier it gets, even with daily watering, and the more likely it is to catch fire!

## **Top Pro Grid Award** To Redskins' Brown

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Larry Brown has joined his boyhood heroes and he finds it hard to believe he's done it with only four years in the National Football League.

Brown, the 202-pound running back of the Washington Redskins, was named Thursday winner of the annual Bert Bell Award given to the outstanding pro football player of the year by the Maxwell Club of

Brown's name was added to a list of pro football's outstanding players — John Unitas, Norm Van Brocklin, Paul Hornung, Andy Robustelli, Jim Brown, Pete Retzlaff, Don Meredith, Leroy Kelly, Roman Gabriel, George Blanda and Roger Staubach.

"I remember when I was real young I used to watch these players on television, and never realized that some day I would be recognized for the same award," Brown said.

The selection of Brown, who has become the only player in National Football League history to pass 1,000 yards total offense four consecutive years, was no surprise. The designation of Brad Van Pelt. ## **Canadian To Head New Year-Round Worldwide Agency**

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - The United Nations went into a year-round fight against waste and pollution today, armed with elaborate new machinery especially created to monitor and improve the environment.

Maurice F. Strong of Canada, the newly elected executive director of the U.N. Environment Secretariat, planned to set out for Nairobi, Kenya, to lay the ground work for setting up the secretariat there late next
