The Pope told a crowd of 3,000 at his weekly public audience in St. Peter's Basilica he had hoped peace would return to Vietnam by Christmas.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chief of the Los Angeles Times Washington Bureau, jailed briefly for refusing to surrender tapes he said were confidential, will remain free until a federal appeals court rules on his test of the First Amendment freedoms. The Times' John F. Lawrence

was held in contempt of court Tuesday by U.S. Dist. Judge John J. Sirica who ordered the newsman jailed "until he purges himself of contempt" by turning over the subpoenaed tapes.

Lawrence was held for about two hours until the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ordered him released.

At an emergency hearing today, the appeals court decided Lawrence would not be returned to jail pending 'further consideration of papers and argument before this court." No date was set immediately for continuation of the case.

of the news media to perform its news-gathering function." Defense attorneys in the case asked that the tapes be

Sirica ruled that the Constitution's guarantee of a free press does not give newsmen the right to keep secret any information that could be used as evidence in a

criminal trial. "This is an issue that had to be fought," Lawrence told reporters after his release Tuesday. "I'm only shocked that I had to go to jail before this issue has had a full hearing. "We seem to be in

competition with the fair-trial idea, and the free-press side is not being given enough weight."



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New U.N. Agency **Has Little Power**

The newly-created United Nations Secretariat on Environment starts out with two strikes against it.

While recognition is embodied in it of the fact that pollution and natural resource waste does not respect or stop at national borders, the new agency has little power other than public opinion to correct any pollution or waste problems it may be able to

This is but a mere reflection of the fact the U.N. itself is relatively powerless to act unless it has support of major powers; which in the case of the new agency are perhaps the biggest offenders in the areas of international pollution and resource waste.

Second, the location of the new agency's headquarters in Nairobi isolates it from where the action is. Although opposed by the major powers, the site was a political concession in line with increasing practice of the international body to scatter its agencies throughout the world whether or not the site selected

Castro's Christmas Gift

Fidel Castro may have decided it would be a gain for Cuba if he got along better with the United States and it changed his image from ruthless Communist dictator and exporter of violence and revolution to that of a responsible head of state in favor of law and order and human freedom.

Or he may have coldly judged that boarding fugitive airline hijackers and holding thousands of Cubans against their will cost more than it was worth.

In any case, Castro now is pursuing discussions with the United States through the Swiss ambassador, which may end Cuba's role as a haven for criminal hijackers.

And the Cuban ruler has permitted a temporary resumption of the "freedom flights" from Cuba to Miami, which permitted families to be reunited.

The flights, shut off abruptly last May, were resumed Dec. 11 and one flight a day, five days a week, for the



BOSTON (AP) - Joe Paterno, the successful footbal coach at Penn State who has been mentioned recently as possibily moving to the professional ranks, says he has only one thing on his mind right now: winning anothe college game.

The stakes this time are the Sugar Bowl where his tean will meet Oklahoma on Dec. 31. Among the available pro positions is a job with the New England Patriots, who lack both a coach and a general manager. Paterno's name has cropped up quite often in the Boston press with one newspaper - The Boston Globe reporting that Paterno has been offered a \$1 million, fiveyear contract to help bring the Patriots out of the

In a telephone interview at his home in College Parl Pa., however, Paterno brushed aside questions about a job offer with the Pats.

"I'm only interested in concentrating on the Sugar Bowl zame," Paterno said. "Of course I'd be interested in talking with the Patriots at a later date." He said he hasn't talked with any Patriots' officials,



Q. My husband died in August ind had to be out of work over a year due to a heart condition. He never filed for disability benefits because he intended to return to work. Can I file for iny benefits due him?

A. Yes. Under the new Social Security law survivors of a disabled worker may file for any disability benefits due the leceased. However, they must do so by Feb. 1, 1973.

O. My husband was disable for four months before he died. Was he entitled to disability benefits? He worked full-time until he became disabled.

A. A person must have been disabled for six months before their death to be entitled to lisability benefits.

Q. My husband died in 1970 and was disabled well over siz months before he died. Can l now file for disability benefits due him or is it too late? A. The new law provides that

applications for people who lied before Oct. 1, 1972 must be filed by Feb. 1, 1973, if any application was never filed. Q. If a worker that was disabled and never filed for disability benefits before he dies in December 1972, when must the survivor file for

enefits that may be due? A. An application for eceased disabled worker must be filed within three months


after the month of death. Q. Where can I get more information about the new Social Security law?

A. You should contact the East Hartford Social Security office at 657 Main st. (corner of Pitkin St.). The phone number \$ 244-3717.

Q. When can a person file for isability benefits for deceased vorkers?

A. If there is any possibility of benefits being payable, an application should be filed immediately. Any question about filing should be resolved by contacting the Social Security office.
