



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The Nixon Administration proposal to give the Federal Communications Commission new broader rules under which network radio and television newscasts would become the responsibility of local station manage-

ment is ominous. Ominous for two reasons. First, it continues the dangerous trend of more and more restrictions upon freedom of the press by federal government at a time when this freedom should be broadened.

Second, in the case of the electronic media, it represents a blatant attempt to exert economic pressure (that is the threat of lifting a station's operating license) to influence news content presumably in the direction that meets with federal bureaucratic

Ironically, the concept of the socalled "fairness doctrine" in telecasting and radio, originally intended to protect the viewer or listener from slanted or bias news on the part of station owners, the networks and electronic news personnel; does not seem to apply to government officials who are the most prone to use slanted news or biased pronouncements as they defend their positions or attack their critics. Unfairness to most public officials, high and low, is most often a catch-all which really means, "Damn you, you aren't believing my lies."

This latest sortie into the field of "news" management by the administration is a very fundamental threat to our society because it goes beyond reasonable regulation into the area of throught control.

It is an insult to every thinking American in that it implies we are so enthralled by a newscaster's voice or beauty that we accept his pontifications as second only to the Sermon on the Mount.

'Fairness Doctrine,' **A Real Threat**

It disrupts the free flow of ideas information, criticism, debate and news enterprise by degrading editorial content decisions from its lofty purpose of the people of the people's right to know, to what some ederal bureaucratic snoop who got his job as political reward might think about it

Before any of us go off the deep end and buy the idea that electronic news will become more "objective" because local stations can censor network news programs; just remember it is easier to browbeat a 98-pound economic weakling than it is a 220-pound professional boxer.

This is the essence of the new administration's tactic. It is designed solely to fragment the network not because they are biased, not because they are wrong; but because they have, in the highest tradition of a free press, refused to come to heel to the would-be evangelicals who permeate both major political structures today.

While we do not always agree with the editorial content and positions taken by our fellow newspaper editors and quite often are at odds with out counterparts in the electronic media; there is one thing we feel any journalist worth his salt will agree on. That is government, no matter how enlightened, no matter how benevolent, no matter how free, is the last thing which should have control over what we print, what we say, and how we do it.

To allow this to happen is to open the door to thought control and the death of democracy as we know it in America today.

Our credo in the profession and as citizens today should be more than ever before: "I may disagree with what you say, but will defend to death your right to say it."

A Worthy Example

Praise is due Town Manager Robert Weiss and Chief of Police James Reardon for their action in employing three disabled veterans to man the complex radio and dispatch center now being installed at the station.

Their employment will result in freeing trained officers for street duty. But more important, we think, is that the veterans are being given an opportunity to follow a most satisfying and useful vocation. It's good to see municipalities

employing disabled veterans and where applicable, such a practice should also be encouraged by business and industry.

Suit Filed **Against City Of Stamford**

HARTFORD (AP) - Four Stamford apartment house owners and a construction company have filed a federal suit eeking to prevent the Stamford enforcing a new minimum housing standards ordinance.

The plaintiffs claim that the ordinance, scheduled to go into effect Jan. 1, violates the 14th Amendment to the Constitution in that it deprives the plaintiffs if their property without due process of 'law and discriminates against owners of certain apartments.

The suit centers around a certificate of apartment oc cupancy which, under the new ordinance, must be issued very time a new tenant moves into a building which is over 15 vears old.

The plaintiffs claim this is discriminatory since apartments under 15 years old are not affected.

The health director can withhold the certificate if code riolations exist and issue when violations are corrected.

The suit claims that the ordinance contains no rovisions for the procedure of uing the certificate nor does contain a time limit within which the health deirector must act. This, says the suit, deprives plaintiffs of their property without due process of

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

For most foods temperature is a far more important quality determinant than imply elapsed time, food experts point out shelf life of a product, for example, can be reasonably determined only if the product is kept at the correct temperature. It the product is mishandled will lose quality rapidly.

The phrase "open dating" generally refers to any date on a packaged food product that can be read and under-

tood by the shopper. It may be shown as a combination of letters and numbers — Feb. 23, or in numbers only -2-23 or 02-23. It may or may not include the year. With the "pull date" this repre-sents the exact date the product must be removed from the shelves:

Santa Uses Airplane In Alaska

ARCTIC VILLAGE, Alaska (AP) - The C130 Air Force cargo plane -- its drone echoing off a long-barren, snow-capped mountain ridge - made three rumbling passes over a nearby

Below, parka-clad old women and red-cheeked children, giggling with excitement, huddled close to a roaring bonfire to keep warm.

On the third pass, a handful of paratroopers - clad in red ump suits, one of them wearing a white beard dropped from the belly of the

On the way down, the airmen shouted, "Merry Christmas;" but their voices were lost in the 40-below-zero temperatures that gripped this isolated cor-ner of Alaska where caribou outnumber the Asthabascan Indian inhabitants.

Christmas had come to Arctic illage, 150 miles north of the Arctic Circle and 75 miles from he nearest community.

Santa Claus came five days early, forsaking his sleigh for a C130. It was the shortest day of the year, when the moon shines brightly at noon and daylight comes and goes in a few hours

The occasion was the eighth Christmas mission to the village by members of the 17th Tractical Air Lift Squadron from Elmendorf Air Force Base near Anchorage.

The plane lumbered in for a landing on the frozen lake. where airmen were greeted by nearly all of the 103 villagers as they unloaded 7,300 pounds o toys, clothes and food donated by Anchorage merchants. When he presents had been passed out, the entourage traveled b snow machine and dog sleds th mile to the village for a buffet lunch in the community hall.

Despite his heavy arctic gear Santa Claus suffered a frostbitten ear, but the kids didn't seem to notice.

One enterprising youngster apparently wanted to make sure Christmas would come again next year to the village, linked to the outside world b two radios and twice-a-month supply flights.

He had erected a sign on the trail winding back to the plane: "Santa Claus, come back next year.'


