

Remembering the birds and animals at Christmas is a custom that started in Europe hundreds of years ago.

In Sweden, Norway and Denmark, the farmers chose their best bundles of wheat, rye or other grains and tied them to the top of a pole. Some people believed that the family who raised their pole the highest would have the best luck. Others believed that if a lot of birds came, the family would have good crops that year. Even today, in this country, some farmers in Wisconsin, Illinois and North Dakota put out the poles.

It's a thoughtful idea to feed the birds all year long. But, if you are wondering what to do with your old Christmas tree, why not set it up as a special treat for them? Here are some decorations they would like

String Popcorn

. Use a heavy string and a big needle. Old popcorn is the easiest to string.

Doughnut Treat


Tie a ribbon around a doughnut and hang it on your tree.

How Does Lead Get Inside a Pencil?


1. Lead is really not lead at all. It is a mixture of the mineral graphite, clay, certain chemicals, and wax. The hardened mixture is pressed into strings that we call lead.

2. Most pencils are made of cedar wood. Blocks of wood are cut into strips. Then grooves are cut into the strips.

3. The lead is put into the grooves. A top is put on and the parts are glued







Animal of the Week: the Ostrich



The ostrich, which lives in Africa, is unusual for many reasons. It is the largest bird in the world. It can weigh as much as 300 pounds. Some ostriches grow to be eight feet tall. Though this bird cannot fly, it can run as fast as 40 miles an hour. It is also the only bird in the world with just two toes on each foot. The old story that the the ostrich hides its head in the sand when it is afraid is not true.





How to Make Suet Bells for the Birds

Ask your mother for some suet. Suet is animal fat, just like the flabby, white part of a steak that most people cut away. You'll also need paper cups, string and about one half cup of birdseed for each paper cup.

- 1. Use a pin to stick a tiny hole in the bottom of a paper cup. Pull the string through, making a loop.
- Melt the suet in a frying pan. Use low heat. Ask your mother to help.
- 3. When the suet is cool, but not hard, mix in the birdseed and pour the mixture into the paper cups. Set them in the refrigerator to harden.
- 4. When the suet is hard, peel away the paper cups and you'll have suet bells to hang on the trees. This is a winter treat only.
