


### The Professional Football Draft

Professional clubs draft most of their players from stars that have completed their college educations. Each pro team has a staff of scouts that closely watches outstanding college players. Each of the 26 teams is able to pick as many as 17 players in a 17 round pro draft. This draft usually lasts for two days. It will start on Tuesday, January 30. The team with the poorest record in the previous season of play gets to pick first. The coaches from each pro team are in touch by telephone to the National Football League offices in New York. They announce their choices and records are kept.

The teams then notify the players they pick. Most players have agents that help them work out contracts with the clubs' owners. For a period of a year, a player must play for the club that picks him, unless he is traded or sold to another team or unless he is dropped from the team. When he is dropped, his contract is "waived" and he is eligible to be drafted again by other clubs in a certain order that is established. If no club drafts him, then he becomes a "free agent" and can sign with any club.
