Claims Support

MANILA (AP) - Claiming blanket authority from public meetings his supporters have been holding, President Ferdinand E. Marcos was reported preparing today for major new decisions on the future of the Philippine government.

Presidential sources say returns from more than 73 per cent of some 32,000 "citizens assemblies" showed nearlandslide support for Marcos' martial law rule.

Guillermo de Vega, a presidential assistant, said Marcos within a week would decide whether to abandon a promised plebiscite on the constitution, whether to allow congress to convene as planned Jan. 22 and whether to reconvene the constitutional convention.

Policemen Slain

Belfast (AP) - Guerrillas killed three police officers in Northern Ireland Sunday night, climaxing two days of the heaviest bombing in the province in months.

At least eight bombs exploded, and British army experts defused two others. One blast wrecked a Belfast tavern frequented by Roman Catholics Saturday night and wounded 25

The Provisional wing of the Irish Republican Army was blamed for most of the bombings, but Protestant extremists were believed responsible for at least two of them, including the Belfast tavern blast.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) Indian, Emil Notti, to run for the congressional seat that was held by Nick Begich, presumed dead in a plane crash.

Notti, 38, will face Republican Don Young in a special election March 6.

Loosen Ties

LONDON (AP) - Australia's new Labor government is going to ask Britain to give up its last vestiges of authority over the former colony, says Sen. Lionel Murphy, attorney general and minister of customs for the commonwealth.

"It is unbelievable that 73 years after Australia became a commonwealth. Britain still has residual legislative. executive and judicial authority over Australia," Murphy said Sunday.

Other officials emphasized that Australia will not break all its special ties with Britain and become a republic. They said Queen Elizabeth II still will be regarded as the constitutional

Coventry Land Purchases Spur 'New Town' Rumors

Speculation continues to grow in Coventry over the possibility that recent sales of large parcels of land might be connected with Greater Hartford Process's "new town." The land, about 1,100 acres which has sold for in excess of a quarter of a million dollars, is all located in the town's northwest section, some of it near the borders of Bolton,

Tolland and Vernon. The Town Council met Sunday morning in an informal session to discuss and review the matter, which has many residents believing that the old airport issue is being revived or that the area is perhaps the planned site for a race track.

But a review of the procedures seems to indicate that the best bet is Greater Hartford Process.

Six parcels of land turned up in the land records at the town

hall in November, all connected with a Rochester, New York man, Edwin Larken. Larken is an attorney, and is also connected with a project in Wayne County, New York, outside. The council, in a statement Rochester, called the New issued following the Sunday

Wayne Communities. Investigation has shown that this project is a "new community" projected for 50,000 people within 20 years. While Larken himself has been unreachable, it is known that he does put together packages of this type.

Officials of Greater Hartford Process have, when contacted, said that, where their new town is concerned, their policy is to neither confirm nor deny the possibility that Coventry is the chosen site.

In the meantime, several council members have received numerous telephone calls from residents in the area where land is being purchased, indicating that increasing pressures are being applied to landowners to vield to either option or outright sale of their properties in the

next few days. Town Councilman Robert Keller has himself been approached and asked to sell his 20-acre parcel of land, which fronts on Rt. 44A. The land sold so far, while not in contiguous parcels, is bounded roughly by Rt. 44A, the Bolton and Tolland town lines, and Carpenter Rd. The council estimates that, in

Under the reported compromise, the sources said, there would be a "tacit understanding" on withdrawal in the peace treaty itself. But those provisions would be spelled out in one of the accompanying technical protocols.

There has been no official comment on this report.

search for an Arab-Israeli KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. (AP) - President Nixon ordered a halt Monday to all offensive military operations in North Vietnam "because of the progress made" in Paris peace talks, the Florida White House said.

Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said Nixon's order took effect at 10 a.m. EST and includes "bombing, shelling and any further mining of North Vietnam.'

The White House spokesman described the move as "a unilateral gesture" that followed an exhaustive presidential assessment of the negotiations.

Ziegler refused to discuss reports that Henry A. Kissinger, Nixon's peace negotiator, and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho have, for all practical purposes, already reached an ac-

He did say in response to a question:

"Dr. Kissinger will be returning to Paris at some point in the relatively near future."

Welfare Reform **Slated For Only Minor Attention** WASHINGTON (AP) - Welfare reform, a thorny issue

on Capital Hill during President Nixon's first term, is slated to get only minor attention in the 93rd Congress. While President Nixon may submit some new welfare proposals this year, tentative schedules of the House Ways

and Means and Senate Finance committees leave little

time for a major attempt to change the system.

Sen. Russell B. HARTFORD (AP) - The head of the state National Association for the Advancement of Colored People says state government, including Democratic legislators, has become unresponsive to the needs of "little people."

"Many legislators, Democratic and Republican legislators, have turned their backs on the little people in the state," Ben Andrews said Sunday night on WTIC-TV's "Face the State" program.

Among legislation Andrews said could be passed would be a reduction of taxes that fall heaviest on the poor, such as the sales tax.

Andrews repeated his allegations that Gov. Thomas J. Meskill hasn't opened enough doors to involvement by minority people in state government. 'There's a lack of respon-

siveness...to needs of many people, not just blacks," Andrews said. "There's been a cutback on the national level as well as on the state level in areas that, are meaningful to

It isn't so much doing the wrong thing, Andrews said, as earlier bills. Long says he still failing to consider reper-

cussions of state decisions on minority groups, as well as failing to include minority people in the decision-making process.

Andrews said that discrimination is less obvious today, but that doesn't make the situation for blacks any better than 20 years ago.

'We're worse off now than we were 10 years ago, or even 20 years ago," Andrews said. 'Discrimination has gone underground," he said, "It's harder to recognize. Its more

But, he said, it's still there. "Racism has become a part of the American system, like mom's apple pie and baseball,'

he said. "Our concern is with the institutionalized kind of racism," Andrews said. The hallmarks of 'institutionalized racism" are "lack of concern...lack of sensitivity...unwillingness to accept minorities in management posisions," he said.

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



Congress Spins Its Wheels

Congress is spinning its wheels in debating a cutoff of military funds for the fighting in Vietnam. Every member, from Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, on down, knows well that it is not possible for them to legislate the release of American prisoners of war held in North Vietnam.

Hanoi, and only Hanoi, can end the war. If Hanoi really wants to end the war, there are two ways to do it

The first is to accept the ceasefire agreement, return the prisoners of war, and let the American troops pull out without harassment. The second, which might appeal to Hanoi, if it had any understanding of America, would be to free all the prisoners and leave the next move to President Nixon.

American anti-war sentiment and the doves in Congress would re-double their efforts to force a shutdown of American activity in Indochina and the administration might have to leave South Vietnam to fend for herself on the theory that "Vietnamization" has made a successful defense possible. As the Paris talks resumed in a frigid atmosphere, Defense Secretary Melvin Laird told Congress South Vietnam now is able

to defend itself. In any event, we have not undertaken to defend South Vietnam forever or to guarantee peace in Indochina. Our objective is to end the fighting in an honorable way and that would be possible if North Vietnam shows good faith in concluding the settlement almost reached in

The United States has done all that could be expected by an ally. The future is up to the Vietnamese.



This is the time for the negotiators on both sides to reach at least a minimum agreement without raising new difficulties.

Whether North Vietnam wins its point that there is one Vietnam, not two, is going to be settled eventually by the North and the South, whether in peaceful negotiations, at the polls, or in more bloody fighting.

The promise of American aid to rehabilitate the war ravaged areas should be persuasive in bringing both sides to see the wisdom of peace.

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

With the American Conference's top offense and equally supreme defense, they had barreled through the year with a 14-0 record. Then, in a pair of come-from-behind efforts, they'd nudged past Cleveland 20-14 and Pittsburgh 21-17 for

And finally, as underdogs of anywhere from one to three points, they marched into Super Bowl VII, silently determined to shove into the background their 24-3 humiliation at the hands of the Dallas Cowboys in the championship



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
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
