Congress And Phase 3

One crutch has been thrown away. President Richard Nixon has announced the lifting of controls imposed more than a year ago on the economy to halt inflation. Only areas subject to direct control are foods and health services. The remainder are now under Phase 3 voluntary controls.

Reaction, quite naturally, has been favorable from the business community and important segments of the labor community. Unfavorable reaction, quite naturally, has come from Democrats and economists who favor strong government controls over

The key to Phase 3 is how business and labor accept the voluntary guidelines. Both will have to keep in mind that the President has until April 1, unless the Congress extends it, the power to reimpose mandatory controls should the guidelines be substantially violated. It can be anticipated too the Congress will extend the price-wage freezing powers or will act quickly should the need arise after

The easing of controls in effect does not mean a blank check but merely a shifting of more of the responsibility pressures to the private sector of the

controls, the Congress too must exercise fiscal restraint.

The free-spenders in Congress now have the ball and although there are no elections until 1974, it is obvious that the President's decision to lift the controls now will place much of the onus of Phase 3's success or failure on

Members of Congress read the polls but they are preparing for a test of strength with the President over a wide variety of spending programs and for an outright fight over some of Nixon's cuts, particularly in the areas of sewage treatment facilities, reduced farm subsidies, military cutbacks and educational programs.

The reason is that the majority of opinion is general, not specific, and based in part on wishful thinking Congressmen know that when specific cuts involve the areas they represent, there are powerful demands to leave them alone along with threats of retaliation at the next election. They know that spending is more popular than economy, cuts always being painful to somebody.

That is why they are willing to buck a President returned to office by a landslide vote and contend the issue is "the power of Congress against the

waste and duplication in the sprawling bureaucracy. President Nixon, who is more aware of how bad the situation is than probably anyone else, has announced his determination to trim off the fat and give the people a better government with fewer bureaucratic office holders. He is in a unique position to get the job done with a minimum of support from the Democratic majority because he is not running for office again.

Those who do face the electorate in the next election and ensuing ones should be made aware that the majority means business and is capable of putting the national interests above local and regional pork

You can help conserve limited sources of energy, and save yourself some money in the bargain, while you keep comfortably warm this winter . . . regardless of what kind of heat you have.

Insulation, for instance. Do you have enough? The National Bureau of Standards tells us that six inches of insulation over your top floor ceiling will pay for itself in fuel savings and your home will be more comfortable in summer as well as winter. (And, many times, installing it is simply a matter of laying it between floor joists in the attic.) Sidewall insulation probably requires professional installation, but it, too, will quickly pay for itself.

Seal off your house. Can you feel a draft around windows or doors? Weatherstripping and/or caulking is the answer here.

Storm windows and doors will reduce heat loss. They'll also reduce that drafty feeling you get when you're sitting or standing near a window or door.

Keep your heating plant running efficiently. To insure dependable operation, have your heating system inspected and serviced annually by your heating contractor.

Don't block off your heat source. Be careful not to block radiators and registers with furniture or floor-length drapes. Let the heat circulate.

Seal off upper floors. Remember . . . heat rises. If you have a door at the top of the stairs, especially the stairs leading to the attic, keep it closed. Weatherstripping helps here, too.

Repair leaky faucets, especially hot water faucets. Even a slight leak can waste considerable amounts Don't play with thermostats. If you like a cooler temper-

ature at night, don't exceed a six to eight degree setback. When airing the house, turn the thermostat to the lowest possible setting. Then, after the windows are closed, return the thermostat to the desired setting. If you have a fireplace, use it wisely. Be certain to close

the damper when the fire is completely out. Don't let
