

1972 national personal income rose by \$7.4 billion, an 8.6 per cent increase, reflecting the expanding economy, the Commerce Department said

Last year's increase in personal income topped the Nixon dministration's estimate by \$10 billion. Last January, the administration estimated that personal income would reach \$924 billion. The report showed that

reached \$935.8 billion with wage and salary payrolls climbing by almost 10 per cent and ccounting for most of the gain During the 1971 economics recovery, personal income increased by 6.8 per cent. In December, personal income increased by \$7.7 billion, the report said. In that month, it was at a seasonall idjusted annual rate of \$983.4

On top of that, the department revised the November increase upward to \$11.9 billion, including a \$3 billion rise in railroad retire ment and veteran's benefits Most of this is a nonrecurring speed-up payment to veterans. The December figures payrolls advanced \$5.6 billion about the same as the November increase. Industries that produce commodities showed an income rise of \$2.3 billion, those that distribute commodities, \$1,4 billion, and service industries \$1.3 billion. Manufacturing payrolls climbed \$2.5 billion with in-



Argument Against 'Supreme Court'

One of the basic rights of Americans, while not specifically defined in the Constitution and never exercised by the vast majority of citizens, but valued nevertheless, is the right to "take it all the way up to the Supreme Court."

A proposal to establish a new court - a "National Court of Appeals" just below the Supreme Court but above all others would seriously curtail this right and impair the integrity of the Supreme Court as well, critics of the plan say.

The proposal was made in December by a study group of noted lawyers and law professors, appointed by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger to make recommendations for easing the growing burden of cases being appealed to the Supreme Court each year. The number has increased from about 1,400 cases to more than 4,500 annually in the past 20 years.

The National Court of Appeals would be made up of seven members Courts, who would serve staggered three-year terms. It would screen all cases sent up for review by the Supreme Court, forwarding only those

decide itself, deny a review or send

But to insure that the authority of the Supreme Court would not be undermined, the high court would still have the ultimate power of review. It could reach down and pluck up any case it wanted to hear, whether passed on by the new court or not. And here is where the critics seem

to have their most telling argument. To exercise its supreme judicial function, the Supreme Court would have to know what was going on in the National Court of Appeals and to familiarize itself with all the cases that came before that court.



Girls in Boys' Sports

CIAC Decision To Avoid Costs

HAMDEN (AP) - The Connecticut Interscholastic Athletic Conference agreed to try allowing girls to compete with boys in noncontact sports mainly to avoid continuing legal costs, according to one CIAC official. "We've spent about \$5,000 fighting this thing through the courts," CIAC Executive Secretary John Daly said Thursday.

"We finally decided our money should be used for more positive goals," he added. Daly said the CIAC still fears that high schools will not improve their athletic programs for girls if they can let

girls go out for boys' teams instead. The CIAC reached agreement Monday in U.S. District Court to let both sexes join the same team on an experimental basis only if no girls' team exists. As a result, two girls who went to court in an attempt to get on the swimming and track teams in their respective Marinelli and Agnes Claughsey.

Some school officials agree with the CIAC that the two-third handicap on a 127 average agreement could mean a setback for girls' high school with 120 pins maximum. athletics, but others argue that it wouldn't make any

chools dropped their suit

John Matt, principal of Bristol Eastern High School, said he doubted the ruling would have any effect on his school's

"I think it depends on the interest among girls' physical education instructors and the demand among the girls," he said. Matt said the school now has girls' softball and basketball teams that compete against other schools and "We hope to expand that program." He added that he didn't know of any girls at the school

who wanted to join boys' teams. Athletic Director Benjamin Zajac of Platt High School in

Meriden, however, said he thought the change would hinder the development of athletic programs for girls. Platt, too, has interscholastic girls' basketball and softball and is planning to start field hockey and other sports, he said. "I imagine that they (the girls) will want to go out for

golf, tennis and track," said Zajac. But he added "If they can make it. I think they should be on the team.' The athletics director noted that "a transition is taking place now. You may see an increase in programs" of girls" athletics.

Officials at high schools in Hamden and Willimantic have said they doubted the rule change would affect their Daly said 177 public and nonpublic high schools affiliated

with the CIAC were polled last year on their attitude toward girls on boys' teams. Opposition came from 84 schools while 62 favored the proposal, he said. The change could cause several undesirable effects he

Most of the girls trying out for boys' teams probably won't get to play much, he predicted.

"This can be a two-way street," he added. "Boys who do not make the boys' team may decide to try out for the Daly said E.O. Smith High School in Storrs tried a coed swimming team for two seasons and then dropped it. An
