TEL AVIV (AP) - The Israeli Navy will soon begin using a fleet of heavily armed, high-speed patrol boats built in Israel. Completion of the first of the gunboats was announced

Interests Rates

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Nixon administration's Committee on Interest and Dividends, in the most farreaching step since it was established, has requested full information on costs and earnings from four banks that raised their prime lending rate.

The committee, a unit of the Cost of Living Council, said in an unusual Sunday statement that it regrets the increase of' the prime lending rate from 6 to 6¼ per cent.

The prime lending rate is the interest that commercial banks charge their mostcreditworthy customers. Consumer interest rates are scaled upward from the prime rate.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Legislation to provide for trial of federal criminal cases within 60 days after arrest was offered today by Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., and 45 other senators.

Ervin said the bill, similar to legislation he previously proposed, provides "a decisive, although perhaps to some a drastic, strategy to end the quagmire in the federal

County Superior Court. Judge Anthony J. Armentano, ruling in favor of the board, said, "It cannot be said that the speech and expression in viola-Constitution.

The dispute stemmed from the hospital's refusal to negotiate with the union over a period of several months and was declared by the SLRB to be in violation of state law, and the board ordered compliance.

The hospital's legal counsel filed the appeal originally with **Hartford County Superior Court** for a hearing

The appeal is over a ruling by the SLRB certifying Local 1199 of the Drug and Hospital Union, AFL-CIO, as bargaining representative of all full-time employes in the dietary department below the rank of executive chef. Workers in April 1971 chose the union by a vote of 24-21 after several months of hotly contested cam-

In September 1971, the board said Local 1199 asked the hospital to bargain at the end of July and again at the beginning of August. In August of 1971, the hospital informed union officials that it was rejecting their request to negotiate.

In turn, the board declared the refusal was illegal, because the board had already certified the union as bargaining

Prisoner of war lists given the United States in Paris listed 99 U. S. servicemen and 27 American civilians held by the Viet Cong in South Vietnam. There has been no indication when the release of the 465 Americans reported held in North Vietnam and Laos might

The South Vietnamese military command reported that Communist cease-fire violations had fallen below 100 for the first time since the truce went into effect Jan. 28. The command reported 89 incidents during the 24-hour period ending at 6 a.m. today.

Scores of U.S. aircraft ferried teams of 20 to 40 men of the International Commission and of the Communist side of the Joint Military Commission to seven regional headquarters to begin field operations after nearly a week's delay. U.S. and South Vietnamese teams already were in place. These sites included Hue and Da Nang in the northern provinces. Pleiku in the central highlands, Phan Thiet on the central coast, Bien Hoa in the Saigon region, and My Tho and Can Tho in the Mekong Delta.

Two other U.S. C130 transports flew to Hanoi to bring more North Vietnamese support personnel and equipment to Saigon for the Communist delegation to the Joint Military Commission. Five C130s brought more than 200 North Vietnamese support personnel from Hanoi on Sunday.

### Congress Opens Tax Hearings

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress opened a sweeping review of tax preferences today with advice from a former treasury policymaker that "tax reform is really a moral issue ... not just a technical exercise."

Stanley S. Surrey told the House Ways and Means Committee many so-called loopholes are really methods of spending public funds in ways that would not be approved for direct spending, and that if all the facts were generally known "the public outcry would be deafening."

"The knowledge that these tax escapes exist for the wellto-do and for large corporations has a corrosive effect for the

entire tax system," he said. Surrey, a professor at Harvard Law School, served as assistant Treasury secretary for tax policy in the administrations of Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B.

He was one of the opening witnesses at hearings expected to last about eight weeks and lay the basis for tax-reform legislation. Predictions have been guarded as to how extensive this may be.

But Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., committee chairman, says he doubts there will be a general tax cut, and disputes suggestions that closing tax

loopholes would bring the

treasury a tax windfall. Mills has indicated he wants a review of capital-gains taxation, the minimum tax that is designed to ensure that large incomes cannot completely escape taxation, and levies on estates and gifts.

In his prepared testimony, Surrey said tax subsidies amount to \$50 billion to \$60 billion "and thus are in size equal to about a quarter of the

regular federal budget." He said that while much attention has focused on 106 persons with incomes above \$200,000 who paid no income tax in 1970, "the 'no-tax' group' is but the exposed segment of a larger group that is paying in tax only a very low percentage of their actual income.

Harry Sinden, managing director of the Bruins, made the announcement that Guidolin, currently coach of the American Hockey League Boston Braves-the Bruins top farm club-would take over the coaching duties.





#### Battle Of The Budget

President Nixon has presented a budget calling for record expenditures of nearly \$269 billion and faces a donnybrook with the Democratcontrolled Congress to stay within even that awesome figure. While the President's budget will cut some sacred cows away from the trough, it is by no means a bare-bones or austerity program.

Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee is a toughminded Texas Democrat, George Mahon, known for his hard-headed realism on money matters. He cautioned that while the deficit may be less for fiscal 1974 than this year, it is still sizable and still poses an "enormous problem," and that's the truth.

House Speaker Carl Albert. Oklahoma Democrat, did what he conceived to be his partisan duty, crying "The President proposes nothing less than the systematic dismantling and destruction of the great social programs and the great precedents of humanitarianism inaugurated by Franklin D. Roosevelt and advanced and enlarged by every Democratic President since," and that is

The failures, not the successes, are Nixon's targets and why not? The President explained that many of the so-called great social programs were well meant but "too often poorly conceived and hastily put together," and failed miserably. For example, the Office of Economic Opportunity. Others, eminently worthwhile in the beginning, have served their purpose and should go in peace. An example is the Hill-Burton Act which matched local funds for construction of hospitals and health centers. We built a lot of them and the need for more is not so urgent that Congress shouldn't pause for a long second look before pushing further building.

Far from trying to dictate to Congress, Nixon urged Congress to put a legal, binding limit on total expenditures, a business-like approach long overdue and which would do much to give the legislative branch the fiscal control it has been deman-

Unless Congress accepts this responsibility - and it refused to set a \$250 billion ceiling on this year's spending, it must accept the blame for increased taxes, higher interest rates, higher inflation, or all three.

Nixon has proved his determination to regain some degree of control over the flood of federal red ink. It's high time for Congress to show some concern for fiscal sanity and the poor

Two things are certain in the budget battle ahead. Nixon will have the vociferous opposition of Democrats who have followed the spend-andspend policies of their former leaders like sheep. The other is that the mass of taxpayers will pray for another Nixon victory.

#### Overmedication Often Overstated

Deluged with drug advertising on television, watching their parents pop aspirins and tranquilizers, it's only natural that kids - who are apparently incapable of independent, rational thought - stick needles in their veins. Or so it is explained by many experts.

But while an undetermined number of people use medications excessively, "at the same time, another undetermined but certainly greater number of people who should be on medications ignore them because they don't get medical attention, can't afford it, refuse it, fail to get prescriptions filled, endure pain needlessly in accordance with the Puritan ethic, or are being educated







ease. Gum disease, as you know, is the primary cause of adult tooth loss. Basically, plaque is a sticky, colorless layer of harmful bacteria that is constantly for-

ming on your teeth. For a long time, dentists have known that sugar and starches are acted upon by bacteria in the mouth to create acid. It is this acid which attacks tooth enamel, eventually eating through it to create what is called a carious lesion, or

And because bacterial plaque is constantly forming on eth, the acid is almost everpresent, reaching peaks when sugars are eaten. Now, that describes plaque's role in tooth decay. Let's discuss how it is also the chief factor in gum dis-

Because plaque is constantly forming in the mouth, it is ound on other oral structures including the gums. And plaque and bacteria find it especially comfortable to lodge in the areas between teeth, right around the gum line, where the oothbrush doesn't reach. This means that the bacteria

in plaque are constantly irritating the gums and, if the plaque is not removed effectively at least once a day, the gums eventually become in-

Plaque begins to build up on the tooth structure, especially near the gum line causing the gums to recede. Plaque will also eventually harden into a substance called calculus, or tartar. Even after the formation of culculus, plaque will damage the gums by its continued presence.

Thus, we have a dual process, the plaque continues to irritate the gums, while at the same time, some of the plaque is hardening and forming calculus deposits on the teeth. Unless this continuous

process is halted, both by a thorough cleaning of all teeth at least once a day and periodic professional cleanings, to may even result in damage to the bone underneath the teeth
