## Middle Class Necessary

Two statements, applying to situations a half-a-world apart, are worth some thought.

In a recent issue of the Wall Street Journal, Philippine Foreign Secretary Carlos P. Romulo claimed martial law has worked wonders in the Philippines where American-style democracy was "tried without success."

He went on to explain his belief that American attempts to make his nation a "show window of democracy in Asia" failed because "Democracy, American Style, must have a bastion to fall on, a great and strong middle class. You have it in America. Here, we have only the very rich and the very poor."

In the same issue, Journal staff reporter, Mike Tharp, writing on the rising crime rate in Albuquerque N.M., which alledgedly now has the largest crime incidence in the nation wrote, "Albuquerque boasts a wellheeled intelligentsia and harbors a broad low-income, low education stratum, but it lacks a strong middle class, a stabilizing influence in many

To those of us who live in Connecsignificance what a politician in Manila or a reporter in remote New Mexico think about the role of the middle class in a successful democracy and more specifically in one of the most visible evidences of a successful democracy, safe streets and a relatively low crime rate; but it

Connecticut, by and large, is middle class community, with perhaps a slight edge on the higher income side. But we do have our "poverty pockets." We do have some cities which have substantial populations who are low-income and low-educated groups by almost any reasonable yardstick. And we have some communities which have substantial portions of above average incomes.

The alarming thing to us is that so much of our political effort seems to be anti-middle class; yet it is this very class which holds the key to democratic economic and social progress.

Almost every assessment of the tax burden shows the brunt of it being carried by the middle class. Almost every study of enduring change in our country indicates these changes did not come without middle class sup-

port economically or at the polls. Yet, in many quarters it is middle class, with its sometimes oldfashioned conservatism and its selfadmitted "work ethic," that is under mounting pressures and is becoming

the scapegoat for all our social ills. The middle class mind might not be overly keen about reforms for reform's sake, changes that are wanted vesterday, and may come close to blowing its cool when its comfortable respect for anchestral achievements is transformed into an "original sin" sort of thing for which he must now rectify through abject

atonement rituals. You see, the middle class mind has been able to create and maintain the stable basis for democracy and law and order in the past, not so much through political genius or power, but because of a self-confident attitude. This attitude says to a man, "You

can." Not the intellectual patronizing "You must or will." Nor the dehumanizing "You can't." In essence it is the self-made class open to all who work. You really can't be voted in, you can't really buy your way in unless you earned your money for by most of the rules of the game, inherited wealth makes you "upper

This middle class work ethic is very pragmatic. For it always seems to ask "will it work?"

and try something else. The bugaboo about status quo and the middle class is a my in that resistance to method of change is not the same as resistance to change. The means must justify the end and not the end justify the means.

Now all this may seem oldfashioned and quaint and not an attitude of a vigorous free people who must cope with 20th Century problems in 20th Century ways. But remember democracy's failure in the Philippines and it shortcomings in Albuquerque are laid to a lack of middle class and

There is a lesson here for Connecticut leaders and leaders everywhere. We think it is simply this. Don't underestimate the middle class, which relatively speaking asks very little and can offer very much.

It can be the key to great things because many middle class people know what it is to be poor and uneducated for they were once poor and uneducated. And they too can accept wealth for most of them earned it and have no hangups about apologizing for it. By definition the middle class is the middle ground upon which democratic

society can grow or die. Our democracy can grow if it recognizes this middle ground as the seed bed where the workable hybrids of extremes are nutured. Let's use the middle class instead of abusing it.

(AP) - Child care, mental health, HOUSTON Republicans at the National Women's Political Caucus convention, irked at anti-Nixon remarks by Rep. Bella Abzug, have decided after two long meetings they shared her basic frustrations at the severe cutback of social programs.

As the late-night meeting progressed it became clear that while many delegates objected to Ms. Abzug's partisanship in criticizing Nixon at a "unity" session of all women, most of them agreed with the thrust of her criticism. "Let's face it, Nixon's




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
