

A number of ancient peoples are said to have executed messengers who brought bad news.

We're too civilized to do that today. We merely fire them, banish them and make sure they never have a position of responsibility again.

This is what was done during the witch hunt days of the McCarthy era to a group of foreign service officers who came to be called the "old China hands" and who had made the mistake of warning back in the 1940s that Mao Tse-tung and Co. were the wave of the future in China.

For this they were reviled and accused of disloyalty.

Nearly three decades later, the United States having officially decided that the Communists are in China to stay awhile, long overdue honor was meted out to these prophets in the form of a testimonial dinner hosted by the American Foreign Service Association.

After all, it takes two to tangle, and the hostility and distrust between Washington and Peking were hardly helped by the invasion of South Korea by China-backed North Korea in 1950. It should be remembered that we had withdrawn our military presence from South Korea and had more or less washed our hands of Chiang

Optimism and Patience

When it comes to the U.S. mails, it seems to be a case of the more things change, the more they become a

Back in July of 1971, the venerable Post Office Department, a Cabinetlevel agency dating back to Washington's first administration, was transformed into the semiautonomous U.S. Postal Service. The idea was to insulate the mail system from politics, reorganizing it along business lines to function more efficiently and eventually to break even, eliminating massive congressional subsidies.

No one was promising or expecting miracles. And no one can say the Postal Service hasn't been trying. In the pursuit of efficiency, it has raised rates and curtailed pickups, innovated with services and equipment and is now proposing reforms ranging from standardized envelope sizes to simplified postage and handling for large-volume mailings.

Still, to the average sender and receiver of letters, it often seems that the major change in the past year and a half has been to move from the verge of collapse to an advanced state of same. Most users have their examples of horrendous service letters taking weeks to cross the country or even to be delivered to a neighboring city, air mail and special delivery taking longer than third class once did, lost and damaged items. It might almost seem that the very

Marlin Longshot In Daytona 500

DAETONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - Tennessee farmer Clifton "Coo Coo" Marlin is thinking about a \$32,000 winner's check in Sunday's Daytona 500 stock car race after sharing honors with Buddy Baker in two 125-mile

Marlin, of Columbia, Tenn., won Thursday's second 125mile qualifying test with a speed of 157.177 miles per hour after pole winner Baker whipped a stellar field in the first

race, timing 173.611 miles per hour. "I'd put that money into the farm, I wouldn't put it in racing," said Marlin, 41, contemplating the possibility of a paycheck bigger than all of his 1972 earnings of \$28,124 on the Grand National circuit of National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing. In a six-year career, he has won

only \$58,000. second row behind Baker and Pete Hamilton of Dedham, Mass., he is at best a long shot for the big test over Daytona's 2.5-mile high-ranked track.

Marlin's son Sterling, 16, is the only member of his pit crew that works with him regularly and he admits the two spare engines he brought to Daytona are no match for the one used Thursday which suffered a punctured oil pan late

Hamilton, in the same qualifying race with Marlin, was already guaranteed the outside pole position through his qualifying speed of 183.45 miles per hour last week and bulled his 1972 Plymouth out of the race after 42 laps. Baker, of Charlotte, N.C., was two miles an hour faster than Hamilton in the pole qualifying and said he was eluctant to run Thursday because he is recovering from the flu. He finished just ahead of Cal Yarborough of Timmonsville, S.C., in a close battle which went on from start to finish.

Yarborough joins Marlin in the second row for Sunday's start. Gaining the third row were Gordon Johncock of Hastings, Mich., and Hershel McGriff of Bridal Veil, Ore., runnerup on the NASCAR West circuit the past two years to Ray Elder of Carthuers, Calif.
