According to the proposed land use plan of the Office of State Planning, the state's population growth has occurred in low population density areas of the state and despite the fact the state had the fourth highest overall high density of population per acre in the nation in 1970, the density of population per residential acre actually declined from 9.5 persons per acre in 1960 to 7.5 in 1970.

Despite our smallness in size, growth in the decade was substantial. Land devoted to housing increased 53 per cent between 1960-70; land used by commercial development 88 per cent; and industrial use by 68 per cent. Obviously this was at the expense of land used by agriculture and forest antation which decreased 23 per cent, according to the state study.

The apparent desire for Nutmeg State citizens to have more elbow room is evident as is the increasing pressures for a more quality environment to make the larger homesites and attendant quality of living more desirable.

But land is not inexhaustible and the state and its citizenry face some hard decisions as to land classification and land use.

The Office of State Planning has unveiled its proposed plan to set the state on such a course. Broadly the state would have three land-use groupings - urban development, limited development and permanent open space.

The crux of such a plan is the achievement of: citizen input and support of a plan which is finally adopted; effective and realistic

establishment of state land-use criteria; and a workable coordination of planning and development among the various planning districts and the state.

A workshop conference on the plan for representatives of state and federal agencies, regional agencies, special commissions, and municipal officials has been conducted. This will be followed up with the state planning agency, in cooperation with regional planning agencies, holding regional meetings throughout the state to discuss the proposals.

Copies of the plan are being distributed for citizen study. A motion picture explaining the plan is available from Richard N. Symonds Jr., Office of State Planning, 340 Capitol Ave., Hartford.

The need for a comprehensive landuse plan which seeks to establish a balance between urban development pressures and conservation needs is not in question. The question is the form and extent of such a plan. The state agency's proposal provides a for action.

Each of us, regardless of our extensive or limited interests in the land on which we live, have a stake in the outcome and should inform ourselves and contribute our ideas and thoughts to the state agency at the regional meetings.

There is no longer "lots of land under starry skies above." When it comes to fencing it won't be long until there are many "fences," legal and literal, which will restrict how we can use and develop our lands. The real question is do we do our own "fencing" or let someone else "fence us out?"

If we may expand on Robert Frost, good fences make good neighbors, if the good neighbors agree on the fence and its location. This is the task now before us, to be good neighbors making good fences.

TEL AVIV (AP) -**Gunfire** from Israeli warplanes shit a Libyan passenger plane today and forced it down with a loss of about 70 lives, military sources reported.

The incident took place about 12 miles from the Suez Canal in the occupied Sinai Desert. The Israeli military

spokesman said 13 survivors were taken to a hospital. The plane apparently was en

route from Cairo to Beirut. The spokesman gave this account - The Libyan 727 entered

Israeli airspace 50 miles from the canal over the lediterreanean coastline, and flew over Israeli military positions.

- Israeli warplanes rose to intercept the aircraft and opened fire after the pilot ignored orders to land. The plane was hit and forced to crash land about a dozen miles from the

The pilot of a Lebanese airliner flying four minutes behind the Libyan plane said he heard the pilot say on the radio, "We got hit." The Lebanese pilot said in Beirut that there was no indication the Libyan

plane was off course. Airliners flying between the two Arab capitals customarily make a detour that adds an extra 35 minutes to the one-hour

The crash landing was believed to be the first time a Libyan aircraft has been caugh n the Middle East dispute. It came only 12 hours after Israeli commandos returned from a raid on seven Arab guerrilla bases in northern Lebanon.

Military sources said the plane went down in the barren desert about 15 miles from the Suez Canal separating Israel and Egyptian frontline troops. Israel captured the Sinai Desert from Egypt during the six-day war of 1967.
