Farm Workers

I would like to point out some little known facts about the migrant farm worker in our

These people live in a virtually pseudo-feudalistic situation, whereby they are in servitude, working and living on land they do not own.

Few migrants are residents of any town in Connecticut, since by the very nature of their jobs, they must move from area to area. They are not therefore covered by state welfare laws, minimum wage laws, and because of their wanderings, are not eligible voters. A publication issued by the

U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, notes -that, "In the farm and tobacco ands of Connecticut...some of the migrant camps are almost military, with high fences and forbidding **NO TRESPASSING SIGNS."

Efforts to improve the living conditions behind these barriers have been repulsed. In 1967 a worker for the State Department of Education was forced off the land at gunpoint by the owner and charged with trying to interfere with private

The Connecticut Labor Department is not actively involved with the migrants in this state and does not accept any responsibility for their situation. This department claims that farm owners are not required to keep or present records of farm operations. Therefore, the presence of these workers is not even acknowledged officially by anyone. The State Labor Department did not mention a little known fact-that tax incentives exist for the farm owner to make low estimates of his personnel and wages paid. It seems, then, that the State Department of Labor is, in a real sense, protecting the interests of the economically nowerful farm owners in Connecticut at the expense of e migratory workers. The only active state agency

concerned with this group in **Connecticut** is the Migratory Children's Program, funded by the State Department of Education. While the services of this program are worthwhile, they are available only to older teenagers or adults. In fact, in Connecticut, there are no programs, on any level, of any type, specifically designed average adult migratory worker. If there is one piece of mail, almost all of us receive and which we do not ignore, it is that annual epistle from the Internal Revenue Service with our Form 1040.

We would venture too that the contents get as much, if not more, attention than any other letter we get during the year including the quarterly health report from 92-yearold rich Uncle Fred.

This being the case, we are at a loss to understand why Robert S. Strauss, Democratic party national chairman, calls the checkoff plan to aid the national presidential campaigns "America's best-kept secret."

The IRS mentions it quite frequently in its detailed instructions and the full page with two forms is quite obvious in the booklet. With the form you can earmark a buck to the Repubicans, a buck to the Democrats, a buck to be split up among the major parties, or pass.

What is really sticking in the craw of the Democratic leader is that in the early tax returns, most taxpayers feel deficit ridden Uncle Sam is more needy than either party. Of 12 million returns filed through last week, only 4 per cent filled out the form, which means less than half a million bucks for presidential politicking so far. Of course, this is probably split between the two parties, so unless there is a big change of heart, the millions anticipated just won't be there.

Now we can understand Mr. Strauss' concern since his party still has some outstanding bills from the last election and his opposition is sitting pretty well off with a surplus reportedly as large as the Democratic deficit.

The state asked the court to condemn the tract after City Auto Parts, Inc. rejected state offer of \$112,000 for the

The proposed \$14 million jail is to replace the ancient Seyms Street jail in Hartford. Mayor George Athanson said that if the jail must be built, it should be constructed on the east side of Interstate 91 where the state already owns land. The proposed site is on the west side of the highway amidst the city's North Meadows Industrial Park redevelopment

But Athanson went a step further, proposing a moratorium on all jail construction in the state while the merits of correctional facilities are debated.

The Democratic mayor charged that Gov. Thomas J. feskill is going ahead with the jail construction without regard for development of the rest of the meadows.




