

Thursday, the Greater Hartford Transit District directors are slated to meet and act on some unfinished business. First, they are faced with the possibility some member towns may withdraw from the district. Second, should the first come about, they must decide whether or not the district (with fewer towns as members) should go ahead with the proposal to get the ConnCo. bus service operating again and eventually take over the line's operations and

We can appreciate the economic impact the lack of bus service has on Hartford. We can understand the reluctance of some of the towns in the district to being taxed through the gasoline tax for an operation which essentially is dominated by and services Hartford. This is not to say that bus service to Hartford and other major population areas of the state is not essential.

However, it does point out the flaw of the immediate past approach to the mass transit needs of the state as a whole, as districts within the state, and as towns within a district.

Neighboring Vernon, for example, sees more of a need for intra-Vernon transit than buses winging to and from Hartford. This need is evidenced in Manchester also and in many other Nutmeg towns.

The senior citizen wishing to visit across town or go downtown shopping is a potential bus rider. Students not eligible for school-financed transit are also potential customers. Commuters within a community should not be overlooked either.

This potential is not to say that mass transit needs are essentially a local problem. On the contrary, it clearly indicates that perhaps more than ever before, statewide coordination is necessary for it appears bus usage, like air travel, has levels of

That's when Marvin Miller, outspoken executive director of the Major League Baseball Players Association, meets with player representative of the 24 teams to brief them on the agreement achieved with the club owners. Miller and the owners' representative, John Gaherin, wouldn't disclose any details of the agreement-although plenty of them leaked out anyway. And it still isn't official.

Both the owners and players must ratify it. That, however, appears to be merely a formality For even as the announcement of the settlement was being made, players were already flooding into spring training camps to begin getting in shape for the season that will open-on time this year-barely a month away.

The agreement is not only preventing another divisive and costly strike, it is hardly ruffling the spring training schedules. As of now, only four teams—the Boston Red Sox. Shopping carts are noticeably filled with more old staples such as rice, spaghetti, packaged ground meat helpers, canned sauce-type soups, and ground beef in the 3 to 5 pound Coldcuts already packaged are taking a back seat to freshly

There are some alternatives.

For instance, canned soups can't compare price wise with a pot of mother's homemade soup. Chicken necks and backs (about 19 cents a pound) plus a few carrots, celery, potatoes or pasta, make a pot of nutritious soup which surpasses the canned variety in both quality and quantity. It takes a little more time than opening a few cans, but in the long run, more food savings are derived.

fronically enough, some of the senior citizens were not noticing the price rises as much as the younger homemakers. budget has been taxed a little. especially as buying for two is more expensive than buying for a larger family, but all in all we don't feel it as much as some of

crackers and dips, potato chips, etc., so we don't miss them it's the youngsters who find it makes a difference in their Generally speaking,

homemakers must adjust, but there are other alternatives. Statisticians have proved that if shopper sticks to the list she prepared at home, which in most cases is ample for her family's needs, she will stay within her food budget. Jennifer Cross, author of "The Supermarket Trap," cites

many instances where the shopper is "fured" into making purchases of items on which there is no savings - and in many cases items that her

She estimates that for every dollar spent on "specials" sliced delicatessen products another 60 cents goes for purchases such as the exotic which mom can indicate she wants "sliced very thin" salad dressings appropriately placed next to the lettuce on the thereby giving her a chance to stretch it to one more

She further states that consumers should be careful of 'two for' or "three for' pricing. These, often found displayed near the checkout counters, are usually piled high with a sign that leads you to believe its a special price - so not wanting to miss a bargain, a shopper will scoop up three cans or packages of the items, pop them into her shopping cart, and head for checkout If she had taken the time to go back to the shelf where this tem is also sold — 9 out of 10 times she would find that what

was offered to her as "3 for 75 cents" is actually 25 cents a can Supermarkets have the right to make a profit - appealing to the shopping homemaker and etting her to purchase an item takes a talented team of advertising men - but to save a ood dollar and feed a family
