KHARTOUM, Sudan, (AP) - The Palestinian guerrillas who executed two American diplomats and shot a Belgian envoy demanded safe passage out of Sudan today with the two Arab diplomats they still hold captive, and the Sudanese government immediately rejected the demand

Egypt's Middle East News Agency said the Black September commandos asked he Sudanese government t supply a plane and send along a senior official as a "guarantee or our safety." There were n mmediate indication where they wanted to go.

The Sudanese government mmediately rejected their iemands and ordered the uerrillas instead to hand over he bodies of the envoys slain Friday night.

They were Cleo A. Noel Jr., the new U.S. ambassador to Sudan, and the outgoing U.S. charge d'affaires, G. Curtis Moore. The Sudanese government said the guerrillas claimed they also killed the claimed they also killed the Belgian charge d'affaires, Guy diplomats.
