### Coventry Teachers, Board Agree On Pay

The Board of Education and Coventry Federation of Teachers have both approved a two-year contract, covering the 1973-74 and 1974-75 school years, marking the first time in several years that salary figures have been set in time for the April and May town budget sessions.

For several years negotiations between the parties in the contract have bogged down in the spring and ended up in a either no contract or arbitration, or both. But this time, the board and the CFT began their contract talks two months earlier than usual, and wound up negotiations in nine sessions.

Teachers voted approval of the contract by a vote of 14 to 0 and the board approved it unanimously last night.

Major changes in this year's document include, of course, salary increases, and an increase in the length of the teachers' school year. In the latter case, teachers will be paid for 180 teaching days, plus five days of board-sponsored programs, such as in-service training, for a total of 185 paid days. Currently, teachers are paid for 182 days.

Another change is a \$1,000 increase in board-paid life insurance coverage for the employee, up from the current \$6,000.

**Salary Schedule**

Salaries for 1973-74 represent a total raise of 5.7 per cent, which 4 per cent is the normal increment (as the teacher moves up a salary scale) and a 1.7 per cent raise. The same raise will also be in effect for the 1974-75 school year.

In the current contract, teachers received a 4 per cent increment, plus a 1 per cent

### Restaurant Fire Does Heavy Damage

A fire which apparently started in a furnace caused considerable damage early today at Childer's Restaurant, 250 Hartford Rd., Manchester.

The roof and the rear of the structure sustained major fire damage, according to William Griffin, the town's deputy fire chief. Contents of the building suffered smoke and water damage as well.

A full-time fireman, Laurence Freiheit, 59, of 14 Westwood St., suffered an apparent heart attack at the fire scene this morning and died shortly afterwards at Manchester Memorial Hospital. Freiheit, who had been a regular member of the department for 17 years, was off duty when the fire was reported, and went to the hospital to assist.

No estimate of financial loss in the fire was available today.

### Vernon GOP Picks Wehrli For Mills' Post

Robert Wehrli, presently a selectman and chairman of the Permanent Municipal Building Committee, has been nominated by the Republican Town Committee to fill a vacancy on the Town Council.

Councilman David Mills, a Republican, resigned his position on the council, effective April 1. Mills cited health problems as his reason for resigning.

It is expected the council will act on Wehrli's appointment at its next meeting, March 19. Wehrli has been a resident of Vernon for 14 years. He is a native of West Orange, N. J., a veteran of the Navy and received a degree from the University of Bridgeport. He is employed as an assistant corporate credit manager by the Stanley Works in New Britain.

He was elected to the Board of Selectmen in 1971 and was named to the building committee the same year. In 1972 he was elected chairman of the building committee. He is a member of the Vernon Youth Republican Club and was active on the committee to re-elect the president.

Wehrli and his wife and two children live at 195 Tracy Drive.

### Group Will Walk Case Boundaries

There will be a survey walk around the boundaries of the proposed Case Mt. land purchase Saturday morning at 10 a.m.

The group will leave the Municipal Building parking lot accompanied by Igor Vechostol, surveyor; Walter Semko, town engineer; and Dr. Frederick W. Spaulding, Conservation Commission member. Entrance to the land will be made from the Birch Mt. Rd. access.

The walk is open to the public, but Dr. Spaulding says all persons must agree to proceed at their own risk over very rough terrain. He said that carrying tools would be necessary as the route will avoid any roads or trails.

Participants must also keep pace with the surveyor, who has indicated that he will proceed as fast as he can in order that as much of the boundary as possible can be traversed. It will, therefore, not be a feasible hike for younger children or others unaccustomed to a rather brisk rate of speed, over a period of approximately four hours, Dr. Spaulding said.

A snowstorm limited a previous walk to only a couple of townspeople two months ago. Dr. Spaulding said, and the boundaries were only partially covered at that time.

The short notice of this walk is due to good weather predictions, he said.

### Senate Okays Gasoline Probe

HARTFORD (AP) — The state Senate Thursday gave final approval to a committee to investigate gasoline prices in Connecticut.

Democrats argued the study wasn't needed, pointing to investigations by Atty. Gen. Robert K. Killian and previous public hearings under the Democratic-controlled legislature of last year.

But Republicans said Killian had done nothing but a publicity tour. The six legislators on the committee will report to the legislature by May 1.

Town Sued by Builder

A suit filed against the Town of Vernon, its Zoning Commission and Sewer Authority by Henry and Zachary Abuza, trustees of the Northgate Apartments on South St., asks for damages totaling \$19,000.

The two men list three counts on which they seek damages. One concerns the payment, under protest, of \$5,000 to the town for the Downstream Development Fund. Such payment is required by the zoning regulations.

In the suit the plaintiffs claim the town is unconstitutional and illegal because it is an arbitrary abuse of police power, amounts to a tax on the use of land without authorization by statute.

In addition to terminating this action, "arbitrary, confiscatory, discriminatory and illegal, the plaintiffs also claimed that the section of the zoning laws would require them to construct a walk "which begins and ends along the entire frontage of a proposed sidewalk system in the general vicinity of the plaintiffs' property."

The third count involves an objection to a section of the sewer ordinance which requires permit and inspection fees at the rate of \$100 each for the first two dwellings and an additional \$70 each for each additional dwelling unit for multi-family dwellings.

The plaintiffs are represented by Atty. David Gardner of Fishery, Burke and Marder of Rockville and the town by Town Attorney Abbott Schwelb.
